New Fire Alarm For S'side Within Next Eight Weeks

A new fire alarm system will be installed in Summerside within the next six to eight weeks as a result of a recommendation made to the Town Council by the Summerside Fire Department. The new alarm system will feature an air horn activated by compressed air, which will eliminate the possibility of failure of the signal due to breakdown in the electrical system, as has been experienced with the equipment presently in use.

In keeping with the advantages provided by the new equipment the town will be divided into nine zones, and the zone area in which a fire is located will be indicated by the number of short signal blasts which will be sounded automatically when the fireman on duty at the Fire Hall places a code wheel for that particular zone in the mechanism of an automatic transmission control panel which is a part of the new system. The air horn, from which the signal is sounded, will be placed on top of the old Post Office building which is the highest point in the center of the town.

The complete system, which is a product of Northern Electric Company, will cost in the vicinity of \$3,000. The air compressor will be located in the basement of the building which is presently being converted for use as a Town Hall, and the transmitter which controls the signal indicating the zone location of the fire will be in the Fire Hall. The diaphone air horn emits a distinctive tone — entirely unlike any other signal — which enables it to cut through street or other noises and to instantly command attention. For practical purposes it is non-directional as the horn acts as a resonator rather than a direct beam of sound. The fact that a supply of compressed air may be made readily available anywhere, coupled with its efficiency and flexibility of operation is said to have established the diaphone horn as the most practical and economical form of coded public alarm.

Want Railway Crossing At Kensington Opened To Public

The Kensington Town Council met in regular session Monday evening with Mayor W.H. Darrah presiding and all councillors present except Councillor Kennedy. A representative of the Kensington School Board waited on the Council and asked them to request the Department of Transport to have the railway crossing on the street connecting the new school and the Summerside Road made a public crossing. The clerk was advised to write Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P. asking for information regarding the opening of the crossing.

A citizen was present and informed the Council that damage had been done to a plate glass window as well as other minor damage as the result of an air rifle discharged by a youth. The clerk was asked to have a notice published warning any offender against the use of an air rifle in the Town limits.

The clerk was advised to write the Minister of Health and Welfare, Dr. M.L. Bonnell, asking for a supply of all water supplies and sewerage disposal on all properties in the Town, also concerning an aerial survey of the Town as suggested by the Government some time ago. Bills amounting to \$404.01 were approved paid.
