At Peterborough, Ont., on the 21st, the Right Rev. Dr. Jamot was installed as first Bishop of the new Roman Catholic diocese of Peterborough.

The training ship "Charybdis" has arrived in Halifax. Captain McElhinney of the "Northern Light" was in charge of her during the passage.

The Halifax city marshal has been notified from London, Eng., to look out for a Russian who stole seventy-five thousand dollars worth of bonds in that city.

The Hon. J. C. Aikins, formerly Minister of Inland Revenue, has been appointed Lieut. Governor of Manitoba, the duties of which position he will assume upon the expiration of Mr. Cauchon's term of office on the 8th of October.

The commerce of the sea is carried by 12,000 steamers and 100,000 sailing vessels, whose tonnage amounts to over 20,000,000 tons.

Good judges say she is one of the strongest and best vessels of her class ever built in the Island. She is also remarkable as being the only vessel built at the Cape for many years.

An Ottawa despatch says: The duty on steel boiler plates has been fixed at 12 1/2 per cent ad valorem, the same as that paid on boiler plate. Sewing machines imported into Canada shall be appraised and entered at the price at which they are sold at the place of manufacture by the agents of the manufacturers, and not at the prices at which the manufacturers supply such agents.

The Wreck of a Steamship.

New York, Sept. 24.—The steamship Lepanto, Rogers, arrived to-day from Hull, reports on September 21st at 10.15 p. m. collided with the steamer Edam which dragged right across the Lepanto's bow at the same time swinging around to the westward. Her pumps were all working at the time. A passenger said after getting clear of the steamer we stopped our engines and immediately sent way three boats with all our crew and officers, to render assistance. At 11.30 p. m. the boats of the Edam arrived alongside with passengers and crew, who were at once embarked. Soon after one of our own boats returned, bringing the chief officers of the Edam, quarter master steward and passengers. The Lepanto was considerably damaged, but a careful examination showed she was making no water. We started the engines, running very slowly on proceeding, steered west, and shortly passed through the debris of a foundered steamer which had, from all appearances, blown up or foundered. The passengers, 21 in number, and the crew, numbering 52 of the Edam, were made as comfortable as possible. Third engineer and assistant engineer of the Edam were lost.

The Edam belonged to Northerlands Royal Mail Line, and sailed from Jersey City for Amsterdam, September 20th.
