Expect Election Fever To Liven N.S. House Session

HALIFAX (CP) — Prospects of a general election are expected to liven debate in the third session of the Nova Scotia legislature's 45th general assembly which opens today.

Lieutenant-Governor Alistair Fraser, a former CNR vice-president, is scheduled to start reading the throne speech at 3 p.m. AST in the historic house where Joseph Howe championed responsible government and freedom of the press more than a century ago.

The RCAF central command's coronation trumpets will sound a fanfare as the lieutenant-governor steps from his car to inspect a 117-man air force guard of honor. The arrival will contrast with that of his father, Lieutenant-Governor D. C. Fraser, who in 1907 drove past the first Canadian troops to be stationed here in a horse-drawn coach.

ROYAL SALUTE
The Greenwood RCAF band will extend a royal salute when Lieutenant-Governor Fraser enters the house.

Radio microphones and CBC television cameras will carry the ceremonies into thousands of Nova Scotia homes.

Victor Cardoza (L-Digby) will move the reply to the throne

speech. Seconder will be Dr. C. L. MacMillan (L-Victoria).

Premier Hicks, one of Canada's youngest provincial premiers and a former Rhodes scholar, is making his second appearance in the house as leader of Liberal forces since the premiership was left vacant in 1954 by the death of Angus L. Macdonald.

HOLD 19 SEATS
Liberals hold 19 of the 37 seats, Progressive Conservatives 13 and CCF two. Two government members died and a third was appointed to the Senate since the 1955 session.

There has been no indication of plans to introduce major legislation and one government source predicted "a quiet session."

The C. is expected to unleash a full-dress attack on government policies. Progressive Conservative leader Robert L. Stanfield said it was his party's assumption that Mr. Hicks would test his strength at the polls this spring.

Some informants believe he will wait until the Liberal mandate, won in 1953, expires in 1958 and will call by-elections to fill the vacant seats.

Beaverbrook Central Figure In Two Books

LONDON (CP)—Lord Beaverbrook is a central figure in two new books published in Britain. One is a biography by Tom Driberg, left-wing politician and critic, who visited Canada to obtain some of the material for his story. Excerpts from the book are being published in Lord Beaverbrook's newspaper, The Daily Express.

In an introductory note the paper says the biography is "hostile and frequently inaccurate." But is being published by The Express because it is the paper's policy to "suppress nothing."

Driberg's book was scheduled for publication some time ago, and it was rumored on Fleet street that disagreements between the author and Beaverbrook were responsible for the delay.

Another book in which the Canadian-born publisher figures is "Administration of War Production" by J. D. Scott and Richard Hughes. This shows how British production went all-out in the Second World War, with Beaverbrook in a key role as minister of aircraft production.

Four Killed In N.B. Truck, Car Collision

MONCTON (CP) — Four Hillsboro, N.B., residents died early Monday when their car collided with an oil truck at Frosty Hollow, about 25 miles from here.

RCMP identified the victims as John Foss Towers, the driver; Murray C. Stannard; Miss Myrna Towers and an unidentified child. Relation of the victims was not immediately available.

Jack Burgess, of Dorchester Crossing, N.B., identified as the driver of the Irving Oil Co. Ltd. truck involved, is believed to have escaped serious injury.

Frosty Hollow is midway between Sackville and Dorchester on the main No. 2 highway between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Montague Council Discusses Fighting Fires Outside Town

The regular meeting of the Montague Town Council was held last evening in the council room with Mayor Bruce H. Yeo, presiding. Present were Councillors Reynolds, Greene, Clements, Vanderstine and Nicholson. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, and the bills were read and ordered paid.

A letter was read from Ottawa, indicating that the federal grant on federal property in the town amounted to \$1391.00 and the cheque was enclosed. Of this other amount \$975.00 will go to the school, and 416.00 will go to the town.

Councillor Nicholson in reporting for the fire committee stated that he had ordered 200 feet of 2 1/2 inch fire hose, and it was difficult to reduce assistance to another locality in time of distress. Medical Report On Eisenhower Expected Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower will get a Valentine Day medical report today on the condition of his heart. On Wednesday he will leave for a vacation in Georgia and he may reach a final decision there on whether to seek re-election.

A team of physicians including Dr. Paul Dudley White of Boston will meet at the White House around noon to start analyzing the results of a series of tests the president underwent Saturday at the army's Walter Reed Hospital.

A few hours later the doctors will tell Eisenhower how his heart is standing the strain of the presidency more than 4 1/2 months after suffering a coronary thrombosis in Denver, Colo., last Sept. 24.

His last previous full-scale examination was in mid-December. At that time the physicians said they should know by the middle of February just how complete Eisenhower's recovery was going to be. The president told a press conference last week he probably will rely more on how he feels than on the doctors' reports in making his decision.

James C. Hagerly, White House press secretary, said the president will leave by plane Wednesday morning for about a week's vacation at the 600-acre plantation of Treasury Secretary George Humphrey at Thomasville, Ga.

The doctors probably will permit him to do some light hunting there and he may get in a bit of practice golf.
