Trans-Pacific Shuttle Puts Berlin Airlift in the Shade

On the outskirts of teeming Tokyo, the third largest city in the world is the terminal of the trans-Pacific airlift that already is developing to such proportions that it is putting the Berlin airlift into the shade.

This is Haneda airbase, run by the Americans on the edge of Tokyo Bay. Day and night, four-engine transport planes sail in and out of Haneda, carrying fighting men and military cargo from North America to the Korean war theatre and speeding American casualties and dependents back to the United States.

When I left Haneda for Canada after a stretch at the front, there were about 90 transport planes crowding the field. There was not enough room for them on the ordinary tarmac and one of the runways had to be used as parking space.

The majority of the planes belonged to the American Military Air Transport Service, which circles the world. But there were commercial planes on charter from a dozen American airlines.

On Shuttle Service
And there were the Royal Canadian Airforce planes on the Pacific shuttle from Tacoma, Washington, across the northern route via the Aleutians to Haneda.

The RCAF are right into this airlift now. Every day or two, one of the planes from No. 426 Squadron, normally based at Dorval, near Montreal, wings into Haneda, generally carrying 36 to 45 American soldiers.
