The number of destitute people in Ottawa this winter is unusually large. The City Council has been asked to find some means of relieving the distress.

ATTENTION is directed to the lecture advertised in another column to be delivered by the Rev. Mr. Caruthers in the Y. M. C. A. Hall next Monday evening on "Bearing of our own Monuments the Question of the Future." We hope Mr. Caruthers will be greeted with a full house.

ANOTHER concert is to take place on Thursday evening next, in the Market Hall, which has been kindly given for the purpose by the City Council. It will be in aid of the sufferers by the smallpox, who have lost their means of support, and under the management of Mr. Earle. The programme will appear in a few days.

In the manufacture of tobacco from the leaf, sugar or molasses and gum of some kind are used. In the manufacture of the "Myrtle Navy" brand the sugar used is the finest white loaf, known in the trade as granulated. This is a sugar in which there is seldom any adulteration, but to guard against the possibility of it, all sugar used in the factory is submitted to a careful test of its purity. The gum used is the pure gum arabic.

EIGHT men from each of our two City Batteries of Garrison Artillery met in competition at Fort Edward yesterday. The weather, though somewhat cold, was favorable, and the shooting, which was from 32-pounder guns, was very good indeed. The detachment from Capt. Moore's Co., No. 2, scored 187 points, of which Gunner McLeod contributed 30. We have been unable to secure the score of Capt. Passmore's Co., No. 1, in time for to-day's issue, but will publish it as soon as possible.

A SWORD-FIGHT on horse-back took place at Oakland Park, near San Francisco, in the presence of 5,000 spectators, on New Year's day, between Dancon C. Ross, the well-known athlete and Sergt. Walsh, a cavalry veteran. The fight was long and furious, much skill being displayed on both sides. The Sergeant's horse was wounded during the contest, and the battle was concluded on foot. Ross won, scoring fifteen points to his opponent's twelve.

THE Toronto Globe's London cable says:—The Privy Council has agreed to rescind the new rule with respect to landing live cattle in the United Kingdom. The regulation has that no cattle could be landed alive from the vessel which within thirty days had touched at a schedule port. This would have seriously affected the Canadian live cattle trade, as a large proportion of vessels call at Boston or Portland. Various representations had been made to the authorities here, and the first Canadian cargo coming within the operation of the rule was treated exceptionally and allowed to be landed.

THE bark Jas Kenway, Angus R. MacDonald master, from Liverpool for Charleston, has been wrecked off Holy-head. The Captain was rescued from the rigging, the crew took to the boat which was capsized and two of them were drowned. The Jas. Kenway was a fine ship of 650 tons, owned in Liverpool by Ritchie Bros and the master, and was insured. [Capt MacDonald above referred to is a son of Major Alex MacDonald, Lower Montague. He was sent out by an English firm to St. John, N. B., in 1875, to superintend the building of the Jas. Kenway, and has since sailed her. She was a superior vessel having cost \$40,000.]

SMALLPOX.—Another case has developed in the house of James Nunn, Winslow Road. The victim is the wife of Mr. Nunn. As she was vaccinated when young, it is thought the attack will be mild. Her husband has sufficiently recovered to be able to nurse the patient. Two children of the Gillan family exhibit premonitory symptoms of the disease. They have been vaccinated. The cases at Fort Augustus are all progressing favorably. A number of the residents of Fort Augustus and Scotchfort have been vaccinated and the remainder will be attended to by Dr. Jenkins, who will make a tour of both places to-morrow. Dr. Jenkins expects to hand the Hospital over to the Government to-morrow.

THE Truro Guardian says: While Mr. Alex Boneyman, of West Tatamogouche, was chopping in the woods, on Friday afternoon last, about a mile and a half from his home, he met with a most painful accident. Mr. Boneyman had been clearing a new road through the woods, and while in the act of chopping a tree, it fell upon him, falling across his leg, in which position he was forced to remain for some time. After suffering intense agony, Mr. Boneyman at last extricated himself from his perilous position and began crawling on his hands and knees for a distance of one mile, until at last his shouts were heard and assistance arrived. Mr. Boneyman's leg was found to have been broken, his pluck and endurance was certainly extraordinary.
