THE IMPENDING WAR.

A WAR between our Mother Country and a great, virile, organized and concentrated power, such as Russia, is a terrible thing to contemplate. It would present no such overwhelming odds as that which has just been drawn to a close between the United States and Spain. Indeed the odds in such a contest seem, at the outset, to be rather in favor of Russia; for worldwide power as she is, Great Britain has powerful enemies in various parts of the world who will not fail to make trouble when she is grappling with her foe. Great Britain must from the first, count upon the active hostility of France; and if the astute Kruger should make good the opportunity to strengthen the Transvaal at British expense, it is possible that even Germany may prove to be cold and unfriendly. On the other hand, Great Britain will certainly have the friendly aid of the United States; for—to say nothing of the claim established by the good offices of Great Britain in the recent Spanish-American war—the interests of the United States and Great Britain as to trade with China are identical. Indeed John Bull will be fighting Uncle Sam's battle as well as his own. Japan, too, may be expected to side with Great Britain and "the open door" as against Russia and her monopoly of the trade in Northern China. But chiefly Great Britain may rely upon the support and co-operation of British men through the world. From Canada, from Australia, and from India, if not from Africa, help for their mother-land will come. British men, if compelled to do so, will fight to the death for the cause of international right and justice as opposed to that of selfish aggrandizement at the expense of a helpless people.

Comparisons as to the bravery of the armies and navies of the two Empires need not be made. The men of both nations have proved their mettle on many a well fought field. Nor can we expect that Russian officers will be found inferior to the British in martial skill. The leading men of Russia, in every department, are highly and practically trained. Russia can bring the heaviest battalions into the fields. But Great Britain can put the greater number of ships and men upon the sea. It is possible that Great Britain may prove to be the stronger in respect to that important essential of ultimate success in a protracted war, viz—money. The spirit of the British people, too invigorated by the inspiration of civil liberty, will undoubtedly prove to be higher and stronger than that of a nation the masses of which are born to serfdom. Moreover, there can be no question about the advantage which appertains to the side of Right:

"The cause is he armed who hath his quarrel just."

The latest despatches indicate that the Chinese Government has yielded before the threats of Russia. If this be true, the time for action on the part of the British Government has come. An expression of determination by the British Government and people may, even yet, cause the Russian officials to withdraw from their position; for with their trans-continental railway unfinished Russia is not yet fully prepared for a great struggle in end about China.

Cavite, Manila Bay, Aug 3, via Hong Kong, Aug 1 (delayed in transmission).—The Americans are disgusted with the conduct of Aguinaldo, the insurgent leader, whose power is weakening, owing to the fact that the Filipinos are realizing the unsubstantiability of his promises. Two insurgent leaders are now in Manila Bay, provisioning, in order to insure Aguinaldo's escape, if necessary. The American field hospital worked splendidly under a galling fire at the battle of Malate, and the remarkable courage and steadiness of all ranks, regulars and volunteers, caused General Greene to officially thank the troops. The Spaniards used Mausers and Remingtons with brass coated bullets.

THE FORESTERS.

Meeting of High Court at Alberton.

The 5th annual session of the High Court of Foresters was held in Alberton on Thursday.

A special train in charge of Conductor Cox left the city at 9 o'clock, arriving at Alberton about 3.30, with about 15 delegates and representatives from the different courts throughout the Island. The delegates were received at the station by a committee from Court Onward, who had all arrangements completed for the accommodation of the visitors, in which it was quite evident the good people of Alberton had heartily joined.

The first session of the High Court was called to order at 4 o'clock by the High Chief Ranger, F. S. Jost, and almost every officer was at his station. After the opening ceremonies, 64 delegates received the High Court Degree and took their seats. The reports of the High Chief Ranger, Secretary and Treasurer were presented and showed that the order on the Island is in a flourishing condition.

During the year four strong Courts have been instituted, and over 300 new members added to the roll. On the 1st day of July last there were 1,303 beneficiary members. Queen's County has 14 Courts with 547 members; Prince County, 12 Courts with 533 members; King's County, 7 Courts, with 223 members. The Treasurer's report shows a balance on hand of \$512.16.

At the close of the Public meeting, held in the evening, a meeting of the Royal Camp of Foresters was held at which seven members were initiated.

The high Court met at 9 o'clock Friday morning and after the opening ceremony the different committees presented their reports; followed by the election of officers which resulted as follows:—

F. S. Jost, of Ch'town, was elected representative of the Supreme High Court which meets in Toronto this month.

The next meeting of the High Court will be held in Kensington. At the close of the session an unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the people of Alberton for the handsome manner in which the representatives of the High Court had been entertained. The delegates attending from the city were George Worthy, J. D. Taylor, and D. McMillan, of Court Avondale; R. M. Johnson and John Sutherland, of Court Mount Stephen.

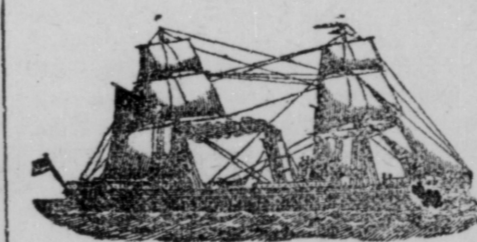
