MONDAY
IN HOSPITAL - Mr. Leo Steele of Miscouche is a patient in the Prince County Hospital as the result of a car accident about eight o'clock last evening near Miscouche. It is not known if his condition is serious but he has a broken arm and chest and head injuries. How the accident happened is not clear but apparently his car sideswiped a truck and turned over. It is completely wrecked. - S.

Upwards of 400 Oddfellows and Rebekahs were converging on Charlottetown over the week-end as plans were being completed for the annual convention of the I.O.O.F. Grand Lodge of the Maritimes and Newfoundland. The convention opens here this morning. The business sessions of the Oddfellows will be held in the Y.M.C.A. while those of the Rebekahs will be in the hall at Prince of Wales College. The Grand Encampment will conduct its conference at the Oddfellows Hall.

A special grass ensilage program has been arranged for farmers by the Division of Illustration Stations in view of the increased interest being shown in grassland farming and the ensiling of grasses and clovers. Farmers interested in a grass ensilage program will have an opportunity to hear Mr. J. E. Shuh, Assistant Provincial agronomist, Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing, speak on this particular subject.

Dr. L. G. Dewar, well known O'Leary physician, has been appointed Provincial Chairman of P.E.I. Cancer Campaign which will be held the first week in September. Dr. Dewar was Chairman of Prince County last fall and did such an excellent job that his

special abilities merited for him the position of Chairman for the whole Province. Dr. Dewar, who took a special Post-Graduate Course in Public Health, is deeply interested in Cancer control. He states that "Every dollar contributed now will bring nearer the day when we will conquer Cancer." The Provincial Chairman, is now getting his organization lined up and hopes to complete the Cancer Campaign by the end of the first week in September.

TUESDAY
ENTERS APPEAL - Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy has entered an appeal, through his attorney, H. F. MacPhee, K. C., against his conviction by Judge C. St. Clair Trajnor on July 26th, last, on a charge of driving to the common danger. The appeal will be heard before the Court of Criminal Appeal and the date for the hearing of the appeal will be fixed by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell. The appealant was fined \$300 by Judge Trajnor or in lieu of payment, three months in jail.

WILD MINK SEIZED - Yesterday evening the Provincial Fish and Game Supervisor seized two wild mink on a premises at Montague. The Game Act carries a heavy penalty for having game protected by the Act in possession in close season. The mink in question were caught this summer. It is understood that Court action is pending.

CHILD INJURED - Rosemary Elliot, six-year-old girl from Waltham, Mass. spent the night in the Prince Edward Island Hospital after being struck by a car on Longworth Avenue about 3:30 yesterday afternoon. The young girl's injuries were described as negligible but she was kept in hospital for observation. Rosemary was struck by an Ontario car as she ran out from the south side of the avenue. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Elliot from Waltham who are visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Allan L. MacKay, Birchwood Street.

A resolution approving of the appointment of a Supervisor for the four City schools was passed at the regular monthly meeting of the City School Board yesterday. A committee was appointed to make enquiries regarding a qualified person to fill the position and to study the whole situation and report to the Board. The secretary reported that work in connection with the installation of an oil burning system in West Kent School would start today. Owing to the shortage of steel there has been a delay in obtaining steel for the construction of both boiler and tank but both are expected to arrive before the end of this week. Decorating the interior of three schools has been completed and work is now under way in Queen Square School.

WEDNESDAY
A very successful year with considerable increases in membership was reported at the opening sessions of the Rebekah Assembly, which took place at the Prince of Wales College Auditorium yesterday. At the morning session which began at 9:30 A.M., the President, Mrs. Anna Snow presided. The President's report, announcing the institution of two new lodges during the year, was read. The past presidents of the association were brought to the centre of the floor and thanked by the President for the assistance and advice which she has received from them in the past three years.

Four agricultural experts from India and Pakistan arrived in the Province by plane shortly after noon yesterday and commenced their two day inspection visit of agricultural facilities and farms in the Province. The four men are Dr. J.K. Dube and Mr. H. Kainit Raj of India, and Dr. S. Heydayatullah and Mr. A.M. Sial of Pakistan. Dr. Heydayatullah is Director of Agriculture for East Bengal while Mr. Sial holds the portfolio of Minister of Agriculture and Education for the State of Khalpur. They are members of an agricultural mission visiting Canada under provisions of the Technical Co-operation Program of the Colombo Plan for Economic Development of South and South-East Asia.

The Annual Session of the Grand Encampment I.O.O.F. of the Maritimes and Newfoundland opened yesterday morning at 9:30 in Odd Fellows Hall. The attendance was above average and a number of new members were added to the roll by having the Encampment Degree conferred on them. The Grand Patriarch E.H. Oxner presided. Reports were submitted by the various committees as well as by the grand officers which showed that a year of progress had been enjoyed. Finances were in good shape and a substantial gain in membership was reported. The system of visitation adopted last year, which was a cooperative agreement with other grand bodies, was reported as successful, and it is the intention to carry out this same plan next term if this cooperative agreement can be arranged. Otherwise, the Encampment will work out a plan of its own which will be successful.

Of special interest in connection with the recent visit of Chief Flora MacLeod of MacLeod is the fact that the scholarly editor of the Clan MacLeod Magazine, the Rev. Donald MacKinnon, is at present visiting here with his daughter, Miss Mairi MacKinnon, who is an honour graduate in history from Edinburgh University for the past year. Mr. MacKinnon's wife died eighteen years ago. The Clan MacLeod Magazine is published once a year in Edinburgh, and is now in its sixteenth year. It was published all during the war, and circulates to MacLeods and others interested in Highland history and tradition throughout the world. Mr. MacKinnon knows of only two other Clan magazines now in existence. These are the Clan Munro and the Clan Stewart publications. Other magazines of this kind have been started, but lasted only a few issues.

Sixteen Toronto schoolboys on an eighteen day tour of Eastern Canada arrived in the City yesterday evening for a one day visit to the Province on a tour sponsored by the Toronto Board of

Education and the T. Eaton Company. They were welcomed at the railway station by His Worship Mayor E. Earle MacDonald and Mr. Jack Morris of the Travel Bureau. Following their arrival, the boys and Mr. John Sage, teacher at Malvern College, Toronto, were driven around the City and the surrounding areas before being guests of the City at dinner.

THURSDAY
The death occurred early yesterday morning in Boston, Mass. of Mr. John Noonan, who was the proprietor of the Borden Inn in Borden. Mr. Noonan was compelled to retire from active duties a short time ago due to ill health. He then went to Boston in the hope of successful treatment.

Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet issued a warning to speeding truck drivers yesterday in the Queen's County Court, and stated that if stiff fines did not check the speeding he would begin to cancel the driving licenses of all such offenders. The Magistrate gave the warning and imposed a fine of \$25 and costs or 30 days in jail on a resident of Dover, King's County, R.C.M.P. officer told the court the offender, was driving at 70 miles an hour shortly before being apprehended. The Magistrate in passing sentence said that the maximum speed in this Province for any truck weighing 5,000 lbs or over was 30 miles an hour.

ADMITTED TO BAR - Mr. George Bruce MacDonald of Summerside was admitted to the bar of Nova Scotia on Tuesday. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan MacDonald, Summerside, and graduated from Dalhousie University in May of this year. For the last few years while Mr. MacDonald was attending college in Halifax, his wife and two children resided there with him. He left yesterday for Aylmer, Ont. where he will take six weeks of basic training prior to entering the R.C.A.F. in the legal branch. Mrs. MacDonald and children will stay in Summerside while her husband is taking his basic training. - S.

The freighter "Lago" docked at the Marine Wharf, Summerside, about nine o'clock yesterday morning and immediately commenced loading a cargo consisting of 1,800 cords of pulp wood for Calais, France. This will make a small dent in what must be the biggest pile of pulp wood in the Province. This is located in a field adjacent to the main highway about a half mile west of Summerside. It has been accumulated by Messrs. George Brooks and Leonce Arsenault and it is estimated that there is 6,500 cords there. Six more ships are expected during the summer and fall to take it all away before winter.

The possibilities of retired teachers receiving credit towards their pensions for teaching services in other provinces than the one in which their retirement benefits effective were briefly explored yesterday at the 30th Conference of the Canadian Teachers Association held at The Charlottetown. The question arose in the Supersession Committee Report presented by Dr. L. Bernice MacNaughton, past president of the Federation. Although there was disagreement among delegates as to how the problem could best be solved, it was the consensus that a teacher spending a lifetime in the profession should be entitled to a full pension even though some of the teaching years might have been spent in different provinces.

A link in the chain of an almost forgotten past has been uncovered at Stanhope along the north shore of Queen's County. A cemetery, age undetermined, but believed to be one of the oldest burial places of early British settlers in this Province, is today the source of much interest and speculation. Hidden from the eyes of visitors by trees and undergrowth for more than half a century, was uncovered by workmen in the National Park area in the course of clearing and thinning the brush. At least 140 years old, the cemetery contains the remains of some

of the first settlers of the Stanhope and Covehead regions along with a number of American sailors who were drowned off the North Shore during a storm in 1851.

FRIDAY
Delegates to the 30th Conference of the Canadian Teachers Federation yesterday got two welcome breaks in the routine of hard work which has obtained since the conference opened. At the close of the general session yesterday afternoon they were all guests of the Ontario Teachers Federation at an afternoon tea held in the writing room of The Charlottetown. A light lunch to help sustain the delegates until dinner, was also served. In the evening a large number were guests of the Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers of Quebec at dinner at the beautiful Dalvay Hotel. The teachers piled into two large buses provided for the occasion and had an enjoyable ride to the North Shore beach. They were all greatly interested in the hotel and its history.

Mr. Fred Bell of Summerside has been appointed Secretary-Manager of the Prince Edward Island Potato Growers Association, it was announced and confirmed as the somewhat turbulent annual meeting of the association yesterday. The meeting was nearly a repetition of the high-spirited meeting held in March, 1950, when the Association voted to be incorporated under the Co-op Services Act. That vote was repealed at a later meeting last year. The fireworks at yesterday's meeting developed between the factions who desired to join with the Co-operative Association and those who wished to continue doing business through the Association as it had stood for the past number of years. The issue was brought about through the resignation of Mr. D.D. Reid, former secretary-manager. The majority favored appointing a new manager, while others favored a directors' directive to work with Island Co-operative Services for a year. The Oddfellows and Rebekahs of the Maritimes and Newfoundland continued their business sessions yesterday under weather conditions almost perfect. This brought a large attendance to all branches. The Rebekah Assembly concluded their sessions and have adjourned for another year. The Grand Lodge opened its first regular session in the Y.M.C.A. at 9 a.m. This session was presided over by Grand Master Hiscock with a large attendance of delegates. The first business was appointing committees to carry on the business consigned to them at the session, after which the Grand Masters of Ontario, Quebec and Maine were reported awaiting admission as visitors. A committee was appointed to introduce these visitors and escort them into the Grand Lodge. They were later called upon to address the Grand Lodge which they did and extended the greetings from their several jurisdictions which was duly responded to by the Grand Master. Later a delegation composed of representatives from the various other branches of the Order was received and duly welcomed also. Several of them responded to the request for an address by which the greetings from the other order members were exchanged.

The opening of the "Jones Highway" to Georgetown was officially performed last evening at 6:30 by Hon. Donald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works when, on cutting the ribbon, he declared the highway open for traffic, and brought to a culmination sixteen years of anticipation for the residents of the community who have worked zealously for the construction of a main traffic route to this important centre. In his remarks Mr. MacKinnon stressed the great importance of this highway as a vital link connecting with one of the finest sea-ports in the Province. He pointed out that he foresaw a great development of the community as a shipping centre serving the whole of King's County, and predicted that its tourist trade would swell to large numbers in a few years because of the presence of the highway. He emphasized the fact that Georgetown was an ideal winter terminal for a ferry service to Pictou, and stressed the importance of such a winter connection.
