Many Veteran Showmen In Limelight Still At Fair

Another big livestock show, the 61st in the history of the Provincial Exhibition, was wound up yesterday as exhibitors returned to their homes with their livestock and their ribbons after participating in what has become one of Eastern Canada's finest livestock shows.

For in both quality and quantity the big show has increased over the years as can be attested by the record number of entries each year and the stepped up tempo of livestock buyers on exhibition week. Deserving of most of the credit for the success of the show are the veteran exhibitors from across the Province, who have year after year, entered their livestock to build up the exhibit to what it is today.

Very often many of these exhibitors went home without winning the championships, for there are only a certain number of these; but always they came back again to form the backbone of the show and sometimes win the coveted top prizes. A review of the exhibitors of the past twenty years shows that many of the men who were in the show business two decades ago are still in it today while a number of new names have been added.

Some of these men have stood out like Babe Ruth in baseball while others have gone like Lou Gehrig, nearly as great a ballplayer as Ruth but because he played on the same team was overshadowed by the greatness and the publicity given to Babe.

Among those who have played their parts in the livestock show are men like Premier J. Walter Jones, Edison B. Mutch, Almon Boswall, Guy Rodd, Cecil J. Stewart, A. MacRae and Sons; the Clarks from New Wiltshire; Alison Profit and Coby Lewis of Freetown.

To these names can be added many others including Stead Bros. from Brookley, George Boswell, Frenchtort; A. H. Boswall, Marshfield; the Stewarts from Dunstaffnage; Earl Irgs, Mount Herbert; John Lewis, Freetown; Alex Hamilton, New Perth; the Sandersons from North River and Lincoln Dewar, New Perth.

Other men who played prominent roles in the shows were Charles Willis, Kingston; Frank MacAulay, Souris Line Road; Tweedy Bros, Vernon; Oswald J. Newsome and Son, Clyde River; Dr. J. P. Lantz, Gavin Reid, Montague; Reid Underhay, Bay Fortune; Willard Prowse, Brackley; Hayden Brothers, Cherry Valley; Miller Henderson, New Wiltshire; James G. MacLean, Lot 18; Albert Younker, Winsloe; and Mrs. J. F. Easton and Fred Coles, New Wiltshire.

Some of these breeders have ceased to exhibit in the last few years but their places have been taken by exhibitors like Lewis Bros., York; John and Mary Dupasquier; Keith-Boswall; R. R. Bell; Col. F. I. Andrew; James Vickerson, and George MacMillan.

Some of the exhibitors like Dr. Lantz, Alison Profit, and Cecil Stewart have carried a double load as they were directors of the Exhibition. For years Mr. Stewart won top honors in the Holstein classes and in the horse judging. He has not shown any cattle the past couple of years but his horses still take top honors.

The late George Boswell of Frenchtort was another of the pillars of the livestock show as he showed in the sheep, swine and Ayrshire classes. His animals are still being shown by his son George under the name of Estate of George Boswell.

Death Today Of Mr. T. P. Cullen

Mr. Timothy P. Cullen of Sherwood and Charlottetown died in the Charlottetown Hospital this morning about one o'clock after a short illness. He was 87 years of age.

Born in Hope River in November, 1863, Mr. Cullen was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Cullen. He moved to Sherwood in 1905 where he operated a dairy farm until his retirement about eight years ago. Since that time he has lived in Charlottetown.

Growers Warned Against Used Potato Bag Menace

"With our potato harvesting now getting under way it is very necessary that all growers and handlers of potatoes take warning that the use of imported second-hand potato bags is prohibited by legislation under the Bacterial Ring Rot Act," states Mr. S. G. Peplin, manager of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board. He calls attention to Regulation No. 12 of the Act which states: "No second-hand bags previously used outside the Province of Prince Edward Island shall be used in this Province for potatoes unless said bags have been properly disinfected." Incidentally there are no commercial facilities anywhere which can properly disinfect potato bags.

Isley To Inquire Into War Claims

OTTAWA, Aug. 17 - (CP) - Chief Justice J. L. Isley of Nova Scotia has been appointed a commissioner to inquire into Second World War claims and has already begun his job in Ottawa, the Secretary of State's Department announced today. The announcement said that Chief Justice Isley, one-time Federal Finance Minister, will act in an advisory capacity and will not adjudicate individual claims. He will report to the Government on the best method of dealing with war claims. It is expected that after his report is made another commission or commissions will be appointed to consider the individual claims.

The Government, it was learned, expects to have about \$12,000,000 available for distribution to claims resulting, for example, from deaths in prison camps, loss or damage to property in enemy countries, personal injury here or abroad, and mistreatment of former internees or prisoners of war.

A small portion of this \$12,000,000 would be money coming from the liquidation of German assets in neutral countries by the Allies. Canada's share of these reparations is about 3 1/2 per cent of money realized. Other money would come from the sale of real estate and other assets held by citizens of former enemy countries in Canada.

Mr. Isley likely will deal with claims against Japan, Germany, Italy, Hungary and Roumania.

On Borrowed Time - GENEVA, N. Y., Aug. 17 - (AP) - Six-year-old Dennis Madigan whose heart stopped beating for five minutes Wednesday, lived or "borrowed" time-but only for a day the little boy died last night, 24 hours after his heart had stopped during an operation to correct a crossed-eye condition. Surgeons revived him with a heart massage.
