Co-Operative Journeyings Down Through The Years

The Prince Edward Island Co-Operative Livestock Marketing Board was organized at Charlottetown on August 4th, 1933, on the anniversary of the outbreak of the first world war, just nineteen years before, and thus confirmed a complete separation from the Maritime Marketing Board at Moncton, through which Island livestock shippers had been marketing stock for upwards of seven years previously.

An appraisal of assets indicated much had been lost in deterioration of once active shipping clubs, from which many adherents had strayed and few, if any, felt under obligation any longer to record their entire patronage or moral support. Private livestock dealers were again becoming firmly entrenched and gaining momentum, in the field of livestock trading.

Following formal organization of the Board, and appointment of provisional directors, the former Manager of the 1928-27 "Selling Agency" now in Civil Service but locally located, was solicited to become its Manager, at a stated salary considerably below his then current remuneration, but with an assurance that if he made sufficiently good, the deficiency would be covered, but as at present constituted, there would be no responsibility attached to any person or persons for fulfillment of the undertaking; in fact this contingency was a feature attached to the entire salary undertaking.

There was yet no treasury upon which to draw for immediate essential expenditure; there was no source of revenue, except commission on sales still only in the prospective, and with low livestock prices and depleted volume practically touching bottom, that tentative expenditure on the basis of such a prospect was out of the question. There was one definite ray of assurance, in that the Provincial Department of Agriculture, through its Deputy Minister, promised a five hundred dollar grant hitherto going to the Maritime Board, would be diverted to the new Island organization.

That forecast was not conducive to making an easy decision, but fact, along with what there was, dictated a forward march and the first eleven month year ended with an even break. A vigorous campaign for increased volume was inaugurated by the office, with a plea for regular support of every former club member as well as livestock producers in general and with excellent response, which was prompt and sustained, with many regular secretaries working overtime to bring about improved results. Any evidence of pessimism hitherto existing, was rapidly giving way to confidence and justified expectation. Of course it was not as rollicking as all that continuously, without its perplexing occasions, but on the whole steadily gratifying and encouraging.
