had gone uncontested, about a dozen Provincial Marketing Boards would have lost power to set export regulations.
The Agricultural Products Marketing Act was passed so that Provincial Farm Marketing Boards may be empowered to regulate sales of their products in other provinces and in other countries. Under the constitution this type of regulation is normally the prerogative of the central government and Parliament.

The Federal Government view, expressed in preliminary argument already filed with the Supreme Court of Canada, is that the P.E.I. court "erred" in its judgment. It contends that parliament has a measure of control over the Provincial Board.
While it was true that the Provincial Board depends on the Provincial Legislature and Government for its existence, it also depends on Parliament and the Federal statute for its powers in the export field.

In this way Parliament and the Federal Government actually retain control of the Board on export trade. If at any time the central government found that the Board was not abiding by the terms of the licence granted to it, export powers could be revoked.

The Federal Government will be supported by the Canadian Federation of Agriculture — spokesman for some 400,000 organized farmers — and the governments of P. E. I., New Brunswick, Saskatchewan and possibly British Columbia. Other Provinces have not indicated whether they will participate in the case.
