## OBITUARY.

Died at Murray Harbor South, on the 12th of January last, Samuel McLeod, in the 74th year of his age. He was born in Isle of Skye Scotland. He came with his parents to P. E. I. when 4 years of age, and lived at Orwell for sometime then went to live in Charlottetown where he married. He came to Murray Harbor South about 46 years ago. Mr. McLeod was a man of more than ordinary intelligence, was an elder for 30 years in the congregation founded by and ministered to by the late Rev. Donald MacDonald, a very remarkable man in his day whose memory is still cherished by a large number of people in this province. Mr. McLeod was Colporteur for two years, and during the last 16 years of his life was deprived of his sight. Although during the years he was unable to read the word of God for himself his knowledge of Scripture was clear and extensive, and he could freely quote large portions of the same from memory. He was twice married, left a widow, one brother, an honored elder in the congregation of Orwell, two sisters Mrs. Livingston of High Bank, and Mrs. Morton, of Orwell, four daughters and three sons by his first marriage, and two daughters by the second. He was a man of great piety and clear Christian experience. Truly the memory of the just is blessed.

## ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

St. John Sun: Hon. Mr. St. John's Galician immigrants are apparently not a very desirable class of settlers. Two of these people were recently found guilty of murder, and another one lately sold his wife to a compatriot. Under Canadian law he could not deliver the goods, but the sale was made and the money received. It is hardly worth while to import an element of this sort into the national life of Canada. The demand for criminals is not so great that we need go abroad for them.

St. John Sun: The enforcement of the charge of five dollars for a bill of lading on vessels from provincial ports to ports in the United States is not creditable to the latter country. There is no more reason for such an exaction in the case of vessels sailing from St. John than from Eastport or Bangor. The amount derived from this source is not large enough to make it worthy of consideration as a source of revenue, and the health of the republic would not be endangered by its abolition. But it does affect the business of small schooners, especially when freights are low, and it is a source of irritation that should not exist in these days of professed friendship between the two nations.

## Rhodes' Guarantee.

LONDON, April 7.—The St. James' Gazette yesterday announced that Cecil Rhodes has now obtained a guarantee from the German Government upon the capital of the German portion of the Cape to Cairo railroad. German financiers have agreed to provide the capital, and Germany has also agreed to guarantee a certain portion of the interest upon the German cross line from Dar-O-Salaam, twenty-five miles south of Zanzibar, which is to tap the Cape to Cairo railway.

## Fruits of War.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—With full military honors in the presence of President McKinley and his cabinet and a multitude of people, and the bodies of the 326 dead heroes who gave their lives for their country in Cuba and Porto Rico during the Spanish-American war, were consigned yesterday to their last resting place in Arlington cemetery, where repose the remains of thousands of honored dead soldiers and officers of the civil war.

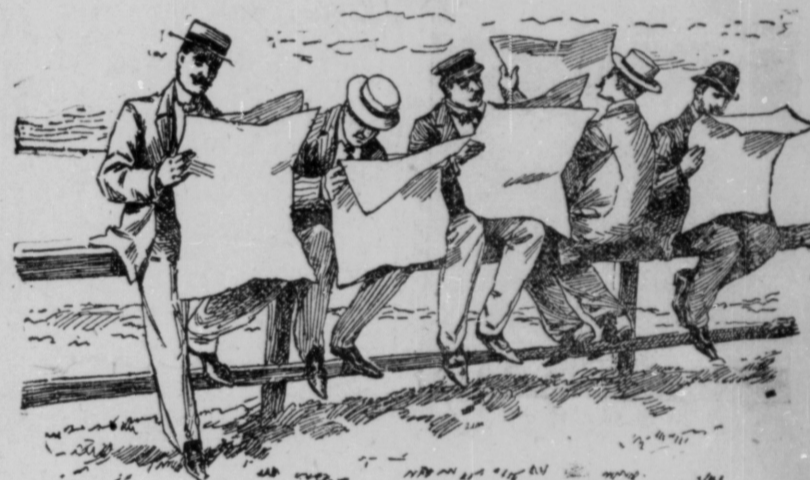

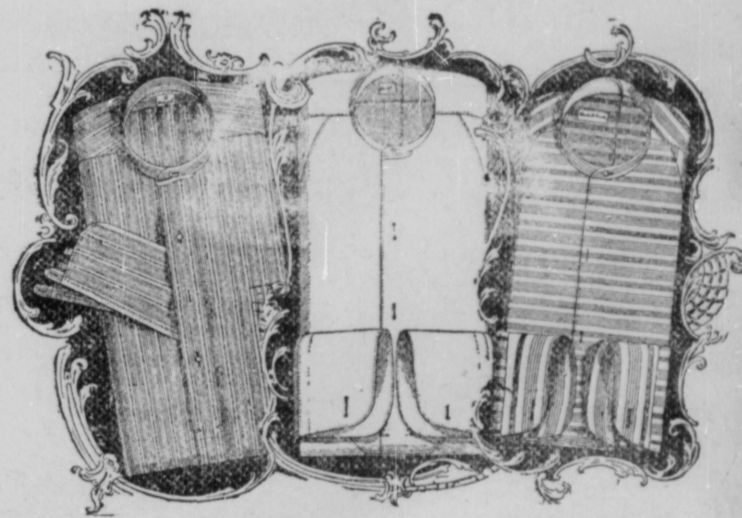
