DRUMMOND DEBATE STILL CONTINUED

WOOD ISLANDS IS A HARBOR UNDER THE ACT,

And Mr. James Young Has Been Appointed Harbor Master.

OTTAWA, May 26.—In the House of Commons yesterday, the Drummond railway debate was continued.

THE SHELLS EXPLODED.

Seven Men Killed in Copenhagen Military Laboratory.

COPENHAGEN, May 24.—A terrible explosion has occurred at the military laboratory here. While some workmen were engaged in filling shells some of the latter exploded, and killed seven men, and seriously injured a non-commissioned officer and two workmen. The laboratory was destroyed.

NEW YORK, May 24.—The fourth annual dinner of the British School and Universities Club was held at the Brevoort house, and Queen Victoria's birthday was celebrated by Britishers of this and other kindred societies in New York. Admiral Sampson was the guest of honour.

Welbeck Abbey Lightning Struck.

LONDON, May 24.—Welbeck Abbey, the splendid country house of the Duke of Portland at Workshop, in Nottingham, was struck by lightning last evening. The bolt ripped a quantity of lead-work from the clock tower, and destroyed a good deal of the glass in the grand dining-room.

Fourteen Persons Drowned.

BERLIN, May 24.—Fourteen persons were drowned yesterday by the capsizing of a ferry boat, on the Danube, near Straubing, Bavaria.

Another and similar accident occurred to day at Simbach, Bavaria, where ten persons were drowned in the River Ion, one of the principle affluents of the Danube by the capsizing of a boat.

DEATH OF MR. FRANK KENNEDY

FIRE IN ST. JOHN

Much Property Destroyed—Two Lives Lost.

ST. JOHN, N. B., May 26.—The most disastrous conflagration that has visited St. John since the holocaust of June, 1877, occurred yesterday. It started about noon in Nase's large store (Indiantown) and it was not until eight o'clock at night that the flames were brought under control.

The burned district was mostly built of wood, but included a number of good residences and large places of business.

About two hundred buildings went down before the flames, and a great many people were rendered homeless.

Miss Cunard, an old lady, was fatally burned, and another woman died from fright.

The insurance is not at all in proportion to the loss.

Marchand the Hero.

PARIS, May 24.—If many more speeches are made in France such as was delivered by Francois Coppee before a large meeting here, Marchand's arrival may prove the signal for a coup d'etat. "Marchand, the hero," cried Coppee, "is a brave and popular soldier, possessing all the great virtues which enable him to command anywhere. Give him a chieftain's calling, and may not history repeat itself? Let me remind you that in France, just one hundred years ago, these words, 'Retour d'Egypte' (the return from Egypt) signified the end of a period of shame and trouble similar to the one through which we have just passed."

The speech of Coppee is considered the opening salute fired in the cause of the new nationalism. It is the first time in a public Marchand meeting that he has been openly compared with Napoleon, and the Napoleonic words applied so pointedly.

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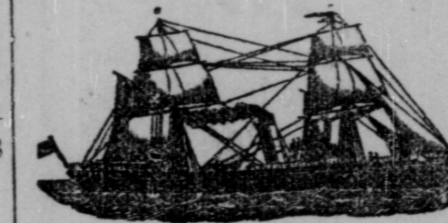

THE PRESIDENT AND THE QUEEN.

President Sends Congratulatory Cablegram

ON THE OCCASION OF HER MAJESTY'S BIRTHDAY,

And Receives a Cordial Reply From Windsor Castle.

"WINDSOR, May 25.—The President of the United States: I am deeply touched by the words of your telegram of congratulation. From my heart I thank you and the American people for the sentiments of affection and good will therein expressed.

QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY

Americans Participate at Kingston.

KINGSTON, Ont., May 24.—Kingston is en fete for the Queen's birthday. Banners, bunting and evergreens predominate, and with fine weather, thousands throng the streets. The first contingent of United States soldiers reached the city last night. It was a company from Watertown, N. Y. The force was welcomed at the dock, and amid great applause was escorted to the City hall, where they are quartered. At 11.30 o'clock the Auburn, N. Y., company came in and had a rousing reception. At 6 a. m. three companies from Syracuse, N. Y., Oswego, N. Y., Elmira, N. Y., and cadets from Syracuse and Rochester reached the city. Mayor Ryan presented the commanding officer with a silk Union Jack. Salutes of 21 guns were fired from Fort Henry and from the United States forces, which mount three cannon on the steamer. A review occurred in the forenoon with 1,000 men in uniform.

Not Fit to Command.

LONDON, May 24.—Admiral Horsey writes to the Times concerning the stranding of the Paris. He declares that, on the strength of more than 50 years' experience in navigation, that, excluding some marvellous occurrences that would justify stranding, a navigator who cannot take a powerful, well-found steamship from Cherbourg into the Atlantic without running on to the Cornish coast, cannot be fit to be trusted with the command of anything.

Bad Boy Murderer.

WHITBY, Ont., May 24.—Edward Elliott, the 15-year-old boy from Beaverton, was convicted here yesterday of having murdered Wm. Murray, and is under sentence to be hanged on Thursday, August 17th.

When the sentence of the court was pronounced the prisoner showed that cool indifference which has characterized his actions since his incarceration. Only once did he weep, and that was during the address of his counsel to the jury.
