## Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, April 23—One must always have some reason ready to explain stock market movements but more often than not, the explanation is in the market itself. It is true, that there has been a good deal of disturbing foreign and domestic political news news has developed at various times within the past year without bringing severe sell-offs in stock. Recent weakness has probably been largely due to the fact that stocks have advanced for a long time without correction and at the same time the recent increase in margin demands has hurt buying power to an extent. How far such a correction movement in stocks goes is always uncertain. Money particularly is such the case at the moment as the market is under new conditions imposed by the new margin requirements, for which there is no precedent. Cur guess is that the reaction will run somewhat higher. Our strong belief, is that the reaction is a reaction in a bull market not the

start of a long and serious decline in prices.

### GRAIN

(Canadian Press)

CHICAGO, April 24—In nervously shifting trade, wheat scored gains today.

Speculators were wary of the selling side of the wheat market because of persistent dearth of moisture southwest, and owing to lack of response at Liverpool to price downturns here. Estimates were current that the Canadian Government Wheat Board was holdings of but 137,000,000 bushels at the present time.

Wheat closed firm, 3-8 to 7-8 above yesterday's finish, May 10 1-8 to 1-4, July 9 3-4 to 7-8, c 10 3-8 off to 1-4 up, May 61 1-4 to 3-8, oats unchanged to 1-8 lower, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 10 cents.

WINNIPEG, April 24—A buying flurry that lifted wheat prices to their best levels of the day shortly before the close was the only feature to today's session of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange. The close was 5-8 to 1-2 cent higher.

Late-session confirmation of the continued drought in the United States winter-wheat area encouraged purchases after most traders had withheld commitments throughout the day. May closed at 82 1-2, July 83 and October 84 1-8 cents.

Earlier, values had held quietly firm supported by export sale of 500,000 bushels of Canadian wheat. Trading volum. in the aggregate was light.

Coarse grains prices firmed with wheat in the late dealings.

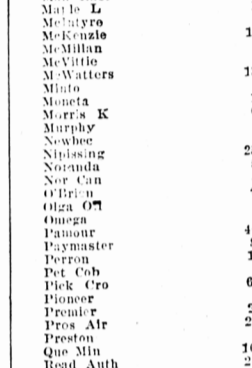

## The SNAPSHOT GUILD

TOYLAND PICTURES



"Toyland, Toyland, beautiful girl and boyland. Once you pass its portals, you may never return again."

BUT could you not return again, in a manner of speaking, if there had been preserved in a snapshot album pictures of yourself and the toys that gave you pleasure when you were actually one of the inhabitants of that enchanting land of Victor Herbert's beloved operetta? Do you ever like to recall the teddy bear, the drum, the jack-in-the-box, the doll or the little tea set that were your favorite playthings as a child and which eventually went the way of all toys, or won't you confess to being that sentimental? Well, in any case, if somebody had taken snapshots of them for you and kept them, the chances are that you would get a "kick" in looking at them today. Certainly your older relatives would. Children's toys are part of family history.

The timely point is that another Christmas having passed and new toys for the youngsters having made their appearance in the house, you should not neglect to take pictures of them before they disappear. Make shots of the children with their toys and of the toys alone. If you can snap the children playing with the toys without their knowing you are taking the picture, you will have natural little studies

which are usually the most interesting. But you will want some good close-ups in order to show the toys plainly. These you will have to pose though they need not look posed. For such pictures you need a portable attachment for your camera. This is a simple supplementary lens which slips over your present camera lens and permits you to take the picture within arm's length and thus obtain a larger image. The cost of this extra lens is less than a dollar.

Some of the toys can be taken alone in amusing groups—the doll at the miniature piano, the monkey riding the little stuffed horse, or the elephant tipping over the toy train. The table top is the best place to set up these story-telling situations. Use a cardboard background, dark or light, depending on the color of the toys. Experiment, too, with a mirror as a background. A short time exposure will be needed with the ordinary camera. At night you can effectively use two or three floodlight bulbs, also inexpensively, and control your lights and shadows.

If you will carry out this idea with the toys of this Christmas, and faithfully keep up the habit each year while the children are growing up, you will have a treasure of memory pictures which you and they will always cherish—a picture record of the happy days in Toyland.
