

Summerside Sea Cadets Prepare For Inspection

The Summerside Sea Cadet band comprising 28 members of the 81 Sea Cadets at Summerside will head a parade following their inspection at Memorial Square next Wednesday by Capt. J. C. Little, C.D., R.C.N., of Halifax, who will later inspect the Sea Cadets at classes at R. C. A. F. Station Summerside.

During the inspection, which will begin at 6 p.m. at Memorial Square in Summerside, the band will play selections and will lead the parade on a route of March along Spring Street and North to Notre Dame Street, west to Summer Street, south on Summer Street where a march past will take place at the corner of Fitzroy and Summerside Streets, with the salute being taken by Capt. Little. The parade will continue to Water Street and west to the Clifton Hotel where transport will be provided to No. 5 Hangar R. C. A. F. Station Summerside, where the inspecting officer and party will inspect cadets at classes.

The public, and especially the parents, are invited to attend both the inspection at Memorial Square and at the R. C. A. F. station, and a reception for Capt. Little will be held immediately after, with invited guests in attendance.

Eastern Prince Insemination Unit Planned

The breeding of cattle by artificial insemination will be in progress in the Summerside area within a month as the result of the organization at Summerside last evening of an artificial insemination club to serve cattle breeders in Eastern Prince County.

Unanimous support to the immediate organization of the club was given by about 100 cattle breeders who attended the meeting, and a board of 9 temporary directors was appointed to administer the business of the club, and committees were chosen to conduct surveys in the school districts of Lots 16, 17, 19, 25, 26, and 27, to determine the minimum number of cattle with which breeders will participate in the club's first year of operation.

Membership in the new organization will be open to any farmer in the district engaged in cattle breeding, and the semen will be flown in daily from the New Brunswick central artificial insemination unit at Fredericton, where a battery of 30 bulls is maintained.

Dr. George Fisher, director of Veterinary Services for Prince Edward Island, described the history, procedure and advantages of artificial insemination.

The meeting last evening was presided over by Mr. Charles Yeo, directors appointed were: Lot 16, Larry Yeo; Lot 17, James Harris; Lot 19, James Heffell and Clarence Marchbank; Lot 25, Frank Jardine and Waldon Moase; Lot 26, Bert Hamill and Robert Waugh; Lot 27, W. A. MacLellan.

Officials of the Department of Agriculture in attendance last evening included Keith Clay, agricultural representative for Prince County; Bob Pierce, fieldman for King's County; and Jim Mundy, Canadian Department of Agriculture Livestock Division.

In addition to the annual inspection on Wednesday the corps has scheduled several activities for the next few weeks, including participation of the band in the Musical Festival at Charlottetown on May 2nd; a father and son banquet on May 11th at the Canadian Legion Home; a Church Parade on Sunday, May 23rd with a band concert from the bandstand in Memorial Square in the evening.

The band will again spend eight weeks at Sydney during the school holidays, and the rest of the Sea Cadet corps will be there for the first two weeks of August. At least two of the officers will be going to Comox, British Columbia, for a two-week course, and other officers will take courses at H. M. C. S. Cornwallis at Halifax, or accompany the Sea Cadet Corps to Sydney.

The Corps is sponsored by the Summerside Branch of the Canadian Legion with a Legion committee under the chairmanship of Charles Hogan.

Weather Outlook Not Favorable For Fishermen

Today at twelve noon lobster fishermen on the north shore of Prince Edward Island begin the task of transporting their lobster traps to the fishing grounds for the start of the 1955 season. Weather conditions were not favorable in the West Prince area last night with a heavy rolling surf and north east wind and fishermen were hoping for some improvement in order to make their line running task easier and enable them to get out a large number of traps during the week-end.

Although herring are not over plentiful enough bait was reported available for baiting requests and the supply is expected to improve.

Some instances of traps being set ahead of the legal date were reported and are being taken care of by the fishery patrol boats.

At Alberton South over ten thousand traps are going on the fishing grounds this year. Starting the season with new boats, constructed by Phillip Kynch at Alberton South, are Myrl Matthews with a very large boat measuring forty-five feet long and thirteen feet wide powered by an eight-cylinder marine engine, and Cecil Hutt also a much larger than average lobster boat forty feet long powered by a six-cylinder marine engine.

There has been some shot at this spring and I guess for that matter some were actually shot. I can read wildgeese pretty well. At dusk one evening several weeks ago I walked down to the marsh at the head of Vernon River (below the Chapel) to watch the geese coming from the inland fields back of Ugg. Squatted on the marsh I thrilled as a flight of 40 geese came over high up in the blue sky and sat on their tails and spiralled down, the air rushing through their wing feathers after the manner of black ducks losing altitude in a hurry. They were momentarily lost in the down river shadows and then they hoove in sight in a long window a bare 30 feet off the marsh.

Ten days previously I had parked the car at the same spot and got out. The geese paid no attention; except a couple of old ganders supplied their necks a few times. Weather Outlook Not Favorable For Fishermen

The laying wildgeese have been quietly slipping off northward since April 20th, or a few days earlier, and the goose population has thinned out very noticeably. The geese we have with us at the present moment are mainly the one, two and three-year-olds. A few older geese linger on for records are available where a wildgoose shot on May 9th was found to contain a fully developed egg when being prepared for the table. This happened many years ago and the man who told me about the incident died about 15 years ago. He admitted that he never after shot a goose in the spring. When his mother called him into the pantry and showed him the egg "something turned over inside him" to quote his own words "and I was off spring shooting for life." Few spring shooters will admit having shot a goose containing eggs but the odd one will.

Steelheads have been taken from the Cardigan, Grand Sturgeon and Dunk rivers and now Wheatley River is added to the list. Steelhead is the name given to Rainbow trout that go to sea and seek their food in salt water. Salt water Rainbows are a far different fish compared to the same species taken in fresh water. 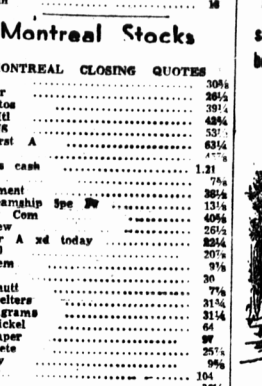
