Warden Believes Electric Chair Better Than Gallows

OTTAWA (CP)—The warden of one of the toughest United States penitentiaries says death by hanging is a gruesome sight. The electric chair was more humane; the gas chamber was dangerous. Warden Joseph E. Ragen of the Illinois state penitentiary said he had witnessed a gallows' death scene. The long walk of the prisoner up 13 steps, the convulsions of the body after the trap was sprung it was hard to forget. The electric chair was less gruesome and less painful, he told the Commons-Senate committee studying capital and corporal punishment. Death was almost instantaneous. Earl of Gowrie Dies

LONDON (Reuters)—The death was announced Tuesday of the Earl of Gowrie, 82, former governor-general of Australia and British army officer who won the Victoria Cross while commanding a camel corps in Egypt before the turn of the century. Lord Gowrie was governor-general of Australia from 1936 to 1944. "I cannot say how much I appreciate the dignity of all the functions in Charlottetown. You can show greater cities in size but younger in age and lesser dignity, how to discharge the proud traditions of a well established historic community. "I want to express my humble and deep appreciation in the name of the Corporation for the honor shown the Mayor of Ottawa and in my own right for the courteous, gracious hospitality shown me. "I only hope that circumstances will allow me to reciprocate to you or to the members of your Council in your Capital City."
