THE GAPS ON THE NORTH SHORE BEING RAPIDLY FILLED—GOOD PROGRESS IN THE MOUNTAINS.

On the receipt of news of the out break in the Northwest, Mr. Van Horne Vice-President of the C. P. R., gave to the Government a list of the breaks along the North Shore section, with the miles of track laid and the length of the gaps.

In the mountain section there were, on the 6th inst., 156 miles on which the grading had not been completed, though work was progressing rapidly along the whole of it.

A New York Horror.

SEVERAL PERSONS BURIED BY FALLING HOUSES.

Eight five-story houses in 62nd street, near 10th avenue, New York fell in on the afternoon of the 13th, burying the men employed there. Up to 4.30 in the evening ten persons had been taken out from the ruins.

At midnight on the 13th search for bodies is still progressing. One man has been taken from the ruins alive but badly injured. It is now thought there are not more than four persons—two stair builders and two plumbers—in the ruins, and that the number at first supposed was exaggerated.

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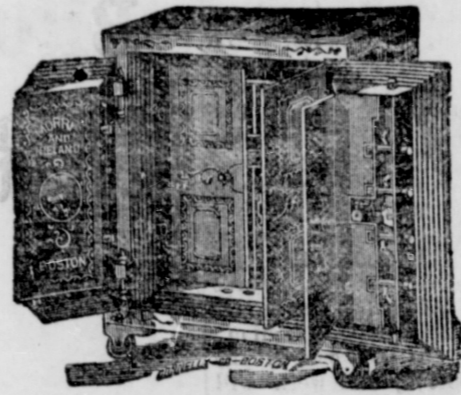
