MacDonald will officially open the show Thursday at 8 p.m. Following a few words by Summerside Mayor J. Ernest Morrison there will be a drawing of coloured slides of Island gardens and a program featuring young islanders.

The show will be open to the public on August 27, from 2 to 4:30 p.m. and on August 28 from 2 to 4:30 p.m.

All prizes will be presented on the opening night, with the rose bowl going to the individual with the highest total points. Twenty awards on the "special prize list" will be presented, including a prize for the number and 200 silver trays in the table decorations.

Donations for prizes will be accepted until Thursday August 22, at the Legion Home, made up.

Perhaps the most beautiful display is that of the gladioli and dahlias—each last year took two walls of the hall and produced a board of visitors. The gladioli and dahlias sections are divided into two parts; one for large grown and one for those with small gardens.

This year the table decoration categories will specify the size of flowers required as follows: large—over 20 inches; medium—12 to 20 inches; small—under 12 inches; and miniature—under 12 inches.

A new addition to this year's show will include "wild flower collections".

The "special feature" will offer more of a challenge this year as exhibitors will be required to enter an original design in a novel block or container. The choice of flowers, arrangement and colours will be left to the individual; however, the exhibit is to be a minimum of 24 inches in length.
