Ayrshire Breeders Show Increase In Membership

The encouraging news that seventeen new breeders had been started during the year was reported by the secretary at the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Ayrshire Breeders' Association held at the Offices of the Experimental Farm, Mr. Heber MacPhail, New Haven, presided.

The Club's financial statement revealed that \$1,683 had been spent during the year. The main items of expenditure included bonus assistance to new breeders; transportation and promotional work. The breeding stock which the new breeders acquired was carefully selected by a selection committee of the Association.

A survey made by the secretary showed that over half of the breeders are following the practice of calfhood vaccination for Bang's Disease and about a third of the breeders have commenced dehorning. Considerable discussion centered around bonus of breeders for 1956. It was decided to concentrate on bonus of 4-H club members. Some worthwhile suggestions were forth coming as to how the club was to raise funds for the following year.

ANNUAL FIELD DAY

The annual field day will in all likelihood be held next year in Kings County. The time and place is to be named by the directors. Judges for the Charlottetown and Amherst Fairs were suggested and will be forwarded to the directors of the exhibitions.

At noon, the breeders held a luncheon at Birch Court, supplied by the ladies of Parkdale Women's Institute. Dr. George Fisher who was the guest speaker discussed the advancements in artificial breeding projects for the province. Col. F. I. Andrew, vice-president of the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders Association reported on the affairs of the national organization. He leaves next week to attend a director's meeting at Ottawa where plans will be discussed for the coming national convention.

Directors named for the coming year are: Gavin Reid, Kings County; Wallace Wood, Queens County; and Edward Boswell, Prince County. Directors at large are: Brent Slead, Fortuna; Arthur MacRae, Charlottetown; Royalty; Douglas MacDonald, Glasgow Road; R. C. Parent, Charlottetown. Mr. R. A. Balvin was named secretary.

Agricultural representatives at the meeting were L. W. Roper, H. W. Clay, Keith Clay, Robert Pierce, R. C. Parent. All entered freely into the discussions which took place.

Seed Potato Shipments From Province This Year

Up to the end of November this year Florida has purchased 230,366 bushels of Island seed potatoes, almost 99 per cent of which was of the Sebago variety. The total shipments of seed to the end of last month is about 78,000 above what it was for 1954. The total Island potato crop estimate for 1955 is 10,750,000 bushels.

While Florida is the largest purchaser of Island seed it can be seen that the seed is pretty well distributed to a lesser degree to a number of other places, in United States, Canada and the West Indies. The following are the purchasers of Island seed this year: Virginia, 69,236 bus.; Ont-

Two Killed In Car-Bus Crash

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP)—Two persons were killed and a third injured Friday in a car-bus crash on Highway 1 near Lepreau, about 25 miles west of Saint John.

The dead are Raymond F. MacCarlie and Mrs. Delbert Rigby, both of St. Andrews, N. B. Mrs. Edna MacCarlie, sister-in-law of the dead man, was taken to Saint John General Hospital. The extent of her injuries is not known.

The accident took place around 9:45 a.m. A car reportedly driven by MacCarlie was in collision with an SMT (Eastern) Ltd. bus driven by Edward Clinch of Saint John.

The car apparently skidded on a curve and slammed broadside into the front of the bus. None of the four passengers on the bus was injured. They were taken later to St. Andrews in another bus.

The car was reported heading towards Saint John, the bus towards St. Andrews.

Will Be Known As Earl Attlee

LONDON (AP)—Clement Attlee who was elevated to the House of Lords after resigning as Labor party leader will take the simple title of "Earl Attlee," his wife said Friday night.

The former prime minister quietly left the House of Commons two days ago after serving there for 33 years. He was Labor party leader for 20 years.

Attlee's son will become Viscount Prestwood of Walthamston. Mrs. Attlee, now Countess Attlee, said the Queen's consent has been given and "it has all gone through."

Queen Elizabeth conferred an earldom on Attlee almost immediately after he announced his resignation from the Commons. It is traditional to grant this honor to a former prime minister who desires it.

Ranks in the House of Lords in descending order are: Duke, marquess, earl, viscount and baron.
