

## 1974 International Seminar in the Caribbean

### HISTORY

Previously, WUSC International Seminars have been held in Germany, Holland, France, England, Japan, Ghana, Yugoslavia, West Indies, Israel, Sweden, Poland, Pakistan, Algeria, Chile, Turkey, French West Africa, Colombia, Peru and India.

### AIMS OF THE SEMINAR

1. To provide Canadian students and faculty members with an opportunity to widen their knowledge and appreciation of the peoples, problems and cultures of the Caribbean.
2. To offer a number of faculty and students a group experience which will stimulate a personal growth and understanding.
3. To promote a keener perception and understanding of Canada and her role in international affairs.
4. To give the participants the opportunity of a unique international experience.
5. To develop and broaden fraternal contacts with the academic community in the Caribbean.

### SELECTION OF PARTICIPANTS

There will be two selections of faculty participants:

- a). One selection of four faculty to work as a steering committee with the Director during the summer of 1973. Application deadline: 22 June

1973.

b). One selection of additional faculty in October. Application deadline: Oct. 12/73.

All faculty applications should be forwarded directly to the Selection Committee at the WUSC office in Ottawa.

Eighty students will be selected from universities in all ten provinces. Student Candidates are requested to submit applications by 19 Oct.

### THE SEMINAR IN THE CARIBBEAN

The 1974 Seminar is being planned in co-operation with university organizations, student federations and various agencies of the respective governments in the Caribbean.

### COST AND FINANCING

The total cost per participant will be approximately \$1,850. The WUSC National Office raises a portion of this sum, and each participant, with the help of the local WUSC group, is responsible for raising the balance, up to \$1,000.

This local portion of the cost may be raised in a variety of ways. On many campuses, student councils, University administration, alumni associations, etc, traditionally allocate funds for the WUSC International Seminar. Serv-

### PROGRAMME

Five of the faculty participants have already been selected. They are: Ed Colhoun, Department of Modern Languages, Simon Fraser University. (Director) Andrew Axline, Department de science politique, University d'Ottawa Lloyd Brown-John, Dept. of Political Science, University of Windsor. Reshard Gool, Dept., of Political Science, Univ. of P.E.I. Philip Wagner Department of Geography Simon Fraser University.

About five more faculty will be selected in October. It is expected that at least three of the faculty group will be francophone, and that several will be physical scientists.

The theme of the Seminar will be 'Identities'. Under this general heading, individual interests will be pursued, with the general purpose of giving the participants some insights into the problem of identity confronted by the countries of the Caribbean. It should also stimulate a greater understanding of similar Canadian issues.

The Seminar will begin with an orientation session in Montreal July 3-6, and leave for Puerto Rico for further orientation July 7. The individual study groups will be formed in Puerto Rico, and there will be one group per faculty member. These groups will each spend about two weeks on one of the larger islands: (Jamaica, Hispaniola, Puerto Rico, Martinique, Barbados, and Trinidad) followed by periods of time over another two weeks in one or more of the smaller islands belonging to a ice Clubs, church groups and other community organizations also occasionally contribute sums in return for services to be rendered on the participant's return to Canada. Some university administrations waive fees or provide bursaries for Seminar participants.

Each participant is responsible for his personal expenses, and for any travel costs incurred following the formal end different language group from that of the larger island visited (e.g. St. Maarten, Antigua, Guadeloupe, Dominica, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Grenada, etc.).
