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Fire Destroys Two-Storey Dwelling And Contents At Anglo, Near Tignish

A fire believed to have started in the kitchen at the home of Mrs. Cletus Gavin at Anglo, about three miles from Tignish, completely destroyed the two-storey dwelling about 10:30 Wednesday morning, together with all household effects, clothing and a considerable amount of money.

Living in the house were Mrs. Gavin and her family, Albinis and Esther. At the time of the fire Albinis and Esther were away and Mrs. Gavin, having started her noonday meal had gone outdoors to attend her chickens. On returning to the house she was unable to enter as the inside was a mass of flames and smoke.

She called a neighbour who was passing and before long a large number of neighbours had gathered to help but the only water supply on the premises was a pump in the burning home. Some water was hauled by trucks from nearby houses and the large crowd succeeded in saving the granary and barn which were situated very close to the house. The loss was partly covered by insurance.

In his opening remarks Mr. Stewart congratulated the graduating class and stated that Summerside High had experienced a particularly fine year and he expressed keen disappointment concerning the new extension plans for the school and said the project accepted by the Town Council was not one of the two plans submitted by the board of school trustees.

The Hon. Keir Clark, who was introduced by Mr. Stewart said in his address to the graduates that he was greatly impressed with what he found at the Summerside High School. He said the diversified program, presented at the school, blending academic and commercial subjects made it the only composite high school of its kind in the Province and for this it was to be congratulated.

Mr. Clark also congratulated the students on the work they had done and stated that although it was impossible for everyone to win a prize, the real reward is the amount of knowledge they had acquired. He also congratulated the parents on the close cooperation given to the school.

Mr. Mercer, school supervisor, in a few brief remarks, stated that education is something you can't buy or can't be given, you must work for it and he said he hoped the graduates would find due recognition for their labor.

Interesting Illustration Station Field Day Held Wednesday At Long River

An illustration field day, under the auspices of the Dominion Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the Provincial Department of Agriculture was held on Wednesday afternoon at the farm of Mr. William E. Johnstone and Son, Long River, and was attended by a large number of farmers and their wives and families.

Favored by ideal weather conditions, the program got under way shortly after two o'clock with Mr. W. N. Black, agronomist, Illustrated Stations, acting as chairman. The various speakers were introduced by Mr. Black after a cordial welcome to all had been extended by Mr. Johnstone, owner of the farm.

Mr. R. Snaezelle, superintendent of the Cotton Memorial Forest Nursery, conducted a very interesting question and answer period dealing with rural beautification. His discussion was of particular interest to the ladies who were asked a great many questions and received a wealth of useful information regarding the planting and care and growing of flowers and shrubs of every variety.

Mr. Snaezelle extended an invitation to all to come to the nursery at any time and assured them they would get every possible assistance in matters connected with his department. He said that a personal visit to the nursery was preferable to writing in for their requirement as better service could be given this way.

While Mr. Snaezelle was conducting this forum the men were taken on a walking tour to inspect sections of the farm on which controlled tests had been made with a view of obtaining the best possible pasture growth. This inspection also revealed remarkable grazing conditions in a pasture area on a very steep hillside that had not been broken by the plow for many years.

Using this part of the farm for pasture purposes had prevented the erosion of the soil, it was pointed out, could be indicated to advantage on many farms on which soil erosion is a problem.

The Hon. C. C. Baker in his welcoming address said it was always a pleasure for his department to co-operate in the work of the Illustration Station. He outlined the growth of these stations in Prince Edward Island and paid tribute to the time honored work of the deputy minister of agriculture, Walter Shaw, and expressed his belief that this excellent record would be carried on under the new deputy, Mr. Stewart Wright.

Mr. Baker said that while this province had not been given the variety of natural resources enjoyed by other provinces, "we are therefore entirely dependent for our economy on agriculture." He pointed out that agriculture had the advantage of being on a renewable basis year after year while the natural resources of other provinces, such as oil and minerals, are of a depletable nature. He said that agriculture had been man's first venture and in order to survive it had to be his last. In this province production costs must be closely watched as farmers are faced, in many cases, with a long transportation haul in order to market their produce and so they must produce at a lower cost in order to show a profit.

DISCUSSES PASTURES Dr. J. A. Clark, former superintendent of the Experimental Station at Charlottetown, spoke on pasture fertilization and management.
