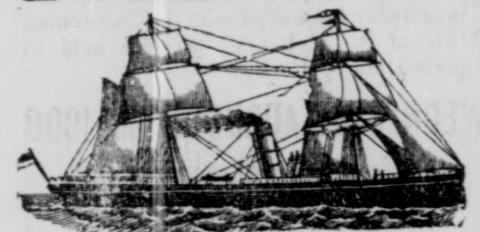

UNNECESSARY WORK.

MANY of the residents of Argyle Street are amused at the political manoeuvre now going on with respect to a proposed road between South Shore and Argyle Rear. The road, we understand, is no more needed than a new river is needed to West River. Bridge, but something apparently unnecessary in that particular respect to show that the Premier has in constant remembrance his faithful workers at election times. Work so far on the projected road has been confined to a preliminary survey by the supervisor. Its further accomplishment will probably depend on coming events.

TEST OF MILK.

An interesting test of milk was made in Charlottetown yesterday. Two samples were procured from city vendors, one sample was selected from seventy-five bottles in the pasteurizing establishment of Mr. McDonald, and one sample was taken from a can received from the farm. Mr. Spillet made the test in the presence of Dr. Macneill and Mr. Frederick Masters, with the following result: Pasteurized milk tested 4 p. c. butterfat. Sample out of can tested 4 p. c. butterfat. City vendor's milk tested 3.8 p. c. butterfat. City vendor's milk tested 4.2 p. c. butterfat. This is a good average test for this season of the year. It is understood that the practice in all well governed cities is to have the milk regularly tested at short intervals so that the consumer would be protected in receiving genuine or normal milk. It is hoped that our City Council will take the hint and have an inspector to look after this business.

A GRIEVANCE.

Side by side indications that our Street Committee interest themselves in their work, with good results to our community in the improvement of our streets and the beautifying of our town, there is also glaring evidence in more than one place of a negligence on the part of the proper authority that is positively disgraceful. To mention only one instance: the Malpeque road near the old brewery has been opened up for nearly a month while the contractor has been sinking a sewer trench. The trench is in the middle of the road with narrow spaces on each side. Should teams meet on these they could hardly pass. At night it is positively dangerous, and often lanterns are hung upon the guards till after dark. Several complaints have been made to THE EXAMINER about this matter, not because the road has been cut up, but because it has remained so long in the present condition to the discomfort of the people living on and using that road.

FOR CANADA AND AUSTRALIA.

A late cable from London to the New York Sun says that in accordance with an order issued by the cabinet on the recommendation of the committee on national defence the intelligence department of the war office has been engaged for several months investigating the preparedness for war of Canada and the Australian colonies. The investigation is said to have been completed so far as the latter are concerned, and a scheme of defence is being prepared which will form the basis upon which the government of the federated colonies will work. The dominant idea of this scheme is said to be the constitution from various military odds and ends in the present colonies of one homogeneous colonial army, recruited voluntarily, but with power reserved of enforcing a modified form of conscription known as the military ballot. Concurrently Australia is to be raised to the rank of a second-class naval station. The Canadian scheme it is pointed out, is not as far advanced as the Australian, for the reason that it is much more complex, and because Canada not only has to be prepared against outside attack, but must be placed in a position to attack. Anxious consideration has been given the question how best to defend the long land frontier and furnish adequate protection to the ports. In this matter the war office intelligence department has been co-operating with a small committee of naval experts appointed by the lords of the admiralty. The integral part of the Canadian scheme is the obtaining of safe and easy access for ships of war to the great lakes. Some such route is said to have been found, and the House of Commons will be asked at the next session to vote money toward the cost of the works. It is said that the Canadian scheme further provides for an increase in the garrisons at Halifax and Esquimaux, the raising of a considerable force of Canadian regular troops, if the Dominion Government's consent can be obtained, and the raising of the North American naval station to first rank, with an effort to top for the royal navy an unlimited supply of recruits afforded by the fishing population of the Dominion and Newfoundland.
