PHILADELPHIA, June 12—(AP)—Byron Nelson, as durable as a cow pony from his native Texas, fired two great iron shots on the third and fourth holes of the Philadelphia Country Club's Spring Mill course today and thereby won the 43rd United States Open Golf Championship.

He had to go to the 18th green of his second playoff round with Craig Wood before he could make the victory official with a one-over-par 70 to Wood's 73. But the blond bomber from Mamaronock, N.Y., was ready to admit their important title was over as early as the fourth hole.

On No. 3 Nelson used his sand wedge on a downhill lie and lofted a shot that almost rolled into the cup for an eagle two. On the fourth, out-driven a good 40 yards and 200 yards short of the green, Byron laced into a No. 1 iron and saw his ball light onto the green, 13 feet short of the cup, roll up and nestle against the pin.

When the pin was lifted out, the ball plopped into the cup for a double eagle, Nelson's second eagle of the tournament. Right there the 27-year-old pro, from Reading, Pa., had the playoff won. He was four shots in front.

But Wood didn't stop trying. Even on the 17th which he had started four strokes down, he hit a fine approach shot within two feet of the pin and canned the putt for a birdie three. Even that, though, left him three strokes down with only one to play. Nelson, down the long 18th where Sam Snead, Canadian Open Champion, blew a championship Saturday which was his for the taking, was far too ready for any chance of a crackup.

For Wood, it meant he had lost probably his last, and best, shot at the hole which meant that the bad luck which had pursued the 27-year-old veteran through four other playoffs still was hanging on. In 1931 he lost a playoff to the late Johnny Golden for the North-South championship at Pinehurst. In 1933, he was beaten by Denny Shute in a playoff for the British Open title. In 1934, Paul Runyan beat him out in the United States Professional Golfers' Association final in two extra holes. In 1935, after being tied by Gene Sarazen's double eagle, he lost out in a playoff for the Augusta Masters.

Byron, rated one of the greatest iron players in the game, especially into the face of such a brisk wind as whipped over this course today, won the Metropolitan in 1936, the Augusta Masters the following year, and the North-South Open at Pinehurst this Spring.

Baseball Celebrates Its Centennial With Varied Program At Cooperstown

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y., June 12—(AP)—The first 100 years are always the hardest and old man baseball took off on his second century today after being halted and feted at the biggest birthday party tossed him during his century of rule as the No. 1 figure in American sport.

There were parades, dedications, speakings, a Babe Ruth "comeback" ball game and what not for more than 11,000 people who poured into this pretty village where Abner Doubleday sat down on a hot day and invented the National pastime.

Commissioner K.M. Landis, high priest of baseball, was there to lead the cheering. He received plenty of lusty rooting assists from a score of men whose names are found in almost every baseball blue book ever published.

The baseball museum and hall of fame with its relics of bygone days was dedicated; so was Doubleday field. Doubleday's actual spot where he pitched the first game played in 1839, in the 1850's and in 1929 was reeled off by teams of schoolboys, soldiers and picked major leaguers, wearing the uniforms of the periods they represented.

Men who have helped make baseball history—Babe Ruth, Connie Mack, Hans Wagner, old Nap La Jole and Walter Johnson, to name just a few—sat on the tall form of Landis dedicated the hall of fame "to all America."

Ten of the 11 living members of the hall of fame were presented with engraved bats, and a ruffie of

Craft Aground In Louisburg Harbor

LOUISBURG, N.S. June 12—Holed below the waterline and leaking badly, the 3,270-ton British steamship Penolver beached herself in Louisburg Harbor today to keep from sinking after she had scraped a rock outside the port in a heavy fog.

The freighter, bound from Boston to England with scrap iron, was taking in water at a faster rate than her pumps could handle it when Captain Walker ordered her to run aground on the shelving beach off Hearsides at the extreme end of Louisburg harbor.

The ship had run into one of the many rocks outside the harbor mouth last night as dense fog enveloped the Cape Breton Island coast.

The Penolver, a 27-year-old craft, is registered in Falmouth, Eng. She is owned by the Cheliew Navigation Company.

Tony Lazzeri Signed By Cellar Place Leafs Of The International League

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TORONTO, June 12—(CP)—Tony Lazzeri, the old "poosh 'em up" kid himself, is coming back to the minors, perhaps as the stepping stone on the road back to Major League baseball.

The one-time New York Yankee one of baseball's greatest infielders during his 12 seasons as a Yank, has been signed as playing manager of Toronto Maple Leafs in the International League, succeeding Jack Burns. It will be Tony's job to lead the Leafs out of the cellar, where they rest 18 1-2 games off the pace.

The change in leadership was made with the agreement of Burns, who will remain as the club's first baseman. President Don Ross announced today. There had been rumors of a managerial shift ever since the Leafs took to the road last week after a disastrous home stand.

Far from the form with which he scintillated as a member of the powerhouse Yankees, Lazzeri nevertheless should aid the Toronto cause at field and at bat.
