

Memorial Cup Finals Get Underway April 27

KEMPTVILLE, Ont. (CP)—The opening game of the Memorial Cup finals between Barrie Flyers and St. Boniface Canadians will be played at Winnipeg April 27. It was announced Thursday by W. H. "Baldy" George of Kemptville, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. The second game will be played at Brandon April 29.

The third and fourth games will be played in Winnipeg; the fifth, if necessary, also in Winnipeg; the sixth in Brandon and the seventh in Winnipeg. Dates have to be arranged.

George announced also that all Allan Cup games will be played

either in Kitchener or Ottawa, depending on the winner of the East Canada senior championship between Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen and Smiths Falls. Penetration will represent the west. The dates: April 27 and 29, May 1, 2 and, if necessary, May 4, 6 and either May 7 or May 8.

Slight Fire At Woodbine Track

TORONTO, (CP)—Fire broke out at Woodbine race track in Toronto's east end Thursday and was extinguished quickly. The blaze, believed started by a cigarette butt, began in a refuse dump and spread to two horse barns before firemen arrived. The fire was not serious enough to force evacuation of the animals. Many horses in training for the June 2 running of the Queen's plate are housed at the track.

Big Ticket Sale In Milwaukee

MILWAUKEE, (AP)—The advance sale of 36,000 tickets for a three-day week-end series with Cincinnati was reported Thursday by Milwaukee Braves.

In addition, said publicity director Charles Sands, the club has sold 20,000 tickets for a similar series in two weeks with Chicago Cubs.

The Braves have played only one game here since their transfer from Boston, drawing 34,357 paid for the opener April 14 against St. Louis Cardinals. The total topped the National League for opening day attendance.

The Braves new stadium has a capacity of 36,011, with about 16,000 seats in the lower deck of the grandstand.

Mantle's Homer Gives N.Y. Yankees 6-3 Win Over Boston Red Sox

A 420-foot ninth inning home run by Mickey Mantle gave New York Yankees a 6-3 victory over Boston Red Sox Thursday and lengthened the world champions' American League lead to a full game.

Mantle's blast off relief pitcher Ellis Kinder proved a 3-3 deadlock and completed a three-game sweep of the Red Sox series by the Yankees.

The various members of the Islanders Hockey Club and coach Murph Chamberlain will start heading for their homes in Central or western Canada today or tomorrow. This morning Murph and Gary Gordon, Ronnie Hurst and Chuck Holdaway will leave on the early flight and they will be followed later in the day by Gus Gustavson, Mrs. Gustavson and Lyle Wiseman. Gus, Mrs. Gustavson and Wiseman will travel by car. Saturday it is expected that Marcel Clements and Hub Beaudry will head for their homes in Sudbury, Ont.

Gary Gordon was a patient in the Victoria General Hospital yesterday where he was undergoing observation after being checked into the hospital during the game on Wednesday night. Gary injured his head when he was boarded by Carroll Bloom early in the first period and the popular winger was unable to continue play.

Speaking of the final game itself, Chamberlain had this to say last night: "We had eleven guys there who did not let the Islanders down. They gave everything they had right to the end and I am proud of them. We scored two goals and that should have been enough to win. He added that he was very proud of the manner in which Gustavson played. "He played a lovely game and he has been a terrific hockey player for us all season. I would like to have more players with the same desire to win that he had."

Chamberlain had every reason to be elated over the manner in which his team bowed out of the picture. Short-handed two men as the result of injuries to Larry Travis and Gordon, the players put up a magnificent struggle. They fought back from a four goal deficit to move within an ace of catching the Athletics and ended the game only two goals down. Actually it might be stated that they were short three players for part of the series. The third player would have been Ted Power or Edwin Gross, and what a difference either one of them might have made in the Islanders' forward lines on Wednesday.

From a modest beginning Chamberlain built a strong club. When he arrived here last fall Murph had little more than two or three regular players and a number of second hand hockey uniforms. Through various deals and connections he built a team that turned out to have the greatest crowd appeal of any club in the Maritimes. He had them playing hard, pleasing hockey all the way and what was more pleasing he had them playing winning hockey much of the time. His record as a coach of Charlottetown teams speaks for itself.

The tournament was won by Acadia University last year.

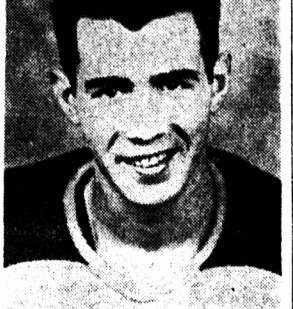
Big Skating Meet Opens
