

LATEST NEWS FROM CANADA.

MEETING OF THE PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.—HABES CORPUS ACT SUSPENDED IN CANADA.

St. John's, N. S. June 11. Canadian Parliament opened yesterday. Governor's Speech congratulates the country on its success in repelling the Fenian invasion.

Reports from various points indicate Fenian invasion is actually abandoned. The action of Parliament suspending Habeas Corpus is universally approved.

HOW THE CANADIANS FEEL TOWARDS THE FENIANS.

The feeling in Canada against the Fenians is very bitter. Correspondents of the American papers supply us with a few particulars, which we copy:

BITTER FEELING AGAINST FENIAN PRISONERS. There is a very bitter feeling against the Fenian prisoners, the universal verdict being "hang them all once."

THE FEELING WHICH THE FENIAN MOVEMENT EVOKES IN THE STATES.—The Boston Advertiser observes an article with the following significant observations:

"The Canadian people get very little sympathy this side the line. It is curious to watch the effect of the news upon the people here, who cannot understand the excitement at a distance beyond the lakes.

The appearance of the growing crops in the United States is represented to be unfavourable. In Wisconsin, the wheat generally is a failure, having been killed by frost in the absence of snow. Many farmers are harrowing their fields and re-sowing with spring wheat. In Alabama the cotton crop has suffered greatly from heavy rains and had seed; and the planters are ploughing up and planting the land with corn.

In Tennessee where average crops were expected, much damage has been recently done by the cut-worm and frost. In Georgia the wheat crop is said to be promising. In North Carolina corn is reported indifferent, cotton a failure from bad seed, and wheat fair. In Virginia the coldest spring for thirty years, has retarded the growth of all products; wheat is not expected to do better than half a crop. In Indiana the corn crop is reported to be particularly fair. In Illinois the crops generally are backward. In New York the winter wheat will be light; and in Ohio winter wheat is reported far below an average; barley a failure, corn good.
