Landerville of the Ontario Supreme Court, which the federal government made public Monday.

Now Mr. Rand, a retired justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, is embarking on another job, sorting out for the Ontario government the politically-prickly problem of the use of court injunctions in labor disputes.

The shift of mental gears probably won't tax the veteran jurist, turned troubleshooter. In a notable career he has managed such diversities as setting up an internationally-recognized system of handling union memberships and founding and heading a university law school.

BROKE DEADLOCK

In the public mind, he is best known as the author of the "Rand formula," an inventive procedure employed to break a deadlock when he was mediating a 1943 strike of auto workers. It is the now-familiar process of non-union workers in a plant being called on to pay union dues but not necessarily to join a union. Under different names, it now is used widely outside Canada.

Oddly enough, the judge whose name is soundly linked to labor measures had a distaste for the trend to the judiciary getting tangled in labor disputes—he thought they should stay on the bench—and that was the last time in his 16 years on the top bench that he got so involved.

He was busy enough otherwise. He wrote 600 decisions, some regarded as legal classics. Not all were the routine decisions; he was a formidable dissenter.

In the sum, he is regarded as in the very top handful of Canadian judges.

WAS ON UN BODY

One extra-judicial job that he took on with a will during his 1943-50 court period was as Canada's representative on the United Nations special committee on Palestine. He helped pro-

duce the majority report that led to the creation of the state of Israel.

Since being retired automatically when he hit the 75-year age limit for judges in 1959, he has continued in demand. The University of Western Ontario enlisted him to set up a law school, and he headed that until he "retired" again in 1964. Meanwhile he conducted a one-man royal commission on the status of the coal industry for the federal government.

It all served to make him a natural for the Landerville inquiry, as burdensome a task as ever was served upon a Canadian jurist.

DUG DEEPLY

Mr. Rand dug long and deeply into a financial and ethical skein involved in the Ontario judge's \$117,000 worth of stock from Northern Ontario Natural Gas Company after it received a franchise at Sudbury while he was mayor there. He sat at Toronto, Vancouver, Sudbury and Ottawa.

He then worked for four months on Canada's first commission report on whether a superior court judge was fit for office.

That done, it appeared he would be ready to get in a summer vacation on the New Brunswick shore near his native Moncton.

But the Ontario government announced August 19 he would undertake the strikes-injunctions inquiry for the province. With labor unions on heat for an end to the injunction process, it looks like another busy period of retirement for the indefatigable Mr. Rand.

LONDON TIMES Views Strike Grave Threat

LONDON (CP)—The Times says in an editorial that Canada's rail strike is "a grave threat to the country's economy."

The pressure for the strikes that have hit Canada this year has come from the rank and file of union members, the paper says.

"The trouble cannot be attributed to a few awkward union leaders. It is rather that the average Canadian worker is aware that his country is enjoying its sixth consecutive year of economic boom, that the current trend is more and more towards a unified pattern for the North American economies, and that he is nevertheless earning significantly less than his counterpart in the United States."

While the Canadian government has warned of the dangers of inflation, "their efforts at restraint have not been helped by the uncertain position of the union leaders, many of whom have been losing touch with their younger and more radical followers."

"The main problem, as so often in Canada nowadays, can be traced to weakness of the federal government."

"Various restrictive measures were applied in the budget last March. But they do not appear to have been successful so far."

"This is partly because the government has been less stringent with their own than with private spending and partly because they are in a poor position to guide the economy."

"It is another of the drawbacks of transferring the balance of power towards the provincial administrations."

CONTRACT BRIDGE

North dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

North: ♠K6, ♥K863, ♦K7, ♣9752

West: ♠A8742, ♥5, ♦J1084, ♣Q63

East: ♠1083, ♥QJ973, ♦A962, ♣K

South: ♠QJ5, ♥104, ♦A933, ♣A1084

The bidding:

North East South West

1 ♠ Pass 2 ♠ Pass

3 ♠ Pass 3 NT Pass

Opening lead—four of spades.

I rather like this hand which comes from the chapter "Help From Partner" in Marshall Miles' book *All Fifty-Two Cards*. As described by Miles:

"West led the four of spades, upon which the K-8-5, were played. A club was led to the trumper. West went right in with the queen and returned the jack of diamonds. Dum'ny played small but East won with the ace and returned a spade. Declarer then scored ten tricks. Let's listen to the comments.

"WEST: 'Why the panic button? What was that ace-of-diamonds play for?'

"EAST: 'I thought they had

nine tricks if I ducked—five clubs, two hearts, a spade and a diamond. My only chance to beat the hand was to find you with five spades to the A-J.'

"WEST: 'If my spades were ready to run, and I didn't want you to duck the diamond, I wouldn't have led the jack. I'd have led the eight or something like that.'

"EAST: 'You couldn't be sure the spades would run, even if you had the A-J-x-x, since I might have just had two.'

"WEST: 'Yes, but I would have played you for three if necessary to beat the hand. The jack of diamonds meant I was willing for you to duck with the ace is logical.'

"As is often the case, both defenders were at fault. West's comment about leading a diamond other than the jack if he wanted East to step right up with the ace is logical.

"However, West could have made things much easier for his partner by ducking the second round of ♠. Then East would know that declarer had a fly in four club tricks, and he would have no excuse in hop up with the ace of diamonds. The principle is that you should hold off as long as possible if you know that declarer must develop the suit, in order to give partner a count."

Mail Pile-Up Is Reported In Montreal

MONTREAL (CP)—Mail has piled up to some extent at the general post office in Montreal since the start of the rail strike but post officials say the pile-up is not critical.

"Let's say the situation is not very normal," said one post office spokesman.

The current backlog in Montreal, he said, is made up mainly of parcels that were addressed to areas far from this city, such as British Columbia.

The backlog parcels arrived at the post office Friday morning, some hours before the national rail walkout began.

The post office in Montreal is not accepting parcel post or any

Persons wishing to send such mail outside the province must truck it to a designated point in any of the five areas into which the country outside Quebec has been divided.

The Montreal spokesman said there is some delay in the delivery of first class mail.
