

# S'ide Legion Branch To Join The "Country Club"

With the payment of \$1,000.00 to the Prince County Hospital, approved at the regular meeting last evening, the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion will become a special member of the Prince County Hospital "Country Club" and will place a scroll on the plaque in the lobby of the hospital, which will commemorate the names of 103 comrades who were killed in action in the two world wars, and in the Korean war.

The Legion will also endeavour to make an annual contribution to the hospital on this basis, until the sum of \$10,000 per name has been paid for each of the 103 names commemorated there, by totalling at its conclusion to the sum of \$10,300.00.

The resolution was moved by Charles Hojan and seconded by Roland Phillipson.

An increase of 50 members during the past month has increased the membership of the Summerside Branch of the Canadian Legion to an all time high of 524 members, believed to be the largest membership of any Island branch at the present time, and an attendance of 201 members at the regular meeting last evening set a record never before equalled in the 25 year history of the branch.

Reviewing a project which the branch began in 1952, the meeting went on record as urging the Federal Government to again investigate the feasibility of inaugurating street delivery mails in the town of Summerside at the earliest possible time.

It was pointed out that in 1952 there were more than 2000 householders, while the number of post office boxes is only 864, leaving more than 1,100 families to be served through general del-

very, resulting in many inconveniences. It was also pointed out that a delivery service would mean employment for at least six additional persons.

A total of 55 new Legion members were inducted at last night's meeting in a program conducted by Victor Sanderson, Roland Phillips, and Lester Jenkins.

Leading all other participants in a membership campaign was Frank Savidant who achieved the remarkable accomplishment of recruiting 30 new members for the branch.

On motion of Lester Jenkins, the membership approved a donation of \$50.00 to the Provincial Command to help defray the expenses of providing the children from the Orphanages with a cruise on the M.V. Abegweit last Sunday.

In this contest, where there must be a community project such as improvement of a church, hall, cemetery or school, the value of the work done on the project may be determined easily. In evaluating other improvements made in the community as a whole, the judges had great difficulty. The top award went to Highfield Community where the Church was turned around, enlarged, placed on a new foundation, newly shingled and painted, provided with new steps, new windows, new doors, new railing and a new spire. The grounds were levelled and seeded to form a lawn and trees were planted. Outstanding improvements were made in the community. Farm home buildings were repaired and painted and old useless buildings were torn down. Lanes were widened and graded. Old trees were removed and trees, shrubs and flowers planted. New fences were erected and painted, roadsides cleaned up and weeds and grass kept trimmed.
