TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] The Franchise Bill. LONDON, May 20. The Franchise Bill was considered by the House of Commons to-day in committee of the whole. Lord Randolph Churchill strongly disagreed with the amendment of Mr. Broderick, Conservative, to exclude Ireland from the operations of the Bill. Lord Randolph expressed the hope that the conservatives would not alienate the good opinion of the Irish by supporting Broderick's amendment. The amendment was rejected by 332 to 137. Lord Randolph Churchill and several other conservatives and all the Parnellites voted for the Government.

Extension of Time. WASHINGTON, May 20. The Senate to-day passed a bill extending to August 1886, the time to commence laying the cable by Act of August 8th, 1882. The parties interested in the bill are mainly citizens of New York and Philadelphia.

Serious Riot. MATAMORAS, Mexico, May 20. A serious riot occurred yesterday between the people and government troops at Linares, about 200 miles from here. Fears are entertained that a revolution is started.

Outbreak Expected. OTTAWA, May 20. Regina despatches say that fifty-six mounted police, with cannon, under command of Col. Hockmer, left to-day for Qu'Appelle anticipating an Indian outbreak.

An Historical Bluenose on Wall Street.

Among the historic characters of Wall Street is A. W. Dimock. Under some circumstances his failure would not have excited any surprise. He has failed before on more than one occasion. Bright, shrewd, and possessing large ideas, he has made and lost three or four fortunes already. The suspension of his house to-day was, however, a surprise to every one. Since the day President Garfield was shot, Mr. Dimock has been a vigorous consistent bear, and, in consequence, both he and his customers made immense amounts of money. It appears, however, that as far as Mr. Dimock is concerned, his profits have been absorbed to a large extent in the Banker's and Merchant's Telegraph company. Mr. Dimock said this evening that his liabilities were in the neighborhood of \$3,000,000 and that his assets were between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000 when, on Wednesday night, he decided to suspend. The assets consisted of United States government bonds, railroad securities, and bonds and stock of the Bankers' and Merchants'. The fall of price in the latter stock lessened the value of the assets somewhat. Dimock, who is a native of Nova Scotia, came into Wall street as a clerk, and his first partnership was with H. G. Marquand, former president of the Iron Mountain railroad company, under the title of Marquand & Dimock. The junior partner accumulated money rapidly, but his tremendous ventures were disapproved by his associates. On one occasion the old gentleman said to him that he didn't like the magnitude of the operations Dimock was conducting. "I want you to understand," replied Mr. Dimock, "that I've got more money in the concern than you have." In consequence of this difference of opinion the firm dissolved.—N. Y. Despatch.

A By-Law for allowing a rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Income for the Current Year.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: 1. A discount at the rate of two and one-half per cent. shall be allowed to all Tax-payers who shall, on or before the Thirtieth day of June, A. D. 1884, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Incomes. (Signed) DAVID R. M. HOOPER, Mayor of City of Charlottetown. [L. S.] A. A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of an Assessment on Real Estate and Income in the City of Charlottetown.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows: The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1884, and ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1884, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one cent and one tenth of a cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate within the City of Charlottetown, according to the valuation of such Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in their valuation rolls of such Real Estate, made, and duly returned by them, on the ninth day of April, A. D. 1884. 2. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1884, and ending 31st day of December, A. D. 1884, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-half of one per cent on every dollar of the amount of the net yearly Income. Salaries, or receipts of all persons, partnerships and corporations, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City, in their valuation rolls of such Income, made, and duly returned by them, on the ninth day of April, A.
