The Orange Bill.

We regret that there seems to be, on the part of some politicians, a disposition to raise a disturbance about the fate of the Orange Bill. Any agitation on this point should, we think, be deprecated by all good men. It is clear that the passage of an Act of Incorporation is not necessary to the existence of the Orange Order; while on the other hand, it is certain that the passage of such an Act would give the deepest offence to a very large body of the people. The passage of the Bill, would, therefore, conflict with a well known rule by which civilized society is governed, viz., that "it is wrong to give needless offence"; and it would also conflict with the higher Christian principle conveyed in the divine command to "Love thy neighbor as thyself."

The Patriot of Saturday says the disallowance of the last Bill was "a dangerous exercise of the prerogative." Judging by the feeling that was expressed on the occasion, the danger lay in allowing the Bill to become law. A civil and religious commotion such as all would deplore, would undoubtedly have followed. The Government, led and supported as it is, must inevitably have resigned; there would have been a general election; the economical policy which is being pursued—and which it is necessary to pursue at this juncture—would be lost sight of; the whole Province would have been given up to discord,—had not the Lieutenant Governor, in the nick of time, exercised his undoubted right, and vetoed an unnecessary Bill. But if the veto in this instance was a "dangerous exercise of the prerogative," it was also dangerous when exercised (with respect to similar Bills) by the Queen, by the Governor-General and by the late Lieutenant Governor. It is noteworthy that Sir Robert Hodgson, though acting on the advice of a strong Protestant Government, led by so daring a politician as Mr. L. H. Davies, did not assent to an Orange Bill, but did that which had precisely the same result as if he had vetoed it at once.

The recent action of Hon. Mr. Campbell in this matter was, probably, taken without sufficient consideration of the responsibilities which devolve upon a member of the Government. It is not probable that either he or his constituents would like to see the present administration overthrown at this juncture. As for the conduct of the Leader of the Government, we regard it as perfectly natural. A Roman Catholic, the descendant of an Irishman, everyone knows that Orangeism must be hateful to him. He may have thought the solidarity of his party sufficient to ensure the defeat of what was known to be to him an odious measure, or he may have felt a delicacy in asking his Protestant followers to vote against the Bill, or he may, from the first, have relied upon the "veto." In either case his conduct is, from his point of view, perfectly justifiable; and the silent opposition he gave the Bill while it was passing, was, no doubt, intended to convey the impression that his feelings respecting it were too deep for words.

The attempt to give legal recognition to Orangeism in this Province, has been defeated in succession by the veto of the Queen, the Governor-General, and the Lieutenant Governor. In truth, it seems to have been a mistake from the beginning, and we hope it will not again be made.

The Railway.

In reply to a paragraph in the Patriot of Saturday, it is only necessary to state that precisely the same number of section men are employed along the line now as has been employed in former years. We are informed that the "road" is, on the whole, as smooth as it ever is when the frost is coming out of the ground.

The County Courts Amendment Act.

DURING the hurry of the last day of the session, a schedule for this Act, prepared by the Legislative Council, and agreed to by both Houses, was not attached, in lieu of the original schedule passed by the House of Assembly. Consequently this schedule was not assented to by the Lieutenant-Governor, and red tape says the Act is dead. This will be regarded by the people at large as a providential circumstance. The Act was, on the whole, a bad Act, calculated to keep alive the credit system, promote litigation, and increase the expenditures of the Government. The result of the blunder will simply be that the Courts and their proceedings will continue to go on just as they have been going. Traders will have to be a little more careful to whom they give credit than they would have been had the Act gone into operation. That is all.

The Grit Petition.

THE petition respecting the National Policy, which was recently presented to Parliament, while being signed, very carefully kept from the sight of those likely to expose the fallacies it contained. A friend in Ottawa who has inspected it, writes: "The petition contains nothing but falsehoods from beginning to end. The first paragraph would drown it in any Parliament. And the rest of the petition contains gross misstatements." The Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto Mail writes:

"The real facts concerning this petition are pretty much as follows: There are five thousand names attached to the petition, and not six thousand, as stated in the Globe. The petition was circulated, and signatures canvassed for in every part of the Island. The smallest proportion of names was signed in the constituency of Mr. Pope. They number 1,300 out of 8,000 electors. There were only 353 names obtained in Charlottetown. Some of these are the names of mere boys, some have no votes, and there are quite a number of Dominion officials that were appointed by the late administration. The whole electorate of the three counties of Prince Edward Island is about 18,000. The petition contains five thousand names. Those names have been carefully examined and counted. In some places as many as five, six, eight, ten, thirteen, and twenty-five names, have been signed by one hand. Wherever there was a McPherson, McDonald, Campbell, McLeod, McCormack, Cameron, from five to ten of each name have been signed by one hand. Some are written in lead pencil. This occurs principally in Mr. Yee's county. Mr. Hackett's hired boy, quite a lad, has been induced to sign, no doubt, by some false representation. Petitions of this kind are never presented in England, as it was discovered that the majority of signers never knew what they were signing. At one time a noble lord was induced to sign a petition for his own expulsion, not knowing what he was signing."

Comment is unnecessary.

Two vagrants were tried by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon. One was sentenced to eight days imprisonment, and the other was discharged. Both were warned that, on next offence, they would be "sent up" for six months.
