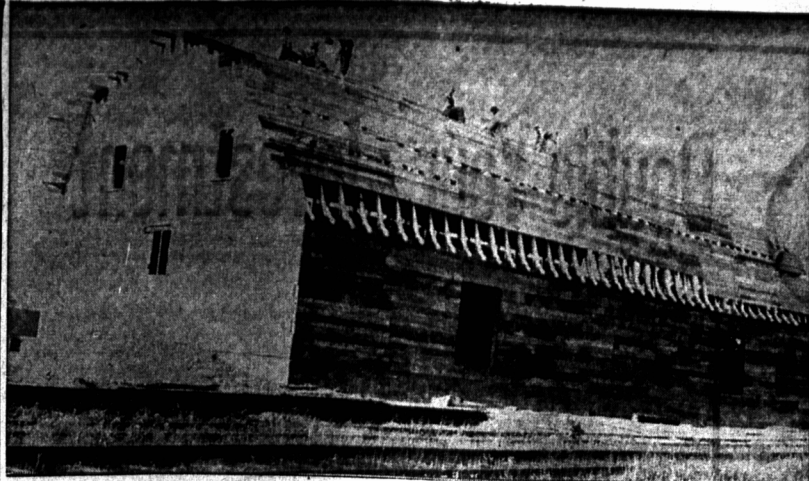




### PENNY AUCTION HELD AT SUMMERSIDE

## Norboro Seeks Deal With S'side Fire Department

A delegation from Norboro sought help last evening from the Summerside Town Council in regard to fire protection for approximately 40 farm homes that comprise the district. Water Hughes, spokesman for the delegation expressed the concern of the residents for an agreement with the Summerside Fire Department. He said that even if the district now has no hope of getting the Kennington Fire Department truck because Norboro could not meet the terms required. These, he said, included an annual payment of \$3 per ratepayer for one hundred percent of the district, and not every one in the district would consent to pay the levy. He said funds could be collected and held available to pay the Summerside Fire Department for any fire-fighting service they might be called upon to provide in the district, 10 to 15 miles distant from Summerside. He said that even if the department could not reach the area in time to save any building in which a fire might originate, they would be able to provide protection for other nearby or adjoining buildings. Other members of the delegation were: Alex Douglas, George Hughes and Harlan Day. Mr. Joe Brophy, Summerside town manager, suggested that since the department consisted of volunteer firemen, the willingness of the firemen to attend fires outside of the town should be ascertained. Councillor Clark said the matter should be discussed with the fire underwriters in regard to their satisfaction of town protection in the event that any arrangement be made with Norboro. Mayor Currie assured the delegation that the council were sympathetic to the fire protection needs of the Norboro district, but pointed out the factors that had to be considered by the town. He said the matter would be investigated by the council, and their findings or decision would be provided to the delegation. The meeting, the regular council meeting, was presided over by Mayor W. A. Currie, and all Councillors, with the exception of Councillor Andrew Perry, were present. The council, on motion of Councillor W. E. Jenkins, approved the purchase by tender of a new police patrol from F. Earle Mac Donald Ltd., for the amount of \$1,853. The applications of John Joseph Wedge and Willard Doucette as members of the Summerside Fire Department were also approved by the council on motion by Councillor Jenkins. Councillor W. E. MacCausland, in a report as chairman of the finance committee, revealed that tax collections are ahead of last year, at the present time, with 29 per cent of the poll tax levy paid, as against 15 per cent at this time last year; while 56 per cent of real and personal taxes have been paid in comparison with 38 per cent last year at this time.

### Quebec Plane Spotting Is Termed Success

TRIOIS-RIVIERES, Que. (CP)—Quebec's first large-scale civilian exercise in spotting, identifying and reporting aircraft in flight was termed a success Sunday night. Ft. Lt. M. J. Desjardins, commanding officer of the RCAF ground observer corps in the province, said more than 10,000 reports were received at three filter stations during the day about planes sent into the skies. Aim of the operation was to test communications and the application of early warning procedures. More than 5,000 civilian volunteers scanned the skies for 12 hours. Observers reported from 1,200 posts — many of them provincial forestry towers—from St. Jerome, Que., 25 miles north of Montreal, to Baifin Island in the Arctic. RCAF aircraft from St. Hubert, Que., Ottawa, Bogotville, Que., and Chatham, N.B., made 200 flights. The filter stations were located at Rimouski, Que., St. Jerome and Trois-Rivieres, headquarters of the ground observer corps.

## \$300,000 Fire At Cornwall, Ont. Sunday
