land exported 24,695,000 bushels of potatoes in this period, which would give a tax revenue of \$148,170,000. Many of the dealers feel that this large sum of money is more than sufficient to cover the protection of the industry from the spread of disease, and to do the small amount of advertising that has been done on behalf of the industry; and if the tax is fairly collected there should be a big reserve in the fund.

its seriousness this season did not develop because of very low prices. It could seriously upset the whole industry and give the farmer a very much smaller return if the market was lively the potatoes in demand.

"During the past two years, a Workman's Compensation Board has been set up, taxing the potato dealer first at 3 per cent of the pay roll, and now at 1-2 per cent of the pay roll. This tax is now 2-1/2 times what the dealers previously paid to the insurance companies for protection, and it is felt that the dealers should consider whether this tax is fair or otherwise.

To Seek Ruling In Civic Election

Mr. Norman Pritchard said last night that he intends to ask the Town Recorder, Mr. E. H. Strong, K.C., for a ruling in regard to investigation of reported irregularities in the recent civic election in Summerside, in which Mr. Pritchard was a candidate for the post of Water and Sewerage Commissioner.

It is reported that a voter in the West Ward was given a ballot that had already been marked. When he handed it back it was supposed to have been put in the ballot box and he was given another ballot. This one was also found to be marked and when returned was also put in the box. On the third try he was successful in casting his vote.

Quarried about these reports, an official said last night that the number of ballots found in the ballot box tallied exactly with the poll clerk's list of those who voted. He said it was possible that during a rush period two voters may have placed their marked ballots on the table instead of putting them into the box and they might have got mixed up with the new ballots.

In the West Ward the only contest was for Water and Sewerage Commissioner and there were three candidates. Commissioner Leigh Stewart, who was re-elected, Mr. Pritchard who came a close second and Mr. Leonce Arsenault.

Aircraft Return From Training Trip To The U.S.A.

Two R.C.A.F. aircraft touched down at Summerside station, their home base, about 3:20 yesterday afternoon after completing a 19-day tour of U.S. air stations. The trip was made by the specialist navigation course in training at the Air Navigation School here along with a group of instructors. The operation was under the command of Wing Commander D. A. Willis, D.F.C., officer commanding the school and the captains of the aircraft were FO. S. W. Kipfer, D.F.C. and F.O. A. Wolfenden.

Bad weather that kept them one day late in coming home was the only delay on the whole trip which was carried out according to a schedule drawn up last November. The only incident occurred when they landed at Wright-Patterson Field near Dayton, Ohio, last Sunday and one of the planes was slightly damaged when it struck a snow bank while parking.

Three of the military establishments visited were in Florida and while there they had a free Sunday at Key West. However, wind day had followed their south and with the temperature only 16 degrees above zero only two of them decided to have a swim and they did, in a pool.

On arrival yesterday W.C. Willis said that the trip was "very helpful and worth while." They brought up to date the latest developments in air navigation and related fields. After about three weeks spent in the classroom the course will take off again, this time to Great Britain to see what they can learn over there.

They were welcomed back yesterday by the commanding officer of the station, Group Captain H. G. Richards, O.B.E., as well as by their wives and families.

Officials are even looking to Sweden, where forestry conservation and the "cropping" of wood lands has reached a very advanced state, for possible emigrants who might seek employment on Island farms and bring their forestry knowledge with them. Unfortunately very few people are leaving Sweden for Canada or any other country, and the type of emigrant needed must be sought elsewhere.

Canada's increased efforts to secure immigrants from Europe are meeting with opposition in some quarters. Those not conversant with the situation are asking why new settlers are being sought, when many of our own people are unemployed from time to time. The answer is quite simple. Most of our own unemployed are unskilled workers, labourers for the most part. Despite this there is a demand in many parts of Canada, where defence work is gaining momentum, for skilled workers, machinists, die and tool makers, etc. Such people are not trained overnight, requiring as they do apprenticeship training of from three to five years and sufficient pre-apprentice education, to fit them for their life's work.

Even in Charlottetown there is a shortage of skilled tradesmen. For instance practically every garage of any standing would jump at the opportunity of securing a first-class car mechanic, a very scarce animal in these parts. Plumbing establishments are in the same fix, and are continually hampered by the shortage of grade one men. Our biggest plumbing contractors complain they are obliged to carry many half-trained men. One good plumber can lay out and supervise the work of possibly two or three apprentices. The cry then is for trained men who can teach and direct, those who are unskilled in a dozen trades are in the same straits as the garages and plumbers, in a hundred Canadian towns, that is why Canada is looking for certain types of immigrants.

Incidentally our own Provincial Government estimates that 150 Dutch farm labourers will be needed on Island farms this year. This is the considered opinion of Premier Jones, Agriculture Minister Baker and Mr. Walter Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture.

City Manager For Halifax Approved

HALIFAX, Feb. 9 - (CP) - City Council last night voted 8-1 in favor of the council-manager form of civic government for Halifax.

Recommendations calling for the creation of the position of a city manager and an outline of his duties and responsibilities, had been made to council by a special committee.

Permissive legislation authorizing Halifax to ban smoking in all retail stores or at public gatherings where fire hazards exist will also be sought at the forthcoming session of the Legislature.

At yesterday's meeting of the safety committee, Fire Chief Fred MacGillivray said it was the intention to have non-smoking rules enforced in buildings where persons congregate.

'Flu Epidemic At Glace Bay

GLACE BAY, N.S., Feb. 9 - (CP) - Mayor Dan A. MacDonald tonight announced new measures to combat the influenza epidemic presently ranging in this Cape Breton coal town.

All the town's schools have been closed and gatherings of school children will be prohibited until the epidemic ends. More than 1,500 pupils were absent from classes today. A large number of teachers were also confined to their homes.

Mayor MacDonald said children's tickets to attend movies, hockey games, and skating sessions will not be sold. He said these precautions have been taken on the recommendation of the town medical officer, Dr. Thomas J. Khatkar.

In nearby New Waterford, nearly 900 are sick with the flu. Medical officials say the disease is of a mild nature.
