

Islanders Seek Re-Play Of Glace Bay Game In New Glasgow Next Week

The Charlottetown Islanders have proposed a re-scheduling of last Saturday night's game with the Glace Bay Miners for Thursday, January 28th at New Glasgow as a means of preventing the M.M.H.L. from folding.

The Islanders were in touch with officials at New Glasgow yesterday and were given the go-ahead to arrange for a game with the Miners at the Nova Scotia centre next Thursday.

The Islanders were fined \$1,000 by League President C. Roy MacDonald on Sunday for failing to appear in Glace Bay for a scheduled game on Saturday night. In addition they were assessed \$150 to cover expenses at the Glace Bay Forum.

In their wire to the Miners yesterday the Islanders guaranteed the Miners \$1150 from the proceeds of the game at New Glasgow on Thursday, January 28th.

Following is the text of the wire forwarded to Don Gillis of the Glace Bay Hockey Club yesterday afternoon:

"Islanders agreed to play game of January 16, in neutral rink, New Glasgow preferred, tentative date Thursday, January 28th. Will guarantee Glace Bay \$1150 for said game in lieu of fine. Wire your decision re above as soon as possible." Signed, Islanders Hockey Club.

Club President Smith MacFarlane was in touch with C. Roy

MacDonald, President of the League yesterday. MacDonald agreed with MacFarlane that the Islanders' decision appeared to be a very reasonable way out of the difficulty.

Jim MacCallum, secretary of the Islanders Hockey Club stated last night the Islanders could not pay the \$1,000 fine as laid down by league rules.

The Miners also stated they would have to fold unless they received the \$1150 from the Islanders. A special meeting is being held in Glace Bay tonight to discuss means to overcome the financial crisis.

MacCallum stated that the Islanders were doing what they could to alleviate the situation for both clubs. He stated that if the Miners insist on the Islanders paying the fine then the Charlottetown club will have no alternative but to face suspension.

Meanwhile the Islanders are going ahead with plans for this week they play the Miners in New Glasgow tonight and have made arrangements to go by either car or plane depending upon the weather.

The Islanders play in Sydney on Friday and Halifax on Saturday. They will provide an expense free trip for any fans who wish to take their cars and provide transportation for a number of boys on the team. Gas, oil, food and accommodations bills will be taken care of.

Booster Club To Present Minstrel Review In Feb

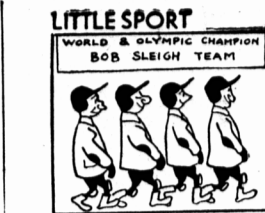

Badminton Tournery Folds; Too Successful

TORONTO, (CP)—Out of a sports scene clouded recently with financial failures and lack of public support a strange picture appeared during the week-end: a major badminton tournament folded because it was too successful.

The paradox occurred in the Strathgowan Badminton Club packed with more than 1,000 fans who fought for \$3 tickets to see the finals of the 10th annual international invitation tournament.

When the five-day championship closed and officials counted record gate receipts achieved by the appearance of the world's best players, the bombshell was dropped.

Stuart Lawson, Strathgowan president and originator of the competition announced that this tournament was the last.

"We've become too successful," he told the audience. "The tournament has outgrown itself. We are physically unable to hold it another year."

Lawson said the privately-owned club hasn't the facilities to cope with the competition, which, this year drew more than 300 entrants from the United States, Canada and Malaya.

Ted Elliott, of Saint John, N. B., president of the CBA who came to Toronto for the championship, termed the folding "a pity."

"This is the first indication I have had that it was ending," he said. "What the association can do about it I don't know right now but we will certainly give it every consideration."

The Strathgowan is a typical Canadian club. It has an active membership of 270.

Similar clubs exist in Montreal, Cambridge and Saint John, N. B.; Halifax, Peterborough, Bowmanville, Niagara Falls, Stratford, Kitchener, Fort William, Winnipeg, Regina, Saskatoon, Calgary, Lethbridge, Vancouver and Victoria.

In week-end games Sherbrooke beat Royals 5-0 Saturday; Ottawa defeated Quebec 5-2; and Chicoutimi shut out Springfield 7-0.

Teams Setting Scorching Pace In Quebec League

Teams are setting a scorching pace in the scramble for top honours in the Quebec Hockey League.

Montreal Royals and Sherbrooke Saints are in a first-place tie with 47 points each, one more than the third-place Valleyfield Braves. In turn, the Braves are one point ahead of Chicoutimi Sequeneurs who lead Ottawa Senators by one point.

Quebec Aces are next with 38 points, still only nine points off the pace set by the league leaders. Springfield Indians round out the league, three points behind Quebec.

Both Royals and the Saints have the same number of victories, 21, but Royals have played one game fewer. They are fairly evenly matched both on offensive and defensive, too. The Royals have counted 141 goals and the Saints 147. Royals have 124 goals against them, the Saints 183.

New Entry

This means that Sherbrooke is the highest-scoring team in the league and Montreal second. Ottawa has the fewest goals scored against them, 106, followed by the Royals at 124.

The last-place Springfield team, a new entry this year, has won but 15 of its 45 games, losing 25 and tying five. They also have the most goals against with 167.

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Horse Switch Witness Says Coups Tried Weekly

LONDON, (Reuters)—A London court was told Monday that British race track racketeers try to pull off a big betting coup almost every week.

Harold Sharp, a sports news agency official, also said he could see no objection to a bettor "using his wits legitimately" to try to manoeuvre a coup.

Sharp's phones to the race track at Bath went dead last July when a cable was cut just before 10-to-1 "Francosa" went to the post.

It turned out it wasn't Francosa at the starting line, but a ringer, Santa Amaro, who won the race and netted five men on trial here some \$170,000 winnings in last-minute bets.

The cut phone lines prevented bookies from calling their agents at the track to have them bet some of the money there and thus bring down the odds on the race.

Accuse 5 of Switch

Sharp was testifying at the trial of the five men accused of engineering the coup. They are accused of bringing the two horses from France—they were unknown in Britain—and switching the speedier Santa Amaro.

The court also heard horse owner Lord Elliot testify that one of the defendants had suggested giving the Bath police chief's wife a fur coat if the chief would take the "right attitude" towards the cabetting.

The 39-year-old aristocrat, a bookie himself, said that ex-jockey George Bowden brought one of the accused, Gomez Charles, to his apartment when the "Francosa" scandal was rocking Britain last summer.

The men wanted Lord Elliot to try to talk the Bath police chief into saying the phones were cut off simply because of "malicious mischief."

The bookie said he told the men their suggestions were "childish and stupid" and "that more or less brought the interview to an end."

The five defendants were not paid their \$170,000 winnings because bookie organizations promptly filed objections and demanded an investigation of the whole affair.

On trial with Charles are William M. Williams, 47, Harry G. Kately, 42; William Rook, 57; and Robert V. Dill, 57. The case is expected to last for weeks.
