OWING to the smallpox epidemic in Montreal there will be no winter cruises, and the citizens of Ottawa see in it their opportunity, and will make an effort to have one in that city.

A Schooner named the Pathfinder, purchased at Halifax, N. S., for parties in Victoria, B. C., is to be taken to the latter place by way of the straits of Magellan, a distance of 20,000 miles.

The steamer Carroll arrived from Boston last evening with freight and the following passengers: Miss McDonald, Kate Matheson, Mr. John O. Pollard, Duncan Matheson, J. Hughes, M. Lannigan.

It is expected that the Gibson Tannery in New Brunswick will be re-opened next year, when the hemlock lands on the Nashwaak will have been rendered accessible by the Miramichi Valley Railway.

LIEUTENANT ARTHUR L. HOWARD, famous in the Northwest as "the man with the gatling gun," is about to establish near Ottawa a firearms and cartridge factory for the Dominion Government, which, it is said, he will manage.

The harness shop of John Ryder, of St. Stephen, N. B., was raided by customs officers on the 14th inst., who found evidence of a large amount of American goods smuggled. It is reported the affair was settled by payment of \$400.

CANADIAN PACIFIC EARNINGS.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Company returns of traffic from November 1st to November 7th, 1885, show the receipts to have been: 1885, \$203,000; 1884, \$172,000; increase for 1885, \$31,000. Miles in operation, 3,064.

SUICIDE.—A case of suicide is reported to have taken place on Piccadilly Road yesterday. Patrick Hogan, shoemaker, who lives near Mr. Vickerson's, hanged himself while laboring under a fit of temporary insanity. It is said that he became insane over fright at hearing of the increase of smallpox in Charlottetown.

GRAPES have been sold in Hamilton, Ont., at the rate of almost half a cent a pound by the wagon load, and retailed at the fruit stores at less than a cent a pound, with the basket thrown in. The reason is said to be that "The Scott Act has so reduced the manufacture of native wines that the market for grapes is most seriously affected."

SOME weeks ago, says the Georgia Banner, an Athens merchant, sold a young man from Elbert County a suit of wedding clothes. They were shipped "C.O.D." per express. Last week the package was returned with a letter from the young man, saying that his girl had gone back on him, and as he would not need the wedding garments he had returned them. The merchant let him off from the trade.

MR. RICHARD ELLIOT, of Elliot's Station, gives (through the Patriot) the following plan for relieving cattle in danger of being choked by a potato or turnip in the throat: Let a person stand on the left or near side of the animal, pull out its tongue as far as possible to one side, then another person on the other, when he sees a good opportunity, let him throw a handful of salt as far down the throat as he can. The animal will continue to cough until relieved. This remedy is simple and effectual.

AN experimental importation of California raisins has been made by Mr. John McMillan, of Montreal. The consignment will fill one car and is composed of 1,400 boxes. It is billed to arrive in Montreal on the 20th inst. and will be, so far as we know, the first lot of California fruit ever brought into Canada. The quality is said to be quite the equal of Mediterranean goods. Heavy handicaps in form of freight and duty have to be contended against, but it is not likely that this first shipment may lead to others.

BROKE HIS NECK AND KILLED. A most melancholy accident is reported from Mira. On Sunday a young man named McDonald had driven to church with a fractious horse. After church he invited a young woman, to whom he was to be married in a few weeks, to get into the wagon, and drove her to the residence of her father. He then left for home. A few miles from home the horse was found by some neighbors standing on the road, and under the wagon lay the lifeless body of young McDonald with his neck broken. It is supposed that the horse took fright and ran away, the wagon coming in contact with a stone, the deceased being thrown to the ground, the fall breaking his neck.—North Sydney Herald.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Servian Successes. BELGRADE, Nov. 17.

The Servians have occupied all positions on Dragoman Pass, and captured the village of Dragoman.

King Milan has sent a despatch to Queen Natalie, announcing the success of the Servian army. There is much rejoicing here over the news from the seat of war. All plotters against King Milan have been liberated, except Mendrovick, a clerk in the war office, who is charged with perjury in denouncing his companions.

The Capture of Dragoman Pass. BELGRADE, Nov. 17.

Details of the capture of Dragoman Pass by the Servians show that the Driva and Stumadja Divisions under Colonels Michokovich and Bavecky were engaged and attacked the Bulgarians in force and completely routed them. Hordes of Bulgarians laid down their arms, being panic stricken, while several guns were captured and the pass abandoned.

Indian and Colonial Exhibition. OTTAWA, Nov. 17.

Sir Charles Tupper has cabled Hon. Mr. Carling that he has obtained for Canada seven thousand square feet of additional space inside of Exhibition Building, and two hundred feet by fourteen in the gardens for shrubbery, etc.

King Milan Repulsed. LONDON, Nov. 17.

It is reported that King Milan, at the head of a body of his troops, attempted to attack the Bulgarian rear, but was met and repulsed by a force under Prince Alexander. King Milan commands a force of 42,000 men.

Sympathy for Riel. BOSTON, Nov. 17.

Large meetings were held in this city and Worcester to night by French residents, at which speeches were made and resolutions passed condemning the Canadian Government and Sir John A. Macdonald, especially for the execution of Riel.

Crushing Defeat for the Bulgarians. BELGRADE, Nov. 17.

The Servian division marching on Widdan gave battle to the Bulgarians near Widdan and inflicted upon them a crushing defeat. The loss was heavy on both sides. The Servians captured 1,000 prisoners.

Going to the Front. PHILIPPOPLIS, Nov. 17.

Twenty thousand troops have started for the front since Saturday. A student's legion, composed of youths belonging to the best families in the city has also left for the scene of the war.

Turkey's Reply. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 17.

The Porte has replied to Prince Alexander to the effect that if he retires from Roumelia and restores the status quo ante, Turkey will consider his request for assistance.

Abusing Austria and England. ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 17.

Russian newspapers, commenting on the Balkan question, abuse Austria equally with England.

The Settlement in the Adams-Coleridge Case.

The settlement in the Adams-Coleridge case is said to be as follows:—It shall be left to some person of eminence, to be mutually agreed upon, to determine whether compensation shall be paid to Adams, and if so, in what amount. Bernard Coleridge, while unreservedly withdrawing the charges made, states positively that he made them in good faith. Mr. Adams is happy frankly to accept such assurance. Lord Coleridge desires and has long desired to say that whatever construction may have been placed upon anything he had written or said, his thanks are due to Mr. Adams to withdraw any language which may be construed as casting imputations upon his character or motives. Lord Coleridge cannot regard it as being necessary to say that he has never intended to cast any reflection upon the conduct of his daughter. It has been agreed that she be placed in the same pecuniary position as she would have been in if the misunderstandings had not arisen. Lord Coleridge is perfectly willing to make Mrs. Adams a suitable pension of \$600 a year by way of allowance. The settlement has not yet been approved by the Court but probably will.

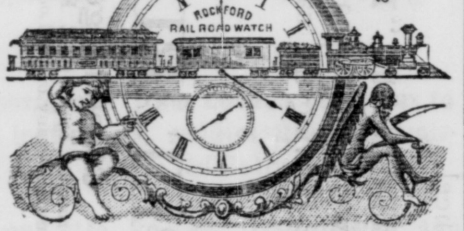
