COUNSELLOR CHAFFELLE requests us to deny the soft impeachment. There has not, he says, been shovelling done by the City about the doors of the Chairman of the Street Committee. The statement made yesterday by THE EXAMINER is nevertheless true. Anyone who takes the trouble to look, will see that on the upper part of Grafton Street, the drains are opened out, and this was done by men in the employ of the City, while at the corner of Grafton and Hillsborough streets where the water lodges, the residents themselves were obliged to turn out and open the drains, so that their cellars might not be filled with water from the City—made drains higher up. To-day, at one o'clock, in the midst of the rain, and snow, and slush, a poor widow might have been seen, with axe and shovel, opening a way for the dammed up water to pass off, so that her small supply of vegetables might not be destroyed.

THE NORTHERN LIGHT ICE-BOATS.—The Agent in this Province for the Department of Marine and Fisheries, recently had two ice-boats built for the use of the Northern Light. They were built under the Superintendence of Captain Philips F. Irving. Regarding them a correspondent says: "These boats were built as near as possible to the model of the boat recently built under Captain Irving's supervision for the mail service at the Capes, and which was acknowledged to be the most perfect boat for the service ever used at the Capes. The new boats are built of the best wood, and strengthened with the best iron. The sheathing of tin is compact. They are fitted with oars, for ice work, puddlers, boat or ice-hooks, bailers, lolly boards, etc. Each one is supplied with movable lockers, for provisions and fireworks, Light, cooking stove, cooking utensils, etc., are also provided. They are also fitted with strong, tight covering, so that the passengers and crew can lay under cover if compelled to stay over night in bad ice. In the opinion of our correspondent the boats are as near "the right thing" as are yet made. They are perfectly equipped, and will, with proper care, last many years. Mr. Lord, the Agent of the Department, has acted wisely in having these boats provided for the "Northern Light." They will add greatly to the comfort and safety of those who may be compelled to use them in landing from the steamer.

Parliamentary Notes. Sir Alexander Campbell has introduced a Bill respecting Insolvent Books, Insolvent Companies and Trading Corporations. Rev. Principal Grant, of Kingston, is in Ottawa in connection with the bill for the incorporation of the Temporalities Fund of the Presbyterian Church of Canada. It is announced that a herd of 11,000 sheep has just arrived at Lincoln, Neb., from Washington Territory. The journey occupied two years. The trail from Washington Territory to the Missouri river is said to be the longest and hardest known to stock men. Three years is often consumed in a drive over this distance.

P. E. Island Bank Act.

Congratulating Her Majesty.

THE BUDGET DEBATE.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, March 4. The Governor General yesterday assented to the Act for the Relief of the Bank of P. E. Island, introduced a few days ago by Sir John McDonald.

He also assented to the Act abolishing Bill Stamps. Resolutions of congratulation to Her Majesty the Queen, on her escape from assassination, on Thursday, were unanimously passed by the House of Commons and the Senate, and immediately called to the Queen.

All members of the House of Commons have arrived at Ottawa, except Mr. Snowball, and Mr. James Yeo, of Prince Co. The debate on the Budget is still going on. Mr. Boltbee replied to Mr. Anglin with crushing effect. Mr. Ross followed, and will probably make a lengthy speech.

Sir Richard Cartwright is likely to be supported as the opposition financier, by "Protection" Charlton, who says the present tariff ruins manufacturers. The greatest excitement prevails over the Presbyterian Temporalities Fund Bill, which is now before a Committee of the House.

The Grits are weakening in their opposition to the National Policy.

GENERAL NEWS.

OTTAWA, March 3.

J. G. A. Creighton, formerly parliamentary correspondent of the Montreal Gazette, has been appointed law clerk of the Senate, at a salary of \$2000. His promotion to this good official position is very cordially appreciated by his old conferees of the press gallery.

The McLaren-Caldwell Appeal Case was before the Supreme Court to-day. This is the celebrated lawsuit which caused the passage of the Ontario Streams Bill afterwards disallowed by the Dominion Government.

HALIFAX, March 3.

W. H. Stirling, Cashier of the Union Bank, of Halifax, died this morning.

NEW YORK, March 3.

A London despatch says that, on arriving at the Castle, the Queen despatched the following telegram to the Prince of Wales, at Marlborough House: "In case exaggerated reports should reach you, I telegraph to say that as I drove from the station here, a man shot at the carriage, but fortunately hurt no one. He was instantly seized. I am none the worse."

LONDON, March 3.

The Times says: "If no more can be said for MacLean, the would-be assassin of the Queen, than could be said for Guitan, the assassin of President Garfield, or Lafoy, the murderer of Mr. Gould, he can as little expect to escape punishment. MacLean passed a restless night. He will be brought up at a special sitting of the Borough justices this afternoon, at Windsor.

Congratulations pour in from all parts of the world to the Queen for the providential escape. MacLean's antecedents show that he is eccentric and addicted to drink.

NEW YORK, March 3.

Rowell has dropped out of the race. It is said Hughes broke him up by the fast work in the early part of the match. The scores now stand: Hazel 541; Fitzgerald 519; Noreman 501; Hart 495; Hughes 470; Sullivan, 468; Rowell retired.

LONDON, March 3.

A sculling match has been arranged between Edward Hanlan, of Toronto, and Edward Trickett, of Sydney, N. S. W., for £500 a side, to take place May 1st, on the Thames.

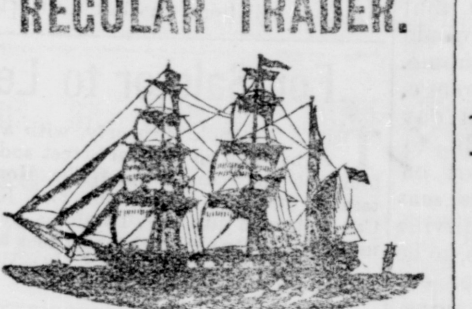
