keep leading clubs, or attack hearts, but all roads lead to the same dead end. Down you go.
Now actually the hand was a laydown from the opening gong. The diamond lead should have been taken in dummy with the ace. The reason is that you want to be sure to have an entry back to your hand after you establish the club suit.

There is no way the opponents' cards can be distributed to prevent declarer from making nine tricks, provided the opening lead is won in dummy. Four clubs, two diamonds, a heart, and two spades are absolutely sure.

It all goes back to following a couple of basic principles. As soon as dummy comes down you count your winners (in notrump play). There are four immediate winners — two spades, a heart, and a diamond.

Oppening lead—five of diamond. You can't rely on your opponents to be accommodating and help you out when you're in trouble.

Take this hand, for instance. West opens a diamond and you play low from dummy, winning East's eight with the nine. You lead the king of clubs and everything would be in fine shape if East would only take it with the ace. Nine cold tricks.

But East's played this game before and knows his way around a bridge table. He looks you in the eye and plays the deuce of clubs. Now, of course, you've got your work cut out for you. You can take a diamond finesse, or

Little Ground For Optimism Is Seen In Gromyko's Speech

WASHINGTON (AP) — Diplomatic quarters here found little ground for optimism about prospects for agreement on ending nuclear weapons tests in Andrei Gromyko's offer on behalf of Russia to sign such a pact any time.

That proposal and the other main points the Russian foreign minister made in a Moscow speech Thursday appeared to Washington officials at first reading to be merely a rehash of familiar propaganda lines.

There was no immediate comment from the state department. It is certain, however, that Gromyko's talk to the Supreme Soviet will receive careful study on the chance that it might contain something which would provide a key to agreement in one field or another.

WILLING TO LISTEN
Gromyko used his toughest language in discussing Berlin, while at the same time saying Russia is ready and willing to listen to any proposal from the West as a counter to Moscow's plan for ending the occupation of Berlin.

The Western Big Three have rejected the Soviet proposal that Berlin be converted into a demilitarized free city within six months. Gromyko stood on that offer, but said Russia "has no objection to hearing proposals if the West has any—if those proposals are directed toward solving the problem and are not rejections of our solution."

The Western position in general is that the United States, Britain and France will not give up their occupation rights in West Berlin and abandon the city to the threat of a Communist take-over. The West also maintains there can be no lasting solution to the Berlin situation without some agreement on reunifying all of Germany.

Gromyko rejected this idea, calling it a trick. He said reunification can come about only through agreement between Communist East Germany and the Bonn West German government.

NUCLEAR TEST PACT
Gromyko said Russia is ready to sign "even tomorrow... an agreement on the discontinuation of nuclear weapons tests... with out any reservations or preconditions."

Russia long has maintained it is willing to sign an agreement to end such weapons tests. The United States contends that to be of value a pact would have to be accompanied by agreement on a worldwide inspection system to make sure no one cheated.

Some hope has been expressed here that Russia might be willing to make some concessions on the issue, but Gromyko's speech provided little support for the idea.

QUEEN'S REPLY
OTTAWA (CP) — Queen Elizabeth, replying to the Christmas greeting sent her by Governor-General Massey on behalf of the Canadian people, said she and Prince Philip are looking forward to their visit to this country next year. The message said: "I send my sincere thanks to you and the Canadian people for your kind message to me and my husband. We warmly reciprocate your good wishes and fully look forward to visiting Canada again next summer."

SABLE LIKE MARTEN
