THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Midsummer Examination—List of Prizes.

WEST KENT STREET SCHOOL.

The first impression the visitor receives of this school is decidedly favorable; for the entrance to it has been made pleasing and attractive by the flower beds planted in the grounds by the hands of the teachers and the scholars. Kent Street School justly ranks among the best in the city. It has a very strong staff, including Principal Miller, Miss McKinnon, Mr. Seaman, Miss Eliza Lawson, Miss Miller, Miss Wadman, Mr. Duncan, Miss Ellen Lawson, and Miss Scott. The latter has the youngest and, perhaps, the most interesting class in the school; and the examination showed that, young as they are, they knew a good deal about color and shade. Miss Ellen Lawson, too, has a lot of clever little ones—good at spelling and smart at adding up. Both these primary classes are very large, and both behaved well during the examination. We regret that, for want of sufficient time, THE EXAMINER'S representative couldn't be present, even for a short space, at the examination of the classes of Miss Wadman and Miss Miller, though we have no doubt, that their good record in past years has been improved in this year. Mr. Duncan's class was not by any means full during the examination; but, examined by A. McSwain, Esq., it did good work. Miss Eliza Lawson's class is much too large. This is, no doubt, due in part at least to the teacher's popularity; but it is hard on the teacher, and we believe the trustees intend to have another teacher and the class divided. The examination of the class was very satisfactory to the visitors. Mr. Seaman's class is also large and well up in the branches included in the grade to which it belongs. It was examined by the Rev. Mr. O'Meara, Rev. J. McLeod and others and gave evidence of thorough and careful instruction. One of the pleasantest class rooms and best classes in the school is that of Miss McKinnon. The class passed the examination very satisfactorily, showing that the understandings of the scholars had been trained as well as their perceptions and memories. Mr. T. A. LePage gave the class a lesson in grammar, which was very interesting to both the scholars and the visitors. The Principal's room was not so full as most of the others, showing that in school as out of school, only a few, comparatively, reach the higher branches. There was an interesting competition between Masters Prowse and Beer, for Mr. L. H. Davies' prize for reading; and the examination in arithmetic by Mr. McLeod, of the Normal School, was a good test of the boys' knowledge and intelligence as to that important branch of learning.

There was a large number of visitors; among them, Thomas Handrahan, Esq., and A. Kennedy, Esq., of the Board of School Trustees; Rev. K. MacLennan, Rev. Mr. Allan, Rev. Mr. O'Meara, Rev. J. M. LePage and John McLeod (of Prince of Wales College and Normal School), Angus McSwain (of the Model School) Donald Montgomery (Superintendent of Education) Mr. Oxenham (Secretary of the Board of School Trustees) Councillor Horne, Mr. and Mrs. Mason, Mrs. Geo. R. Beer, Miss Harris (of St. Peter's School) Mrs. C. Hyndman, and many others.

SABBATH SERVICES.

G. W. Fisher, occupied the pulpit of the Fairville Methodist Church. Rev. N. R. Baker, A. B., preached in the German Street Baptist Church. Calvin Presbyterian Church was occupied by the Rev. Theophilus L. Williams in the morning, and the Rev. L. S. Johnson in the evening. Rev. C. S. Wells preached in the morning in the Baptist Church, and the Rev. H. I. Clarke in the evening. Rev. S. S. A good deal of time was taken up with settling the time for the committees to meet in the afternoon.

Rev. T. W. Smith, editor of the Wesleyan, was introduced, and made some remarks relative to the position of the denominational organ. He stated among other things that there had been an increase of 500 subscribers since he began his office. On motion of Dr. Pickard a resolution of approval was passed.

Rev. J. Pickles, L. L. D., a minister of the New England Conference, was introduced and made some appreciative remarks which were well received.

The Mission in Persia.

Miss Montgomery has sent to her friends in this city a copy of her report on the mission in Persia. She relates some of the difficulties the little church at Hanadan has to contend with; and says that, withal, substantial progress is being made. The copy of the report is accompanied with the following letter, which will be interesting to readers of THE EXAMINER as well for the oriental style in which it is written as for the sentiments it expresses:

HAMADAN, Dec. 10, 1883.

Honorable friends in Charlottetown, beloved of Christ, though unknown to us.

Ah! friends and brethren in Christ, you are unknown to us; but, by the hand of Miss Montgomery, even in this great distant land, the fruit of your Christian love appeared, and now, like our beloved friends, we give you our love with thanks.

First, we thank you for sending Miss M. to us, that she labors in our families and teaches our children and leads them in the way of the Lord, and teaches them hymns and necessary knowledge, so that great fruit will be produced for the work of the Lord by the grace of Almighty God, who loves the world, and sealed His everlasting love by His only begotten Son to the world for the salvation of men.

Miss M. left you, who are her friends, and came here to give us sign of Christ coming to the world, that He left His glory and loved sons that he might bring them back from their evil ways.

Second, we thank you for these things you sent for the table of the Lord, and these have this sign for us—they invite us to Christ's communion table, not only to the communion of the visible church, but that which is invisible, even with Christ in glory.

We beseech the Lord that your love may

increase, and that He will reward all your labors with a part in His everlasting inheritance.

We and all our families give you salutation, and we hope you will always remember that in your prayers, and these things that are sign of your love make us zealous that we grow in grace. May you be in health, by Christ. It is written in Hamadan's church.
