

# Expansion Is Predicted But Problems Appearing

MONTREAL (CP) — Louis Rasminsky, governor of the Bank of Canada, said here today that Canada can sustain its impressive expansion but serious difficulties may have to be faced in keeping costs in line and in avoiding a balance of payments problems.

He said in one of his rare public speeches monetary policy, such as the central bank exercises, cannot do the job alone and increased manpower productivity will finally determine how well the country performs in the future.

trict Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Rasminsky noted that the current period of expansion has been going nearly five years, during which output has increased by more than 8 1/2 per cent a year and prices have been kept fairly well in line.

**LABOR WILL EXPAND**

Scope for further economic expansion depends on labor force growth and increased productivity, he added. The force is expected to expand rapidly in the next few years as students now in universities and high schools join it.

"Labor force growth and increased productivity provide scope for continued economic expansion at impressive rates."

"But the task of achieving this potential growth requires careful handling, for the less slack there is in the economy the greater is the risk of excess or distortions in one form or another which would threaten the continuance of sound and sustainable expansion."

While Canada produced below capacity, easy credit conditions were right. But as the slack left "there has been increasing evidence of pressure on our resources."

## Protestant League Urges End To Bilingualism Moves

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian Protestant League, Ontario region, in a brief to the royal commission on bilingual-

ism and bilingualism calls for an end to efforts to encourage bilingualism in Canada. Instead English should be used to unify the country from coast to coast.

Bilingualism would split Canadians and a constitution with Quebec as an associate state would lead to a complete break-up of Confederation, the Protestant group says in a brief being presented today.

"We should teach the true history of Canada in our schools instead of imposing the burden of a second language on our school boards."

History lessons should stress Wolfe's victory in 1760, recall that French-Canadians are a conquered people and eliminate the terms "French-Canadian" and "English-Canadian."

**SHOULD BE LIMITED**

The league, headed by Rev. John E. C. Sheppard of London, says bilingualism should be limited to Parliament, the Quebec government and the Supreme Court of Canada.

The Institute of Citizenship of Toronto takes an opposite stand, urging French classes from grade three or four. This would lead to better understanding and an exchange of ideas between the two language groups.

"It has been proven that the teaching of a second language at this stage in no way prevents success in the other essential subjects."

The institute says many Ontario school boards already have introduced French in primary schools despite a shortage of teachers and other problems.

The Indian-Eskimo Association of Canada calls for government action to preserve the identity and culture of Canada's native population.

**URGED SPECIAL ACTION**

The federal government is asked to co-operate with the provinces and business corporations to develop industries based on Indian skills and handicrafts.

The Canadian Council of National Groups says political corporatism creates a monstrous caricature of ethnic minorities. Members of such groups were too often considered second class citizens.

It was time to dissipate misunderstanding between the two language groups and to give the various cultures the recognition to which they are entitled.

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

### TEST YOUR PLAY

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Notrump. North leads the seven of spades, on which South plays the queen. How would you play the hand?

♠ K J 5    ♠ 6 4 2  
♥ J 9 8    ♥ K 10 5  
♦ K Q 8    ♦ A 6 2  
♣ Q 10 6    ♣ A J 9 3

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Four Hearts. North leads the jack of spades. How would you play the hand?

♠ K 8    ♠ A 7 5  
♥ A J 7 6 4 3 2    ♥ K 10 8  
♦ Q J 9    ♦ K 10 8  
♣ 7    ♣ A Q 10 5 3

3. Let's say you win the queen with the king and take a club finesse. If South has the king, he takes the club, returns a spade, and you go down if it turns out that North started with five spades to the A\*10.

Alternatively, you could win the spade lead with the king and take a heart finesse in either direction, assuming that you guessed wrong, you would still be in trouble because all you could be sure of is eight tricks. You would ultimately take the club finesse, and if it went wrong, you would almost certainly go down.

The proper way of playing the hand is to let south win the opening spade lead with the

queen. This insures the contract, whether North started with a four-card or a five-card spade suit. Let's say that South returns a spade trick at two. When you play the jack, North will have to choose whether or not to win it with the ace, but whatever he does, you are certain of nine tricks.

Let's assume he ducks. In that case, you take the club finesse, not caring much whether it wins. If it loses, South can do you no harm, because if he has a spade, North started with only four of them and you make exactly nine tricks, while if South has no more spades, you make at least nine tricks.

2. Win the spade with the king and lead a low heart towards the ten. This play guards against the only holding that can jeopardize the contract, namely, four trumps in either opponent's hand.

Thus, if it turns out that North has the K-Q-9-8, he will be unable to make more than two trump tricks, but if the first heart lead came from dummy, North would be certain to collect three trump tricks. If it develops that South has all the missing hearts, he also will find himself unable to make more than two trump tricks against this method of play.

## Indians Feel Islands Stolen By Government

TORONTO (CP)—Indians in the Kenora area feel the provincial government has stolen islands from their reserve and sold them to white persons as cottage sites, Ontario Liberal leader Andrew Thompson said Thursday.

Mr. Thompson called on the federal and provincial governments to clear up this dispute once and for all. The Indians "should be entitled to a procedure to have this grievance heard," he said at a press conference.

Mr. Thompson visited Kenora with a film crew last week after a protest march by 450 Indians.
