Royal Appreciation Of Canadian Welcome

The following letters are a further indication of the appreciation shown by Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh for the welcome extended to them here in Canada. Ottawa, Nov. 27, 1951. Honourable T. W. L. Prowse, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island, Government House, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. My dear Lieutenant-Governor, I should like to take this opportunity to thank you, on behalf of my colleagues and myself, for the work undertaken at your direction, in connection with the recent tour of Their Royal Highnesses the Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh. The success of the visit was assured by your efforts and by the efforts of those who worked with you in your province and I should appreciate it if you would convey to them my thanks and appreciation. I am enclosing herewith a photostatic copy of a letter written to me by Her Royal Highness as a memento of the happy time which Their Royal Highnesses spent in our country. My Dear Prime Minister, Before leaving, I want to tell you how grateful my husband and I are to you and to your colleagues for having given us so great an experience on this journey across Canada. The welcome we received on all sides has far exceeded anything we could have believed possible, and we have been given a picture of the rich variety of Canadian life which we shall never forget, and which has interested us profoundly. It has given us infinite pleasure to have had the chance of meeting and talking to so many Canadians in every walk of life, and we have been happy to have had with us at various times on our journey your colleagues in the Cabinet. Their advice has been invaluable, and we have much enjoyed getting to know them, particularly as they have given us an insight into Canadian affairs. I hope that you will convey our thanks and appreciation to all members of the three Services who have done so much to make our tour a success. We are very glad that you made it possible for us to travel in two ships of the Royal Canadian Navy, and in an aircraft of the Royal Canadian Air Force - we know also how much the Army has done at all times for us. Our visits to Navy, Army and Air Force establishments impressed us greatly and we are proud to have been saluted by so many Guards of Honour of all three Services throughout the length of our journey. I am sure I need not tell you that this, our first visit to Canada, has made us wish to come back before too long to see more of the country and its people. Sunday's dogfights raged from the skies over Pyongyang, the Red Korean capital, northward to Sinanju, at heights up to 30,000 feet. In the last three days the Reds have lost 19 planes destroyed plus six damaged, against four Allied jets officially reported downed in air combat. On the ground, there were no reported offensive moves Sunday on the part of Allied troops. Only light clashes with enemy patrols and small units were reported across the 145-mile front. Although these actions cost both sides some casualties, they were described as small.

Removing Rail From Hillsboro Bridge Approach

Abandonment of the railway line from this city over the Hillsborough Bridge has at last become a reality. The decision of the C. N. R. to give up its operation on the line to Murray Harbour was supported by the recent decision of the Board of Transport Commissioners. Last week workmen started removing the rails from the city side of the approach to the bridge. By the end of the week they had taken up the rails for a distance of approximately three quarters of the approach.

GOOD CHRISTMAS

It is noted that there are some turkeys being imported from Eastern United States, principally from the Toronto trade. This will naturally have a tendency to lower domestic prices as the big turkey farms of the United States usually produce the birds for sale at a price lower than that charged in Canada. In this Province there are several large flocks of turkeys, with the majority of breeders now turning to the development of the Broad Breasted Bronze. People in the know usually attempt to get young hen turkeys as there is a far greater supply of meat for the weight of the bird than is the case when toms are bought. The bone structure of the male is far heavier than that of the female. Last year the weights of the various birds on sale here were about 7 to 27 pounds for turkeys; 8 to 13 pounds for geese; 4 to 9 pounds for ducks; and 5 to 9 pounds for chickens. There has been a trend towards development of the smaller sized turkeys to suit the needs of the family which has only two or three members. However, the average bird purchased is expected to run from 14 to 20 pounds. It has been customary for the larger sized birds to cost for a few cents per pound cheaper than the smaller ones. The main turkey growing areas of Prince Edward Island are at Alberton, O'Leary, Summerside and Murray Harbour, with one farm on the outskirts of this city which generally supplies premium-type turkeys direct to consumers.

Final Blood Donor Clinics Here Until May

The four days of Blood Donor Clinics which commence at Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown today must provide a sufficient credit to do the province for the next six months. It has proved impractical to plan clinics for Prince Edward Island during the winter months as severe storms and impassable roads accompanied clinics of this kind held in March of the past two years. For this reason it is doubly important that the quota of 950 donors set for the four days of clinics should be exceeded in order to make certain that patients in P. E. I. hospitals, and the armed services overseas, will have what is required for their use in the next six months. Charlottetown has always set the pace for the rest of the province and Red Cross officials said last night they were confident that the generous citizens of the city, who are ever conscious of their responsibility to

their fellow-men, will again be on hand to make the continuance of the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service for the next six months possible.

The Mobile Team from Halifax arrived in the city last night and will be in the province until Friday morning. The other clinics to be held during the week are at St. Peter's Bay and Montague on Tuesday, at Summerside on Wednesday and at the R. C. A. F. Station and Tyne Valley on Thursday. It would be wonderful if the Team could return with at least 1,000 bottles of blood. This can be done if everyone who can will be donor at this week's clinics.
