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Swaps, Nashua May Meet Soon

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Swaps, the Kentucky Derby winner set a world record for the 1-16 mile Saturday as he won the \$109,800 California at Hollywood Park.
 Winning by 1 1/4 lengths over Determine, the 1954 Derby victor, Swaps covered the distance in 1:40 2/5, two-fifths of a second faster than the record set last year by Poonia II at Santa Anita.
 The Llangollen Farm's Mister Gus, the pacesetter, finished a close third, half a length behind Determine.
 It was the seventh straight win for Swaps who stepped out of his three-year-old class to face the older division handicap stars.
 The King Ranch's Rejected was fourth followed by Novarullah and Travertine in the six-horse race.
 Swaps, the odds-on betting favorite, earned \$63,700 for owner Rex Ellsworth and brought his total winnings to \$315,200 in 12 races. He paid \$3.30, \$2.60 and \$2.10. Determine returned \$3.90 and \$2.50 and Mister Gus \$2.40.

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
