

St. Louis Beats Dodgers; Braves Down Phillies

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Milwaukee Braves erupted for five runs in the seventh inning and routed Philadelphia Phillies out of first place, with a 10-3 victory in a Rhubarb-flavored game at Connie Mack Stadium Wednesday night. The win put the Braves in second place, one percentage point behind St. Louis which beat Brooklyn 7-3, and dropped the Phillies to third in the see-saw National League race.

The crowd of 24,596 was barely in its seats when a first inning argument, punctuated by a barrage of beer cans from the stands, delayed action 18 minutes and prompted the Phillies to play the game under protest.

DETROIT (AP) — Bob Turley hurled a sparkling six-hitter and his New York Yankee mates pounded all-star pitcher Jim un-

ning for eight hits, including home runs by Jerry Coleman and Yogi Berra, as the first-place Yankees took a 5-1 decision over the Detroit Tigers Wednesday night.

The world champions dealt the Tiger right-hander his third loss against 11 triumphs and his first defeat since June 21. They grabbed an early lead and, except for Charley Maxwell's 19th home run in the sixth inning, Turley was never in serious trouble.

CHICAGO (AP) — Rookie Bill Fischer put down a ninth-inning Baltimore uprising to save a 3-1 victory for Chicago White Sox and Bob Keegan. It was the 35-year-old Keegan's fifth straight triumph.

Stan Leonard Wins C. P. G. A.; Pat Fletcher Comes 2nd.

PETERBOROUGH, Ont. (CP)—Stan Leonard, 42-year-old pro from Lachute, Que., Wednesday night won the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association championship with a three-under-par 210 over 54 holes.

Leonard finished two strokes ahead of Pat Fletcher of Montreal and Al Balding of Toronto. In third place with 213 was Bill Mahwinney of Vancouver.

Four players were bracketed at 214—Jack Kay of St. Bruno, Que., Bill Kerr of Montreal, Lloyd Tucker of Kitchener and Edmonton's Henry Martel. Kay came up with a pair of 69s in the final two rounds after an opening round 76, the best scores of the day.

Bill Kozak of St. Catharines was next with 215 and Jim Swarbrick of Montreal finished with 216.

The victory for Leonard was his sixth, the most any pro has won since the tournament started in 1912. It was sweet victory for the smooth, smiling Leonard who joined the big-time tournament trail permanently two years ago. He was runner-up to Balding at Toronto last year. Previously he won the tournament in 1940-41, 1950-51 and 1954.

Balding started the final 36 holes at the head of the field with a four-under-par 67. He shot a second-round 71 and toured the Kawatha layout in three-over-par 74 on his final 18. Leonard shot rounds of 69-71-70 for the triumph that gave him \$750 and the Seagrave field.

Remember When Tebbetts Retracts Charge He Made At N. L. Pitchers

NEW YORK (AP) — Manager Birdie Tebbetts of Cincinnati retracted charges that National League pitchers deliberately threw at his star left fielder, Frank Robinson, because he is a Negro.

Obviously a great deal calmer than he was after his team's 6-1 defeat by New York Giants Tuesday night, the Redleg pilot said before Wednesday's game he had not been misquoted but that he was guilty of making false accusations.

"I now know that what I said last night isn't true," he declared. Tebbetts' charge was originally leveled specifically at Giant pitcher Ruben Gomez, who hit Robinson in the left temple with a fast ball in the eighth inning after the Redleg slugger had doubled and tripled earlier. It was the eighth time Robinson was hit this year. Last year he was hit 20 times, tops in the National League. Robinson was in hospital overnight but played in Wednesday's game.

"You don't see Stan Musial, Duke Snider, or Red Kluwevski going down like this kid does," said Tebbetts. "And they're good hitters, too. I'm just tired of see-
