KEEP IN TRIM

What Helps Overweights Stay On Slimming Course?

Making up your mind to reduce is the first step toward successful slimming. No doubt you have started a diet, many times, but couldn't stay with it. The second or third hungry day you went back to your regular ways of eating and to the food habits which, unfortunately, have proved to be too fattening.

Supposing you were to read in newspaper headlines that at long last, science had discovered the way to eat to control weight, without going hungry, or feeling weak or depressed? The news of this wonder diet by which you could lose 2 to 4 pounds a week would spread with the momentum of a

new hope. You would start the diet at the very next meal. All right? ... do exactly that.

IT'S HERE NOW

Science has discovered the way to control weight. The new knowledge of nutrition has taken the hazards and the hunger out of dieting to reduce. A scientifically planned reducing diet provides every essential but calories generously. Calories can be limited, for there are plenty of calories stored in the excess fat.

While reducing, physiological processes go on as usual. If you shortchange yourself nutritionally, the upkeep and repair of body cells will be shoddy. Dieters, think of your body as being your personal house which you want to keep in a fine state of repair for the better part of a century. To do so, daily fare must furnish the nutrients the body needs to make good the wear and tear of daily living.

PROTEIN WITHDRAWN
Perhaps an explanation about what happens when a reducing diet is deficient in protein should be included at this point. When daily menus furnish too little good quality protein, protein will be withdrawn from the body's own muscle and softer tissues and vital organs. Actual weight loss may be greater, but such reducing is dangerous, for not only will body repair work be slipshod, but you can lose your bounce and vigor.

The backbone of protective meals, regardless of calories, is built around the Basic 7: Lean meat, fish or fowl; milk, skim milk or buttermilk or cheese; eggs; green leafy or yellow vegetables; juice, plus 1 or 2 other fruits; whole grain or enriched bread or cereal—amount depending on caloric restriction; and butter or margarine. These protective foods furnish protein, minerals and vitamins which nourish the tissues while you lose excess fat.
