Opera soloists were Rev. John Kelly, Gwen Patterson and David Hall.

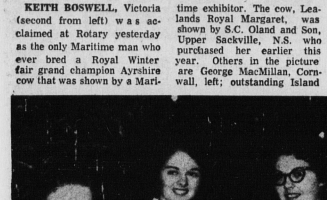
The program included carols from Germany, France, Czechoslovakia and Latin America.

need for expansion to continue to serve increasing numbers of members and clients.

After considerable study the conclusion that the complexity of the program required the erection of a large shopping centre or mall required assistance from a professional organization.

Subsequently a proposal was placed before the executive of the association by Schurman's which following complete study was accepted. As a result work on the centre, expected to cost approximately \$2,000,000, is now set underway either late February or early March, with the target date for completion tentatively set for late August 12 TO 15 STORES.

An outline of the plans for the proposed centre, Mr. Gebart stated that the retail shopping space will comprise approximately 75,000 square feet and including the three principal leaseholders, will include 12 to 15 stores, covering every phase of the retail trade.

The space occupied by the Co-op retail store, located at the southeast corner of the complex, will cover some 15,000 square feet, almost twice as much as the present Queen Street store.

## Award Winning Islanders Honored By City Rotary

Sylvia won the reserve title this year at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto; Ann was the first 4H Club member in his- tory to win the world title when she took it in 1961. Their father won the world seed potato championships and one reserve world championship to the Island in recent years.

Neil Matheson, provincial farm editor of The Guardian and The Evening Patriot was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of Rotary at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday when he spoke on the achievement of 20 prominent rural residents, who were present as honored guests.

As each of the guests were introduced by the chairman, Mr. Justice R. Bell, a citation explained how honor and distinction had been brought to the recipient and the province through awards won in provincial, Maritime, Canada-wide and even world competition in agriculture and kindred activities.

Mr. Matheson in his address elaborated more fully on some of the awards, based on his ring-side observations at the various fairs.

In concluding, the speaker said "the time has come when Canada's Department of Agriculture people across the country should take a long, hard look at best grading regulations."

"I have talked to agricultural fieldmen and meat graders from Charlottetown to Edmonton and have found general agreement that the present Red and Blue brand requirements are impractical. These two top grades call for such a high degree of fat that large portions have to be trimmed off retail cuts which many housewives will accept."

Mr. Matheson continued "It costs the farmer or beef feeder good money to put this extra fat on the animal. It seems impractical on the face of it that it has to be trimmed off before the average consumer will accept it."

The speaker was introduced by the chairman and thanked by co-chairman James Horby, President Andrew Likely congratulated the distinguished visitors on behalf of Rotary and deemed it a great honor to have them present.

Keith Boswell, a veteran farmer with many "firsts" to his credit, expressed appreciation as the sentiment of all assembled to receive the hospitality of Rotary.

Each of the visitors was presented with a gift as a memento of the occasion.
