**GREAT FIRE IN LONDON.**

Twenty-three Millions go up in Smoke.

Insurance Companies Badly Scorched.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The estimated loss by yesterday's fire is twenty-five million dollars. One hundred and fifty warehouses were gutted. Nearly all the British Fire Insurance Companies are involved, and fire insurance shares were practically valueless after the fire was well under way.

The fire will cause an enormous advance in the price of Ostrich feathers which rose 30 per cent. last evening. Live feather firms alone have a loss of £75,000. The district ravaged by the fire is bounded by Aldergate, Red Cross, Maidenhead Court, and Bradford Avenue, and includes the intermediate streets, Jewin, Hausell, Welland, Edmund and Jewin Crescent.

**THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.**

Items of Interest Botted Down For Easy Reading.

It has been determined in New York to appeal to the public at large for subscriptions to a memorial for Henry George.

It is estimated that the amount of wheat delivered by western farmers since September 1 to date is 17,000,000 bushels.

Ottawa wants to be the metropolitan Anglican See of Canada, instead of Prince Rupert's Land, which at present holds the honor.

Twenty thousand dollars in gold arrived at the Customs Department in Ottawa on Monday last as duties collected on miners' outfits at the port of Lake Tagish.

The leak of French military secrets has not been stopped by the deportation of Captain Dreyfus, and suspicion points at Comte Esterhazy, who has demanded an investigation.

A Havana special says that nearly seventy-five per cent. of the four hundred thousand women, children and non-combatants affected by Gen. Weyler's starvation policy are dead.

Joseph A. Iasigi, formerly Italian consul at Boston, has just been sentenced to serve a term of not more than eighteen nor less than fourteen years in state prison for embezzling trust funds.

Albert Kneeland the Missouri bigamist, who has twelve living wives, has been sentenced to three years and six months in the penitentiary. This is the third term for this offence.

"Bob" Fitzsimmons received a challenge from Corbett the other night, offering him \$15,000 in cash to meet him in the ring. Fitz was wild when he read the message. He says that he will never fight Corbett again.

Reports to the Marine and fisheries Department indicate the total failure of the autumn mackerel fishery on the Atlantic coast. Of the large United States fleet operating off the Cape Breton coast, most of the vessels have cleared for home "clean."

Rev. Dr. Swallow, who ran an election in Pennsylvania the other day, had a campaign button which was a mystery to all except those who knew the family history of the preacher and his wife, Mrs. Swallow was a Robin before marriage, and the button contained a picture of two birds flying side by side.

Germany is alarmed at the way her exports to the United States are dropping off. In the second quarter of 1896 seventeen consular districts sent to the United States goods amounting to \$14,481,414. In the same quarter in 1897 the same districts sent \$7,198,112. The average loss all over the empire is nearly fifty per cent.

St. Louis, Missouri, is about to establish a line of steel barges to carry grain to New Orleans for shipment there at the low rate of three cents a bushel. These barges with a cargo of 800 tons will not draw over fifteen inches of water, which means an open river on the Mississippi at all seasons. It is said this new system will be in operation by March next.

J. M. Rhodes, a printer of Kansas City, was divorced a few days ago from his wife Fannie by default in Judge Stover's division of the Circuit Court while the court ate its luncheon. Rhodes was married in 1896. He says his wife believed in woman's rights to the limit of the term, and not only refused to get his breakfast for him, but often made him sleep on the floor.
