Thoughts For Our Time

TELEVISION AND EDUCATION

Not so long ago education was a rather simple affair. It was not complicated by the many forces outside the school and the home, which today compete with the minds of the young. There was the world of nature and the conversation of elders, but not radio, movies and television. It was a much easier task to educate the child of a generation ago. Knowledge, schools, teachers, and company, one could be fairly sure of the direction of a child's education.

But that's all gone, and now it is a tough job to keep pace with the influences to which a child is subjected. Take for example advertising: the fabulous campaign against modern man to have him dissatisfied with his lot, and to show him all the things he should have in order to be happy. (Happiness, of course, is to have the latest car, a TV set, and a fully equipped home in the suburbs). It promises a material heaven, and makes its appeal mainly through sex.

How much influence does advertising have on a child, and how much is he effected? He cannot go out into the street without being subjected to advertising in some shape or form. If he rides a streetcar, he is camped with ads; if he reads a magazine, his eyes take in more advertisement than literature; and in his home, radio and television vis with each other for the most part. If an advertisement, a child could not but be deeply affected, were he only half alive. Most children can quote a half-dozen advertising slogans quite readily.

There is no question, I think, about the powerful influence of movies in the education of children. If movies were all morally good, artistically excellent, and numerically controlled, they would be a wonderful educating medium which we would be glad to have for our children's sake. Unfortunately, some movies are immoral and very few are artistically excellent. The glorification of crime, infidelity, hatred of enemies, are all presumed as a matter of course. Parents indiscriminately allow their children to go to a show without so much as asking the name of the picture. Do we allow a child to drink from a medicine bottle without inquiry, or to eat anything that comes his way?

The latest and most powerful of the competing factors in education is television. It is a well-known fact that children, at least in the United States, spend more hours per week in front of the TV set than they do in school. In the course of these many hours, they witness perhaps one good program among very many bad ones. And all the time subject to the intrepid hammer of materialistic advertising. Television, of course, is marvelous, and a credit to our age. In the case of invalids and shut-ins it provides a wonderful diversion. But it is far from perfect. And we do not yet know what toll it will take of our children in health, discipline, and power to think.

The purpose of education is sometimes stated as the effort to perfect an intellect and will, to think correctly, and to act rightly. Television, I'm afraid, is directly opposed to this twofold aim. It does all our thinking for us, it keeps us on the level of the imagination, like children. The sustained effort to think and to develop one's mind is becoming a rare thing.

It is easy to be entirely passive and to watch; it is pleasant and amusing. But I venture to say that it is eating away at social life, that it is damaging human conversation and wit, and it is spawning a lazy and unsocial generation, which might never reach mature manhood. It is a race ruled by the advertisers in a tyranny of the soul which is far worse than slavery.

Parents and educators, then, have a much more difficult job on their hands than their own parents and educators had. It takes a much more alert and cautious effort to guide the young in the ways to true discipline and knowledge. It is not a case of cutting children off from the wonders of our age; that would be foolish and unjust. But it is a case of very serious obligation to the vigilant and firm in controlling the influences on the mind of a child. Our age is remarkable for the care it takes of the human body. Unfortunately, the same cannot be said of its care for the soul.

A wise educator knows that discipline is not taught by giving in to a child's every whim. And no child is grateful in later life for being pampered. It is no love which refuses to be firm with an immature will; it is self-love. A parent who loves his child will moderate and contro the desires of his child, especially in these educational influences, wherein lurk dangers both to body and to soul. Let parents then, stand up to the problem confronting them and not allow their children to be overcome by deceptive pleasures.

The inspired writer wrote "Where there is no vision, the people perish." There is a danger that in the matter of education we are lacking vision, regarding both the aim of education and the factors involved. It is not a simple matter, it is complicated and crucial.
