TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, June 1.

The following are the particulars of the riot at Clonmel. When Stoddard, agent of the Emergency Committee, was leaving court, he was received with groins and hisses. A priest was passing out of the building, when the crowd made a rush to enter. A policeman in the confusion laid his hand on the priest's arm. At once a cry went up that Father Maker had been arrested. The crowd became furiously excited and the authorities at once concentrated the whole force of military and constabulary before the court house. Bats, stones, and brick-bats poured in on the police and soldiers. Captain Slack, a resident magistrate, threatened to read the Riot Act, and at that moment a policeman was knocked senseless at his side with a stone. Captain Slack produced the Act and several priests implored him not to read it as, if he did, the consequences would be terrible. The stone throwing did not cease, and as Captain Slack, after reading the Act, pronounced the words, "God Save the Queen," a stone smashed the skull of another policeman standing beside him.

The police charged on the people with fixed bayonets and at the same time the cavalry dashed in among the crowd. A scene of frightful confusion followed. The charge of the cavalry down the short street was so impetuous that several horses and riders dashed through shop windows at the end of the street. The air was filled with stones and bricks, and frightened shopkeepers who were endeavoring to put up their shutters were hurled to the ground and ridden over. Several Huskars were unhorsed by the crowd and trampled on by the horses of their comrades coming behind them.

The several charges through the streets lasted fully half an hour. A portion of the crowd fled while others undauntedly faced the charging horsemen and battered in their helmets with stones. The Huskars used the flat of their swords freely, the point and edge being strictly forbidden them. One Huskar in charging around a corner met with a serious mishap. His horse stumbled and fell and five or six of his comrades who were following swiftly fell over the prostrate horse and rider. Before the men could recover themselves their horses had galloped up the street and the men had to defend themselves from the mob until rescued. Owing to the exertions of the priests, several of whom received many hard knocks, the people were induced finally to disperse. About thirty citizens were seriously wounded.

LATER. The rioting in Clonmel has been resumed. The police and soldiers charged the mob and injured several persons. They finally cleared the streets.

DUBLIN, June 1. A telegram from Ennis says it is rumored that six persons were shot dead at Ennis, near Ennis, by the police, during the riot.

LONDON, June 2. Sir Stafford Northcote, speaking at a Conservative demonstration in Manchester, last evening, observed he thought there were not ten men in the House of Commons who believed in the Land Bill.

The Times Tunis correspondent telegraphs concerning the scattering of the British vessels by the French war ships as follows: Instructions have been forwarded to the French gunboats in these waters to prevent similar breaches of the International law.

The iron clad Monarch will be stationed at Tunis to protect British interests.

The news says it is understood the suggestions which Foster has to make to his colleagues for the restoration of order in Ireland will be submitted to the Cabinet Council to-day.

Daniel McSwane, an American, of Falconsh, County Down, president of the local branch of the Land League, has been arrested under the Coercion Act and conveyed to Kilmartin Jail. It is stated he intends to claim the protection of his Government.

According to the recent census the population of London is 3,814,511.

Mr. Goschen has arrived from Constantinople. Lord Dufferin, who succeeds Mr. Goschen, starts for Constantinople on Saturday.

UNITED STATES.

NEW ORLEANS, June 2. George Green, the wife murderer, has been sentenced to be hanged at Greenwood on the 22nd July.

NEW YORK, June 2. The Post's Albany special says of the vote, to-day large gains for Cornell for the short term, Dewey for the long term, indicate that the administration men may unite upon them to-morrow.

WASHINGTON, June 2. Sir Edward Thornton, this afternoon,

gave to Secretary Blaine a draft on London for £15,000 sterling, the sum agreed upon as compensation for damages inflicted on American fishermen in the Fortuna Bay affair. This final settlement has been made with the best of feeling on the part of both Governments. Neither side, however, has surrendered to the other its construction of the treaty of 1881. The money will be promptly distributed among the rightful claimants.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

PARIS, June 2. It is rumored that a coalition has been formed by Jules Simon, M. Waddington, Duke de Broglie and M. de Fourton, countenanced by President Grevy, to defeat the Scrutin de Liste bill in the Senate.

NAPLES, June 2. A slight shock of earthquake occurred at Mr. Vesuvius, followed by strong eruption. A broad and active stream of lava is flowing down the north side.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 2. The crops in the greater part of Russia are very satisfactory.

MADRID, June 2. At a meeting of the Anti Slave Trade Society a resolution was passed demanding the abolition of capital punishment and the immediate liberation of all slaves in the Antilles.

LONDON, June 2. During an artillery practice at Grandzen, in Western Prussia, a shell burst and three captains and two runners were killed and three persons wounded.

MEXICO.

LAREDO, MEX., June 2. Thos. Worth, an American citizen, was killed Tuesday night by the Mexican police. An investigation is in progress.
