Sound of music to fill the air eight bands march in parade

Everyone enjoys a parade led by the stirring martial music of a brass band or the lilting strains of Highland pipes. On Friday morning parade lovers and band lovers should get enough to last them for several months with no less than eight brass and pipe bands spotted at well chosen intervals in the lineup of the mammoth Gold Cup and Saucer Parade.

Leading the lineup of brass bands will be Prince Edward Island's own P.E.I. Regiment Band, appearing through courtesy of the regiment's commanding officer Lt-Col. D.J. McCrorie.

The band, clad in sparkling crimson uniforms and directed by Lt. Charles E. MacGregor, has won a great measure of fame throughout P.E.I. by its appearances at various events and last year was judged the parade's top band.

Another band parade watchers are looking forward to seeing again is the air force band from Summerside. The striders have made but few appearances in the eastern section of the Island, but on all occasions they have played here they have always been more than well received. The air force band will be accompanied by a color party.

SCHOOL BANDS
Queen Charlotte High School Band under the direction of Ivor Cadmore and the Birchwood High School band both have appeared many times locally at both cadet inspections, militia inspections and a host of church parades. The youngsters will be in the thick of the competition for the top youth band prize.

Two youthful Island Scottish bands will also appear in the parade. They are the Lovel Scots Pipers

Neither of these bands need any introduction to Islanders. Each has been seen and heard many, many times at fairs, festivals, Highland games, and parades from one end of the Island to the other and always have made a big hit with the crowds on hand.

Two of the Island groups, a pipe band and a brass band, will round out the musical side of the giant parade.

SECOND TIME
The Fredericton Air Cadet Band from Fredericton, N. B., will be making its second appearance in the Gold Cup and Saucer Parade. Critics have said this band is one of Canada's best young bands and they proved it last year by walking off with a prize in the parade. The air cadets bring with them a precision drill team which will be seen in a performance.

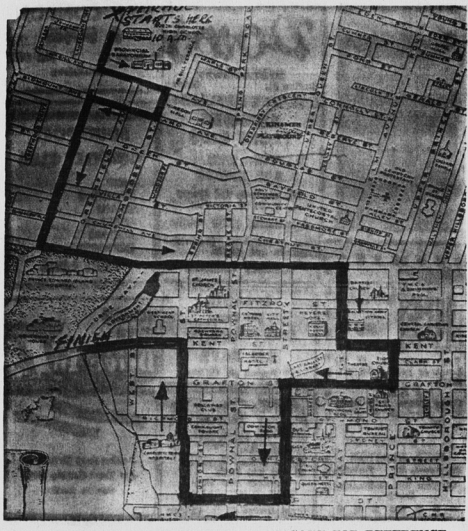
Unlike the Fredericton band, the Balmoral Girls Pipers from Stellarton, N.S., will be making their initial appearance in the parade and naturally will be in top form wishing to impress local spectators. The Balmoral outfit has won great praise in appearances in other Maritime centers and will undoubtedly be popular here.

All of these eight bands will vie for honors in competitions where hard cash is the prize for victory. Christopher Glenhill, director of music for the province, has been named judge in the band competition and he will make awards in three classes — brass, pipe and youth.

So Friday the folk look like it's going to be a big day for parade and band lovers in Prince Edward Island, which of course, means nearly everybody.

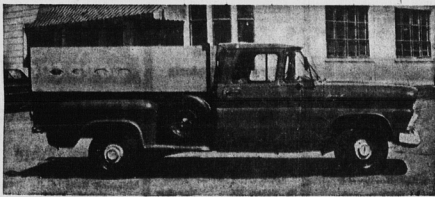

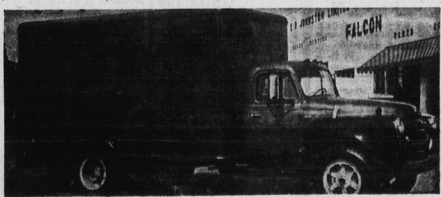

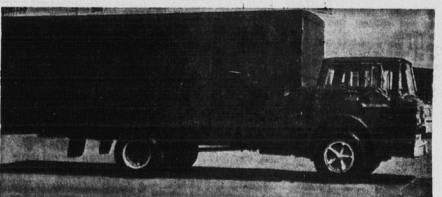
