

## DODGERS WIN FOURTH STRAIGHT

# Braves Maintain Hot Pace; Yank And Tribe Both Split

The major leagues have boiled down to two-team battles in each circuit for the time being.

Milwaukee Braves, continuing their brilliant early-season pace, downed Cincinnati Redlegs in two games Sunday 15-0 and 6-1 to solidify their percentage lead over St. Louis Cardinals in the National League. The Cardinals retained a half-game lead over the Braves with 3-2 and 14-7 triumphs over Chicago Cubs. Percentage is what counts, however, and the Braves hold a 51 point bulge, .733 to .682, over the Redbirds.

New York and Cleveland, run-ning one-two in the American League were held to splits. The Yankees, who own a one-game advantage over the Indians, took the first game from Baltimore 11-2 but the Orioles came back to win 5-1 behind the seven-hit pitching of Bill Wight.

**FELLER LOSES**  
The Indians had to pull out the second game 9-4 to gain its split after Kansas City Athletics routed Bob Feller in the opener to win 5-2.

Brooklyn, back to its winning ways, knocked off New York Giants 6-4 for its fourth in a row, three straight over its interborough rivals, and climbed into third place in the National League past the Redlegs. Pittsburgh handed Philadelphia Phillies the 10th straight setback with an uphill 11-9 victory in the first game of a doubleheader. The second game was suspended because of Pennsylvania's curfew law with the Phils leading 6-2 in the top of the eighth.

Chicago's White Sox walloped Detroit Tigers 8-1 for a sweep of the three-game series and Boston salvaged the finale of the three-game series with Washington, winning 5-3.

**HOMER SPOILS SHUTOUT**  
A home run by Cincinnati's George Crowe deprived the Braves of earning a double shutout. Warren Spahn pitched his second run-less game of the season and 36th of his career in the opener. Bill Wadewake continued to maul Cincinnati pitchers in the second game, supporting Ray Crone with 13 hits.

The Cards received their first dividends from their recent trade with Philadelphia as Murry Dickson gained credit for their first game victory and Herman Wehmer did an effective relief job in the second game triumph. Dickson himself drove in what proved to be the winning run in the opener.

Four Redbird homers, including two by Kenny Boyer, wiped out a 5-0 Chicago lead in the nightcap.

Duke Snider also blasted a pair of homers, one with the bases full to drive in five runs in the Dod-gers triumph. Don Newcombe re-ceived credit for his fifth triumph although he failed for the seventh straight time to go the distance against the Giants.

**3 HOMERS FOR LOPATA**  
Bobby Del Greco drove in three runs with his two homers as the Pirates broke 8-8 tie with three runs in the eighth. Stan Lopata paced the Phils in the second game with a pair of four-baggers. He also had one in the opener, as a pinch hitter.

After clubbing five Baltimore hur-lers for 14 hits in the opener, in-cluding three by Yogi Berra, the Yankees were stopped cold by Philadelphians who suffered their ninth straight defeat as they were edged 6-5 by Pitts-burgh. Philadelphia Phillies suffered their ninth straight defeat as they were edged 6-5 by Pitts-burgh. Pittsburgh got to Robin Roberts for 10 hits and five runs in his 5 2-3 innings, including

In other American League games, Cleveland defeated Kansas City 5-3 while Chicago's White Sox slipped past Detroit 7-6.

## Sime Cracks Another Mark

DURHAM (AP)—Duke University's Dave Sime, warming up for next month's Olympic trials, broke the conference record Saturday in the 220-yard low hur-dles and won two other events with ease to take individual hon-ors in the Atlantic Coast confer-ence track and field championships. Undefeated Maryland won the team title.

Four records were set in Fri-day's qualifying trials, including two by the fabulous Sime who bettered the world's record in the 220-yard dash by one-tenth of a second.

Sime, 19-year-old sophomore from Fair Lawn, N.J., who has cracked three world's records this year, was clocked at :22.4 in the 220-yard low hurdles. He broke the conference record in this event Friday with :23.5 and topped it again Saturday.

## NL President Giles Fines Two Redlegs

CINCINNATI (AP)—National League president Warren Giles Saturday fined two Cincinnati Redlegs and suspended one of them as a result of a series of disputes with umpires in Friday night's game with Milwaukee Braves.

Pitcher Hal Jeffcoat was fined \$50 and suspended for four days. Catcher Ed Bailey was fined \$25.

Jeffcoat was tossed out of the game, won by the Braves 9-8, for bumping into umpire Vic Delmore as he protested a ruling that he had tripped and not caught a pop bunt. Bailey was ejected from the game by umpire Hal Dixon for protesting low-voicedly a decision when he was called out at second base.

The umpires also banished Red-leg Manager Birdie Tebbelbs and Coach Jimmy Dykes during the game but they escaped further punishment.

## Fontana Criticizes Henri Rochon-Davis Cup Teammate

TORONTO (CP)—Don Fontana of Toronto, third-seeded member of Canada's Davis cup team, has criticized second-seeded team captain Henri Rochon in a letter to a friend.

Fontana accuses the Montreal player of "phony statements" in the press in the letter, made public Saturday.

The subject of the dispute is a Fontana-Rochon elimination match previous to the recent Davis Cup tie in Trinidad, in which the Canadian team ousted the West Indies, 5-0.

Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., first-ranked in Canada, played in the lead-off singles match against the West Indies. The No. 2 singles spot was a toss-up be-tween Rochon and Fontana. The Canadian Lawn Tennis Associa-tion advised the pair that they must play an elimination match, the winner backing up Bedard in the singles.

Fontana now writes that the elimination match was played and that he beat Rochon, winning the first two sets 6-3 and 7-5 and forcing him to default with the third set tied 6-6. Fontana says the captain is depriving him of due credit.

## FOR SIXTH TIME Landy Beats Clock Again

FRESNO, Calif. (AP)—World-miler master John Landy of Australia cracked the four minute mile for the sixth time Saturday night and said later it may have been his last race at that distance.

He was obviously disappointed in his sub-four minute perform-ances—and said he now may concentrate on the 1,500 metres for the Olympic games in Australia next fall.

The 26-year-old school master, who holds the world's record of 3:58, won the special feature easily and was between 75 and 90 yards ahead of Ron Delany of Ireland at the finish. Danny Schweikart of Los Angeles finished third in the five-man race.

"It is a little ridiculous to run so many times under four minutes and still not break my own record," Landy said after the race. "I am disappointed. I thought I could do better here."

Last week he ran second to his countryman, Jim Bailey, at Los Angeles. Bailey covered the distance in 3:38.8. Landy's time then was 3:58.7.

"I wasn't very tired," Landy said. "I just couldn't give any more."

Official wind gauges disclosed he was bucking a five-mile-an-hour wind up the backstretch Saturday.

Landy's lap times were 59.9, 2:00.1, 3:00.8, and 3:59.1.

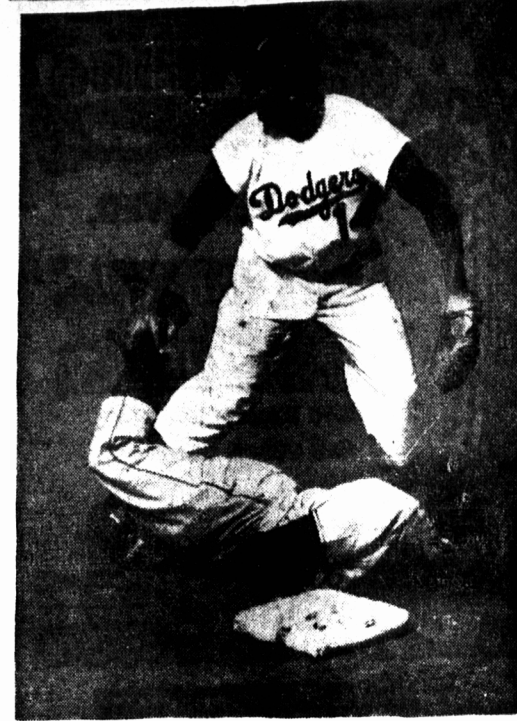
