

Smythe, Larkin, Maloney Run Into Bad Luck Streak

Conn Smythe and Larkin Maloney have been spending money like millionaires—which they are—on horse flesh the last few years. As a result, their stable of thoroughbreds has been one of the most successful in the country.

They've taken gambles that have paid off but all of a sudden their luck turned bad. Last week probably was their toughest. A couple of weeks ago, Caledon Beau, 1958 Queen's Plate winner, suffered a foreleg fracture in a race at Toronto's Old Woodbine.

Last Tuesday, the four-year-old colt, winner of more than \$55,000 during his three years of racing, was destroyed.

COSTLY WIN
Last Monday Major Flight won the feature at New Woodbine but pulled up lame and will be sidelined for the balance of the season.

Two days later Eskimo Flyer, a four-year-old chestnut colt from the Larkin-Maloney stable, snapped his left foreleg and may have to be destroyed. Eskimo Flyer had won nearly \$18,000 in 1958 and so far this season.

The injury to Eskimo Flyer happened as the colt was running second to Tyhawk, owned by Jack Singer of Winnipeg and Les Lear of Calgary. Stampeder football club fame. But Eskimo Flyer wasn't gaining on the western-owned horse, holder of the world record for 6 1/2 furlongs.

Tyhawk established his world mark of 1:14 4/5 at Turf Paradise, Phoenix, Ariz., last February.

FIRST IN EAST

It was the first eastern racing victory for Lear, who coached and played for the Stampeder when they won the 1948 Grey Cup 12-7 over the heavily-favored Ottawa Rough Riders.

Lear, an old-time player with Winnipeg Blue Bombers, lost his coaching job with the Stamps after the 1952 season and turned to the horse-racing game. He finds horse racing a lot easier than football coaching.

"At least I don't have to plow the streets until dawn looking for thoroughbreds," he said in a recent television interview. "When I was with Calgary you'd almost think I was on the dawn patrol."

Nat. President Will Act Soon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Calvin Griffith, president of the Washington Senators, said Tuesday he would act soon on what he termed an enticing proposition to move his American League baseball team to Minneapolis. Griffith said he had not reached a final decision but added: "The proposition looks enticing." Minneapolis interests have pledged, among other inducements, the equivalent of 1,001,000 admissions for each of the first three years in which the Senators would play there. Griffith last year abandoned at the last moment a plan to take

up with other American League club owners the possibility of transferring to Minneapolis from Washington.

He would have to seek permission from other American League owners to transfer his franchise. Approval of six of the eight clubs is necessary. Some owners have said they want to keep a team in the U.S. capital, but Griffith has indicated he is confident of the required number of votes.

Minneapolis-St. Paul is one of the cities which the proposed new Continental League has designated for its operation. If the Senators leave Washington, the capital almost certainly would be sought by the new league.

Barons Top Aces 5-1

QUEBEC (CP)—Cleveland Barons Tuesday night took their first victory of the young American Hockey League season, beating Quebec Aces 5-1 on three crucial Quebec penalties.

Ed Hoekstra scored twice for Cleveland. His first—which proved to be the winner—came at 13:07 of the first period with Quebec defenceman Georges Roy in the penalty box.

Cookie Gilchrist Can't Be Blamed

TORONTO (CP)—No one can blame Cookie Gilchrist if Toronto Argonauts fail to hit a Big Four football union playoff spot this season. He can score the points with his boot or by running over the opposition when he carries the ball.

Statistics compiled by The Canadian Press show that the 24-year-old Gilchrist has scored 65 points, nearly one-third of Argonauts' 184 total in 11 games. Twenty-seven of these have been scored in the last three games to give him the lead in the league's scoring race.

Cookie holds an 11-point margin over Ron Howell, Hamilton's punt-return and deep-pass specialist who has scored 54 points on

five touchdowns. Gilchrist's scoring is made up of five touchdowns, 14 converts and seven field goals.

Third place is shared by Dave Thelen and Bobby Simpson of Ottawa Rough Riders, each with 48 points on eight touchdowns. Next in line is Tiger-Cats' Gerry McDougall with 42 points.

Terry Meyer of Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen heads the Ontario Rugby Football Union scoring list with 72 points, 20 more than runner-up Mike Norcia, also of the Dutchmen.

Bill Mitchell of the University of Western Ontario leads the senior intercollegiate scorers with 12 points after two games in the college circuit. Terry Porter of Queen's is second with eight.

59 Yds. Separate 3 Tops Rushers In Big 4 Loop

TORONTO (CP)—Only 59 yards separate the three top rushers in the Big Four football league.

Official statistics, not including Monday's games, show Dave Thelen of Ottawa Rough Riders maintaining his lead with 813 yards gained on 138 carries.

Gerry McDougall of Hamilton Tiger-Cats took over undisputed possession of second place with 769 yards. Dick Shatto of Toronto Argonauts, tied last week with McDougall for the runner-up spot, slipped into third place with 754 yards.

Ottawa quarterback Russ Jackson took over the passing lead on average yards gained, with 9.9 yards on 65 attempts. Tom Dubinski of Hamilton has the best completion average with 607 of his 56 throws having been good.

But Sam Echeverry of Alouettes is far ahead of the field on yards gained passing with 2,240. Echeverry has attempted 308 passes and completed 179. Next is Hamilton's Bernie Faloney who has completed 100 of 179 attempts for 1,606 yards.

Red O'Quinn of Montreal still leads in passes received with 39, while teammate Joel Wells is second with 34. Shatto maintains his third-place standing with 31.

Picking NFL Commissioner Will Be Knockdown Battle

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—With Bert Bell gone National Football League owners appear headed for a knock-down, drag-out battle over a new commissioner.

The quest starts today. The owners are scheduled to meet probably in late afternoon after dinner at the 65-year-old Bell, who collapsed at the Pittsburgh-Philadelphia game Sunday and was pronounced dead 10 minutes later at a nearby hospital. A poll of owners discloses they are in agreement on only one thing—they'll never find another

Some think the rotund commissioner's successor should come from the ranks. Others feel he should be brought in from outside, maybe a judge, senator, or governor.

Some would like to settle the thing quickly, even today if a meeting of minds could be reached. Others say the task is too important to do on the spur of the moment. The latter group wants to wait until the draft meeting at the end of November.

In talking with the owners, one familiar with the league and its people could feel old animosities rising. Bell had kept them dormant. A few owners feared that if a man from the ranks were chosen he would favor certain clubs as against others.

One owner balked to the times when the owners could spend three days wrangling over one subject, finally giving up and

tossing the ball to Bell for a final decision. But now there is no Bell to take the ball.

The number one name freely offered by a few owners as their choice for the job was Edwin J. Anderson, president of the Detroit Lions. Paul Brown, general manager-coach of the Cleveland Browns, came out for the Detroit executive. Dan Reeves of the Los Angeles Rams said Anderson "is fine with me."

Walter Wolfner of the Chicago Cardinals said he had an open mind. He said he favored someone outside the league, "maybe a man with legal training, a federal judge. A commissioner from the league has got to have ties and might favor some clubs. It will be very difficult for the 12 clubs to agree on anyone."

N.Y. Athletic Commission Aims To Revoke Licences

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York State Athletic Commission, charging misconduct, Tuesday took steps to revoke the licenses of three principals in the promotion of the ill-starred Floyd Patterson-Ingemar Johansson heavyweight title fight last June 26.

In the wake of a month-long series of hearings, the regulatory body struck at Rosensohn Enterprises, Inc., promoter of the bout; Bill Rosensohn, former head of the organization who broke with his partner, Vincent Veclia, and Gus D'Amato, manager of the deposed champion, Patterson.

The commission directed that these parties show cause why their licenses should not be revoked.

Although the accused have a chance to appear before the commission and appeal their cases, the action has the effect of barring them from further fight activities in the state.

Wilhelm Wins 1959 Earned Run Championship

NEW YORK (AP)—Hoyt Wilhelm, Baltimore's veteran knuckleballer, won the American League earned run championship the past season to become the first pitcher ever to win the title in each major league.

Wilhelm gave up only 55 earned runs in 226 innings for a 2.19 earned run average in 1959, figures compiled by The Associated Press disclosed Tuesday. He won the National League crown in 1952 with a 2.43 mark while relieving for the New York Giants.

The Orioles' right-hander had 15 victories and 11 losses the past year, pitching in 32 games with 27 starts. He had three shutouts, two against the New York Yankees and one against Kansas City. Wilhelm won his first nine games before losing to Detroit on June 15.

Bob Shaw of the Chicago White Sox finished second with a 2.65 average; Camilo Pascual of Washington was third with 2.67. Art Ditmar of the Yankees was fourth with a 2.90 average. He was followed by Jerry Walker of Baltimore, 2.92 and Billy O'Dell, also of the Orioles, 2.94.

Whitey Ford of the Yanks, who was the ERA champion last year with 2.01, was seventh in 1959 with 3.04. Then came Early Wynn of Chicago, who had the most victories, 22. Wynn's earned run percentage was 3.13.

Rounding out the first 10 were Bud Daley of Kansas City, 3.17 and Milt Pappas of Baltimore, 3.27.

Charles Antonucci, also known as Charlie Black, from promoting or even attending any more fights in New York. Black was described as an advisor and go-between for D'Amato and a man who is friendly with gambling and underworld elements.

The effect of the commission ruling on the return Patterson-Johansson bout, tentatively set for next spring, was not immediately apparent. It seemed to rule out New York as a possible site. There was no indication whether the National Boxing Association, which controls boxing in other states, might follow New York's action.

Veclia, president of Rosensohn Enterprises, said he still held the contract for the bout and he expected to proceed with the promotion—under a new name and in new areas.

"We are changing the name of our organization immediately to Feature Sports Inc.," Veclia, Harlem attorney, said.

CONTROLLED BY VECLIA
Rosensohn originally was president of Rosensohn Enterprises Inc., but post-fight developments disclosed he held only one-third of the stock and the other two-thirds was controlled by Veclia.

The commission also struck at what it called underworld influences, accusing Rosensohn of accepting a \$10,000 loan from Tony Salerno, described as a "shady character" and "widely known racketeer and underworld figure," to help finance the promotion. Veclia has said that Salerno is a client of his.
