Agricultural News

P. E. I. Department of Agriculture

Farm Labor

The availability of farm labor continue to be in short supply and many farmers are going to find it difficult to secure sufficient labor to carry on their normal farm activities during the present year. Industry is still attracting many of our rural young people who are the only source of experienced farm labor that might be available. A few immigrants are arriving from Holland and being placed by the immigration authorities on farms in this province. It is hoped that a number of immigrants from West Germany may be procured to assist in carrying on farm operations during the next year. Application forms are available at the National Employment Offices in Charlottetown and Summerside for farmers who wish to apply for this class of worker. Before leaving Europe all immigrants are supposed to be closely screened and to have had farm experience.

Each worker selected to come to Canada will receive a loan from the Immigration Department to cover his ocean transportation and this loan must be repaid by the worker. The loan is guaranteed jointly by the Department of Labor and the Provincial Department of Agriculture. The farmer who employs one of these immigrants will be required to make monthly deductions in an amount to be later determined from the wages of the worker and refunded to the Provincial Department of Agriculture, who will in turn forward this money to the proper authorities at Ottawa.

As the Provincial Department of Agriculture is responsible for the collection and repayment of this loan it is necessary that the payments be made through the Department so that a proper check may be maintained on the workers placed under this policy in the province.

Weekly Potato Bulletin

The potato growers spray warning bulletin issued periodically over the past five years by the staff of the Science Service, Charlottetown, has become so popular that the growers have required that it cover all phases of potato production. It now appears weekly in newspapers both in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Daily papers print it on Tuesdays. The column has a new name, namely: Weekly Potato Bulletin. The contributors to this column include representatives of Experimental Farm Service, Science Service Laboratory, and Provincial Department of Agriculture, who are connected with the production and marketing of potatoes. 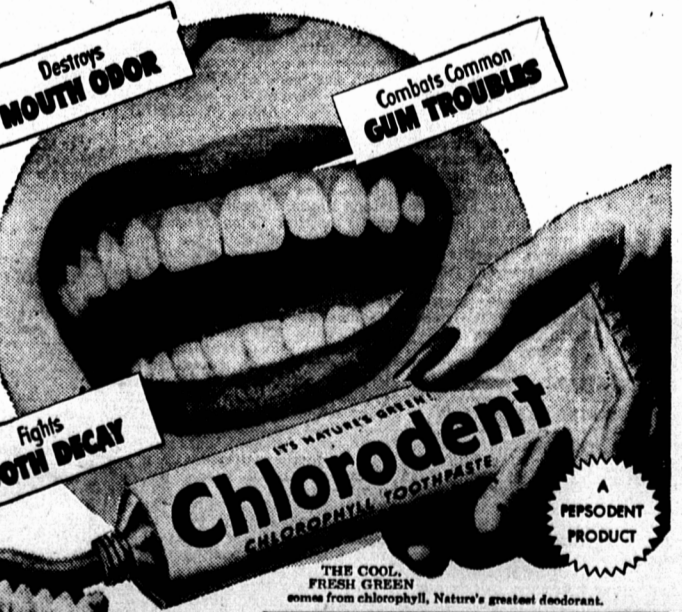
