

## Jack Kenny Elected To Head Tennis Club At Enthusiastic Meeting

He also said that he knew it has been a hard job to revive tennis here since its slump during the war years, "but now is the time to drive ahead with a full scale campaign that will put the club to the forefront of local sporting activity again."

The Weather Bureau said the comparatively mild weather is just a break before a storm, centred over the Great Lakes, moves northeast to bring with it rain and milder temperatures.

A United States freighter, the American Producer is headed for Halifax tonight after a blaze in her cargo of fibre was brought under control. The U.S. Coast Guard cutter Ingham went to the aid of the freighter, 540 miles southeast of Newfoundland.

After helping put the fire out, the Ingham escorted the American Producer toward Halifax, but left her when it was apparent she was in no danger.

### Dredge Missing

A search is still underway for the abandoned Provincial No. 2, a Saint John, N.B., dredge, unreported since Saturday when it went adrift off Southwestern Nova Scotia.

The dredge was abandoned by her four-man crew when heavy seas snapped a cable linking her with the tug Ocean King. The crew were rescued and landed at Yarmouth, N.S.

When weather conditions improve another tug, the Ocean Rockswell, will aid the Ocean King in locating the dredge.

Many country roads are still blocked with the heavy snowfall Easter week-end. Telegraph and telephone communications are getting back to normal between Cape Breton and the mainland. Lines were down by driving snow and sleet that made repair work difficult.

H.P. Moffatt, secretary of the Halifax Fish and Game Society, said that already the food shortage for migratory birds has begun.

## Montreal Juniors Win Opener From Guelph

MONTREAL, April 11 (CP) — A vastly superior Montreal Canadiens sextet scored a 4-2 victory over Guelph Biltmores here tonight in the opening game of the best-of-seven Eastern Canada junior hockey final series.

An estimated 8,000 persons watched the Montrealers take command of the contest after a scoreless first period.

Dickie Moore paced Montreal with a pair of goals while Art Ross and Bob Dawson were the other snipers for the winners.

The brother combination of Andy and Frank Bathgate accounted for both Guelph's goals which came in the third period.

The game was a rough, hard-fought affair with a total of 29 penalties handed out, Montreal drawing 11 of the banishments.

But Canadiens proved to have a wide edge in play as they outshot the Ontario champions 30-21.

Wins \$5,533 On Race Bet

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, April 11 (CP) — Norman Sookram, Port of Spain business man and race horse owner, today won \$5,533, the largest payoff in Trinidad turf history, despite a last-minute decision by his groom which changed Sookram's betting ticket from the winning combination to the reverse.

Sookram, whose horse Monsoon hasn't collected a cent this season, instructed his groom to bet on two long shots—Brown Boy and Minisature—to finish 1-2 in the 16-furlong seventh race at Union Park. The groom decided to bet on Minisature and Brown Boy to finish in that order. In the five furlong Vistabella Stakes.

In the biggest racing upset seen here, Brown Boy was given the nod over Minisature in a photo finish. No one held the winning ticket and under the track betting rules Sookram, the only holder of a ticket with the reverse of the winning combination, was awarded the \$5,533 jackpot.

When he is not officiating at hockey matches, speed skating events or other such athletic events that require an efficient and capable man with a watch, he is devoting his attention to his work and his home and family.

Those of the press, whose lot it is to cover the games as the season rolls along and are responsible for exact times of goals, etc., also owe a debt of gratitude to Bill for his ever ready and willing assistance to keep them posted, and this writer for one, wishes to say "thanks Bill" and may we see you on deck again next year when the 1950-51 season rolls around.

## Detroit Red Wings Take Stanley Cup Opener From N. Y. 4-1

DETROIT, April 11 (CP) — A withering second period attack netted Detroit Red Wings four goals and the National Hockey League champions played defensive hockey the rest of the way tonight to defeat New York Rangers 4-1 in the first game of the Stanley Cup finals.

Despite their grueling seven-game semi-final series against Toronto Maple Leafs which ended last Sunday, the Wings overpowered the fourth-place New Yorkers during the second period, overcoming a one-goal disadvantage which Rangers carried over from the opening frame.

A small crowd of 13,415 had little to cheer about the rest of the way. Red Wings, crippled by the absence of ace forwards Gordie Howe and Ted Lindsay, let New York do the attacking and protected goalie Harry Lumley with an airtight display behind their blue-line.

Rangers, well rested after disposing of Montreal Canadiens in five games in their semi-final bracket, had trouble organizing their attack. Buddy O'Connor put them a goal up in the first period as he banged home a rebound at the five minute mark.

The goal climaxed the visitors' best drive of the night, in which they blazed four shots at Lumley before one got past him. Rookies Jack Gordon and Nick Mickoski drew assists.

Rangers kept up the pressure throughout the period, but couldn't add to their total. Then Wings took over in the second frame.

A charging penalty to defence-man Allan Stanley of the visitors gave Detroit the break they needed. Thirteen seconds after he left the ice, veteran winger Joe Carveth sank a 10-footer to tie the score.

The goal took a lot of steam out of Rangers, who were unable to get a shot on goal while Detroit's Red Kelly served a hooking penalty. A minute after he returned, George Gee took a pass from Johnny Wilson, a rookie from Johns' Omaha farm club, to give Detroit a 2-1 lead. Thirty-four seconds later, Jimmy McFadden poked a short one through the legs of New York goaltender Chuck Rayner to make it 3-1.

An interference penalty to Ranger defence-man Gus Kyle enabled Detroit to score the clincher, as Jerry Couture backhanded their fourth goal past Rayner at 13:56.

The top-sided play in the period was reflected by the goaltenders' stops — 12 for Rayner as against five for Lumley.

Apart from a breakaway by Gee, on which Rayner made a terrific stop, Detroit made only scattered efforts to increase their lead in the last period. But their solid defence gave Rangers few good chances to score.

Lumley had 24 saves to Rayner's 22, but the New York goalie had the tougher evening as most of the New York shots gave the Red Wing netminder little difficulty.

The teams met in the second game of the best-of-seven series at Toronto Thursday night in the first of two Ranger "home" games. New York was forced onto neutral ice when a circus took over Madison Square Garden for an extended stay last week.
