



PRINCESS IS WINSOME CHARMER

This charming adolescent is 14 year old Princess Anne, the Queen's second child. The photograph was taken shortly before her 12th birthday on August 15, 1962 by Mr. and Mrs. Archie Parker for the British Information Services. Last month a wind blown Princess was photographed at London airport on her way to Athens to serve as a bridesmaid for the wedding of Princess Anne Marie of Denmark and King Constantine of Greece. Being a bridesmaid at a Royal wedding is not a new thing for the Queen's look-alike daughter; she served in the same capacity for her cousin Princess Alexandra in April of 1963, and for Lady Pamela Mountbatten in January 1960. Princess Anne is the first daughter of a reigning monarch to attend boarding school. She became a student at Benenden School in Kent in September of last year. Before entering boarding school she had her lessons at Buckingham Palace where she was a Brownie and Girl Guide.

Vivacious Princess Anne takes after her mother

Princess Anne was born at Clarence House, London on August 15, 1950, the second child of Princess Elizabeth and her husband the Duke of Edinburgh. She was baptized at Buckingham Palace on October 21 by the Archbishop of York, the late Dr. Cyril Garbett, and was given the name Ann, Elizabeth Alice Louise. In May 1952, three months after her accession to the throne, Queen Elizabeth moved into Buckingham Palace with her family.

From her early childhood the Princess has been a vivacious child whose photographs bear a striking resemblance to those of her mother, the Queen, at the same age.

Princess Anne's first lessons were with Miss Katherine Peckles, the governess of her elder brother, the Prince of Wales. When her brother started to be educated away from the Palace, the Queen arranged for two of the Princess's friends to share her lessons. Princess Anne had special teachers for piano and dancing. In 1959 Miss Suzanne Josserson from the Lycée Francois in Kensington came to the Palace to give the three girls French lessons.

JOINS BROWNIES

In May 1959 the Princess joined the Brownies and became a member of the 1st Buckingham Palace Pack. This Pack is formed from a dozen girls of the Holy Trinity, Brompton, Park, and about twelve children of the Palace staff. In May 1961 when she had gained her first and second class Brownie badges she became a Girl Guide in the newly re-formed First Buckingham Palace Guide company. She stayed with this company until she started school in 1963.

Princess Anne made her first journey outside Britain in 1954, when she and her brother travelled in the royal yacht "BRITANNIA" to Tobruk to meet their father and mother on their return from their Commonwealth tour. With them

they visited Gibraltar on the way home. They have spent other holidays on the "BRITANNIA". In July 1961 Princess Anne spent a week in France on a private educational visit as the guest of the Marquis and Marquise of Saint-Genys. In April

1963 she made her first visit to Germany when she and the Duke of Edinburgh visited his sisters. Princess Anne has appeared in an official capacity with great success. During May 1959 she presented a trophy cup to a winner at the Royal Windsor Horse Show, and in January 1960 she attended an annual Sunday School party with her brother the Prince of Wales, where she presented prizes to over 30 children.

ACTS AS BRIDESMAID
Princess Anne was bridesmaid at the wedding of Lady Pamela Mountbatten in January 1962, and to her cousin Princess Alexandra in April 1963.

Like other members of the Royal Family she is a great animal lover and rides in Windsor Park with her parents. She also takes part in many other cross-country pursuits when she is at Sandringham and Balmoral. Princess Anne made her first cross-country helicopter flight in July 1960, when her father piloted her himself from Buckingham Palace to Wimbleton to watch the tennis.

In September 1963 Princess Anne, the first daughter of a reigning British monarch to attend boarding school, became a student at Benenden School, Kent, which was founded in 1923. The headmistress is Miss E. B. Clarke, and the Princess's form mistress is Miss J. Orme.

Princess Anne is fourth in line of succession to the throne, following her three brothers.

Even crowds organized for Royal drive

Tomorrow and Wednesday will see the largest number of uniformed groups and school children ever to line the streets of Charlottetown for a Royal Visit.

Areas have been allotted to each group so that the entire route over which Queen Elizabeth will travel at any time will be lined by contingents of military and civilian personnel.

Several hundred sailors from the destroyer escort accompanying Her Majesty will participate as well as airmen from RCAF Station Summerside.

Playing a leading role in street lining will be units of 2 Militia Group, supplemented by personnel of the Canadian Guards on at least one occasion. Royal Canadian Legion members from all parts of the province will also be in the city on both days. Over 500 veterans are expected to gather in Charlottetown for the Royal Visit and will be marshalled by Arthur Hale, sergeant at arms of the Charlottetown Branch.

Wednesday, in particular, will be an exciting day for the veterans as they will be required to line the route at several locations in the city during Her Majesty's slow drive to the House and the children's rally.

Tomorrow afternoon, the area along the Pond Roadway, Brighton Road, North River Road, McGill Avenue and Ambrose Street will be lined by youth groups, including cadets from city, high schools, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, Cubs, Brownies and Sea Cadets.

The ambitious program of lining the Royal route on every occasion which Her Majesty will appear is being co-ordinated by Lieut. Col. L.G. McNevin, 2 Militia Group, assisted by officials of the various groups participating in the occasion of the Royal Visit.

Specific areas have been allotted by Dr. K.A. Parker, youth co-ordinator. The cadet corps are asked to assemble at Queen Charlotte High School at 1:30 p.m. today and all other uniformed youth groups will assemble in Victoria Park in the field west of the P.E.I. Hospital at the same time.



A visit by Our Sovereign and her Prince is surely a cause for rejoicing. Especially in this Centennial Year, the birthplace of Confederation welcomes the royal couple.

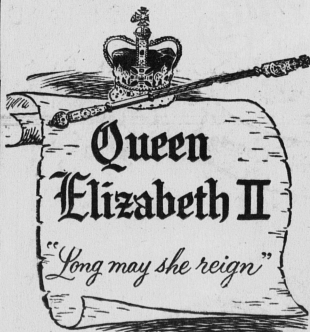
